UTHOR Easwaran Rajappan is hoping to spread

positive messages through the kingdom and beyond after publishing his first book, which he believes will inspire those struggling to cope in times of stress and misfortune.

The 52-year-old, who prefers to be called Eashwar, faced crippling pain, financial loss over a failed property venture, as well as growing debt before literary inspiration helped turn his life around.

Despite suicidal thoughts, he managed to make changes, which he has helpfully outlined in *Proven Technique* to *Achieve Goals in Any Field.*

The native Indian, who has lived in Bahrain for 13 years, said: "*Proven Technique* is entirely based on what I have learned from overcoming various hardships and by teaching these ideas to others. There are also inputs from various books that I read on motivation and selfdevelopment." The release comes as

over a recorded 30 cases of desperate expats taking their



own lives so far this year. Eashwar had forged a successful career in sales management, having worked for various companies around the globe, and is currently a consultant and trainer. However, he has spent most of his adult life furthering his passion for writing, contributing to several blogs and magazines.

Despite this, becoming a writer was not in the plan during his formative years. He explained: "It seems strange to say now, but I never intended to become an author. My life was relatively easy for a while, with a decent salary and nice holidays. However, in early 2005, my life changed forever.

"I started experiencing severe aches in my lower spine but after X-rays and laboratory tests, I was given painkillers which gave me some relief. As I moved up in my career, stress levels came along with the package and that seemed to aggravate the pain. Ultimately, I dismissed it as occupational sickness and convinced myself that I could get over it.

"At the same time. I was informed that my two dream homes were being stopped by the government because the builder had violated certain approvals. It was a huge apartment complex under construction and I owned two of the planned apartments Then, the builder died and construction came to a halt. In the severe stress resulting from this situation my health just went from bad to worse.

Eashwar travelled home to India, where he was diagnosed with Ankylosing Spondylitis, an incurable disease that results in the fusion of the spine.

When he returned to Bahrain, the crippling pain and mounting debts would not go away, and were in fact worsening. During what he calls 'the darkest moments of my life', he even considered ending it all.

Determined Eashwar,


however, decided to take back control. He started to avidly read and search for

motivational messages One book in particular, A Man's Search For Meaning by Victor E Frankl, about a survivor of a concentration camp, strengthened his spirits and he began to mentally condition himself back on the right track

He held down a job and cleared 70 per cent of his debt within two years. He swam every day, despite the initial pain, to a point where his physical ailment, although not gone, appeared to be under control

"I had an introspection and began to write down points one-by-one," Eashwar explained. "In the space of a year, I had written down 55 points about life, hardships, money problems, health, human will, and more

"One of the discoveries was finding out more about my own inner-strength when it came to facing up to adversities. He set out to record a list of



key reasons to keep going and understanding what needed to be done to carry on in the 'game of life' and achieve goals set out in advance.

"From this learning came my technique I like to call GARA (Goals / Action Plans / Reasons / Affirmations) Proven Technique is all about achieving this through the real stories of ordinary people. So ultimately, make a GARA sheet and read it often and the

goals become a part of living." The idea of writing the book stemmed from a chance encounter. After a speech about his coping technique at a toastmaster meeting, of which Eashwar is a regular attender, another guest speaker asked him to bring his notes to her office. She turned out to be an editor and, inspired by his

speech, encouraged him to

immediately assemble his

thoughts into one solid text. Proven Technique to Achieve Goals in Any Field is now being snapped up for \$6.99 (BD2.640) from international online retail giant Amazon.

The feedback from the book of inspiration has been so positive, Eashwar hopes to become a prolific author now. He is already planning to release his second book before the end of the year, with the text and title being finalised, which

will be about 'winning in life'. Meanwhile, he will continue his journey as a sought-after professional speaker and trainer, offering consultancy on customer service, leadership and other skills.

Eashwar is also urging prospective writers to take the plunge and put their thoughts or ideas into a structured setting, which he believes will help them personally too. He said: "For me, writing

is cathartic. I find meaning in life by writing. Writing is the only way to bring out the deepest feelings and explain them in detail through words. Whenever I used to get knocked down, I would write. By doing this I was transferring those feelings on to my laptop.


"Most importantly, reading books facilitates writing skills. in my opinion. Read as many books as possible. I used to read one book a week but even more would help!"

Cat's home is just purrfect


By MAI AL KHATIB-CAMILLE N art aficionado who runs a framing company in Bahrain built a home to care for a pregnant stray in his area. The big-hearted gesture has not only won over animal lovers across the kingdom but now has all the local kitties purring with joy.

Bahrain Artistic Frames Centre owner and director Ali Asgar Shafiq, who earlier this year launched a gallery in Hoora's Exhibition Avenue to support local artists with a laboratory. a workshop space and an exhibit area, fell for a greeneyed Dilmun stray moggy roaming the streets around his shop located across the road.

Raj Kachwala, the centre's store manager, said: "Mr Ali was putting out bowls of food and water for the cat but when it started getting hot he thought of building her a home, especially as she was pregnant.'

Ali, 'the cat father', instructed carpenters to make a house for the stray to help shelter her from Bahrain's scorching sun using left-over wood from his frame-making division

Then, a tiny blue chateau called the Cat House was formed and the inn has been welcoming furry four-legged felines from around the area. as well as the original cat which started it all.

"The cat has had its kittens and they are all enjoying the home," Raj added. "Other cats are coming from around the area as well for daily feeding and shelter. This cat though is always here and is like our mascot

"The minute Mr Ali arrives the cats seem to know and come running to him, weaving between his legs as a 'thank you' for what he has done

Art lovers in the community has taken a shine to the cat house and it has become a hit on social media as a work of art in its own right. One suggested: "This could really take off with sponsored corporate cat houses placed around Bahrain. It's certainly better than the random plastic-filled feeding stations and junk placed on the streets. People care about the stray and domestic Dilmun cats as they provide a useful

service keeping rats at bay. Experts say the Bahraini



breed evolved over the centuries to adapt to the kingdom's extremely high summer temperatures and are quite different from other

moggies worldwide. Their coats feel as soft as a silk Persian carpet and they are built to survive the desert climate. The cats have an oriental build with slender, long bodies, high haunches and long, narrow legs and tails.

Their faces are also unusual. Most have a wedgeshaped head and ears that are wide at the base and oval tipped. The nose has a slight dip in its profile, and their eyes slant toward the ears, and are usually green or gold-coloured.

The coat of Dilmun cats is also uncommon. Although some are solid-coloured, many are what are called 'spotted tabbies' Apparently, this spotted

tabby gene occurs only in the Middle East.



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

Literary stars in the frame

RTISTS and writers from across the kingdom recently collaborated to create an exhibition that speaks volumes through every brush stroke and word.

More than 80 art lovers and poetry aficionados have flocked to the second floor of Harbour Gate to admire the showcase called Confluence - Where Words and Images Meet, organised by the Bahrain Writers' Circle (BWC) and inaugurated by Akram Miknas, president of Promoseven Holdings.

The joint venture initiative was the brainchild of Rohini Sunderam, a founding member of BWC, and the event's name was created by member Preeti Rana.

"The idea initially came about because we realised that many of our poets often illustrated their works with stock photos and drawings and posted them on social media channels such as on Facebook or Instagram explained writer Claudia Hardt.

"So, we thought why not see if there is enough interest among the poets to have an exhibition? A number of them



were excited by the idea so we invited our prose members to join us. Although a few of them joined in, the large majority of works on display are poetic."

The event, which continues until tomorrow, features 18 teams of writers and artists that have come together to create around 30 works of art including paintings, 3D pieces and even an abaya with words or poetry to inspire others.

"Everyone was coming up with different and very creative designs. We have paintings, drawings, photography and even a beautifully designed abaya or display," she added.

Claudia also featured her noem titled My Little Pearl Lulu! alongside artist Marion Akanji, who created three pieces called myPOETRYbox to complement her work.

"For a long time I was looking into the opportunity of having my poems translated into art and thanks to Confluence I had the pleasure of collaborating with my long-time friend Marion who is an artist and art consultant," added Claudia

"My poetry is inspired by the rich culture, heritage and natural island beauty of Bahrain with a focus on the tradition of pearl diving and its precious gem, Lulu - the Pearl, and that's the title of my displayed poem. 'Marion created three

different unique art boxes each representing one part of my poem and showing a lady's head with pearls and butterflies.'

Admission to the exhibit is free and is open from 11am-8pm

The BWC is now working on launching another poetry exhibit next month. The annual Colours of Life Poetry Festival will be held on October 27 at LNT gastropub in Adliya. This event was the brainchild of former resident and author David Hollywood Rohini Sunderam now directs the event and particpants will be presenting their poetry in English and Arabic. Claudia added: "This is more presentation poetry than slam or performance and here too we have a wonderful mix of light-hearted, serious, or contemplative poetry.

The declaration was a milestone moment in the history of human rights adopted by the United Nations (UN) General Assembly in Paris in 1948 "It is time all nations and all people live up to the words of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, which recognises the inherent dignity and equal and inalienable rights of all members of the human race", said UN secretary-general, António Guterres.

"This year marks the 70th anniversary of that landmark document. Everyone has the right to life, liberty and security."

Moved by the theme and annual event, Sarah wanted to help highlight and promote the peaceful ideologies as well as raise awareness about inclusion by hosting a Poetry for Peace Exhibition at Harbour Gate within the Bahrain Financial Harbour.

"Peace requires us to include everybody and what better way to demonstrate that than by having children from RIA sharing their thoughts on peace with businessmen and women roaming the halls of Harbour Gate?" explained Sarah, who volunteers at RIA in Adliya.

Teachers from RIA were also supporting the cause.







The places to dine in Bahrain plus culinary tips for the food connoisseur

ELEBRATED two-Michelin Star Chef Oliver Glowig has returned once again in Bahrain to help update the new season's menu at one of the leading Italian restaurants on the island.

The German-born maestro, who for decades has made waves in his adopted home of Italy since landing the role of executive chef L'Olivo on the gournet island of Capri, took on the consulting chef role at the Ritz-Carlton, Bahrain's Primavera with gusto in 2015.

Now an ambassador of the Italian gastronomic culture, Oliver is committed to mentoring new apprentices to help promote the healthy Mediterranean diet concept around the world. To prove the point, one of his kitchen protégés, Chef Vincenzo Nigro, has just been promoted from Sous Chef to Chef de Cuisine at the kingdom's award-winning restaurant.

A select group of culinary connoisseurs, including yours truly, was invited to 'a menu tasting experience' at Primavera last week to test some of the new delights in store for diners, alongside a sprinkling of traditional dishess that attract regulars to this popular dining destination.

Chef Oliver joined us at the table for most of the evening as we watched Chef Vincenzo orchestrate the kitchen team through the glass window partition giving a full screen action picture of the preparations and delivery of the dishes ... no pressure then!

At 30 years of age, Chef Vincenzo, from the small southern Italian town of Mottola, exudes a calm and confidence that belies his age, although his appointment fits perfectly alongside the dynamic young talent being



pushed forward throughout the property by recently-appointed GM, Bernard de Villèle. He's a product of the celebrated hospitality school at the Institute of Mauro Perrone in the city of Castellaneta which he joined at 14. Shortly after his studies were completed, his culinary journey took him to the UK, Switzerland, Australia, the Maldives, Dubai and Russia.

In Bahrain, under the mentoring eye of former Chef de Cuisine Alfonso Ferraioli and Chef Oliver, his career has reached new heights.

"The best thing that I love about my job is that there is always something to learn," he said. "New ingredients and fresh products continuously inspire me. I like to create new dishes, try new combinations and leave great memories for our guests. My experience, most recently in Rome with Oliver, has inspired me and my cooking!

"To make the perfect dishes you need to have a right combination of tastes, different textures and balance of flavours, but the most important thing is to do it with love. If you cook with passion, the food can never be wrong.

"My favourite ingredients are tomatoes, fresh basil and excellent extra virgin olive oil."

It must also be noted that

Chef Vincenzo has a glowing reputation, as what many eating out connoisseurs now describe, as a 'food artist'. The taste of the cuisine is matched by the beauty of its presentation. The family-style tasting menu produced by the

dynamic duo, was traditional Italian fare, of course, with the chefs' imitable modern twists.

I loved the beautiful Italian ceramic dinnerware much of the fare was presented on. Starters included Parmigiana Three Way, a delightful grilled aubergine (sometimes called eggplant) layered with cheese and tomato sauce and then baked to perfection, a piedmont-style veal with





tuna mayonnaise and capers and poached egg covered in a fried breaded casing with parmesan foam and sautéed spinach – a bit like a posh Scotch egg without the sausage meat. Obviously, the entrée selection at the establishment could not be concluded without one of its most popular dishes, the grilled octopus, with potato salad, green beans and pesto.

Sanad, green beans and pestic Main courses, featured a risotto cooked in tomato water, with burrata cheese and anchovies. This is the second time in a matter of days that I have enjoyed a rich risotto of such outstanding quality in a five star Italian restaurant, and, although I hate being indecisive, I've got to call in a 'score draw'. Truly outstanding.

Other delights included a seared tuna with panzanella salad, a Tuscan-style chopped offering of bread and tomatoes that is popular in the summer, and chilled tomato soup, and a glorious grilled lamb chop with tomato purée and lamb juice.

Desserts are just as dynamic, such as the Tiramisu (one of the works of art I mentioned earlier), a Neapolitan tart with ricotta ice-cream and a duet of vanilla truffle and chocolate icecream, coated with crunchy milk chocolate. Sweet.

Rounding off the traditional experience, Ritz-Carlton's legendary service is led by a predominantly Italian team, bringing to life the Trattoria Moderna experience, where guests are completely immersed in Italian charm and flavours. The new restaurant manager is another young gun, Gianvittorio Speca, and the hotel has also recently recruited Andrea Colla, as executive assistant manager food & beverage. Benvenuto to Bahrain. 


He is currently working on another solo exhibition which will take two years to fully complete, ready for showcasing sometime in 2020. Until then, people can admire

An educational insight and comment by head teacher Chris Fentor





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> misbehaves therefore it's the school's problem, not theirs. It is a classic endless negative cycle irresponsibility. In this case, however, there is a twist, one of the family members works for a ministry and as a result, should the child's parents be called into school or put on to any level of the discipline policy, he is wheeled in and because private schools are generally afraid of the authority, any decision made by the head regarding the child is overturned and he returns to school with the same carefree attitude as before. ever so slightly more aware that he is untouchable.

You can picture the scene in a few more years time when the boy realises the power that his family member yields. He will be intolerable and his behaviour will go from bad to worse all because the member of the family who works in a position of authority has failed in his civil and professional duty by abusing his power in the interests of his own family.

O, here's an all too familiar story. A child in a school on the island is only in the early grades and he has a limited home life built around endless tutoring.

When the boy gets home from school, after a snack and a shower, the learning begins again because that is when he is drilled by his tutors. His family expects to see progress since they are paying for his tutors and want value for their money. It is a classic example of 'paid for' parenting.

This grueling timetable of school all day and tutoring all night leaves the boy in a state of constant pressure.

The idea of what constitutes parenting in this case is built around the misconception that if the child is in lessons then he is learning and he WILL learn because the parent is paying for it. Besides that, the child is busy, therefore, from the parent's perspective, they are doing their job. Let's look at the same



scenario from the child's perspective. Because he is a child and full of the childish sense of awe and wonder, he also wants to play so he has to make a choice. Should he fulfil his need to play at home or at school?

At home it is far more difficult to play because he has one tutor after another and all of these tutors report to his

parents therefore the only real option he has is to play at school (because at least there his parents aren't watching) and that's exactly what he does

He plays the fool in class. breaks the rules, spends more time out of the classroom than in it and generally spends the hours he has in school in a state of carefree abandon.

knowing as he does that when he gets home, the real work begins.

Now, from the school's perspective, this of course is unacceptable. He doesn't conform and so they exercise the discipline policy and in time the parents will be called in to discuss what is happening The boy is just exercising

his right to a childhood since, because he cannot play in the place where he is supposed to,

his home, he plays at school. The parents, however, feel that as long as the child is in a school or a tutoring centre or stuck with his head in a book he is somebody else's problem and they are fulfilling their duty of care by paying someone to care for him. If he







AFTER a long summer break, children in Bahrain are settling back in school and focusing on classes, sport and other afterschool activities. It is a time of transition, not only for children but for parents.

Besides being anxious about the regular and recurring worrying thoughts such as 'will they need extra help in the classroom', or, 'what am I going to pack for lunch every day? some parents have deeper concerns around sending their kids back to school, one of which is their child's health.

Many people are not aware of how bad the indoor air quality in schools can be. Fatigue, headaches, dizziness, coughing, plus eye, nose and throat irritation are symptoms of poor air quality in learning environments.

Consider this, some reports suggest 50 per cent of all schools have poor indoor air quality. Many school days are missed by students due to allergies and asthma

What we know for sure is that indoor air quality has a direct impact on student health and performance. With cleaner air. students concentrate better and get higher grades. It also helps reduce absenteeism as children are less likely to get sick and enhances productivity.

But as everyone get adjusted to the routine of school, it's a good idea to monitor and improve indoor air Parents and students can work with school officials to promote better air

I FIND it quite encouraging to see just how many people agree that plastic bags for groceries and other purchases should be paid for so as to quash what I think is quite unnecessary plastic consumption.

Even a small price to pay will definitely lead people into thinking whether they really need a plastic bag

This point was underlined in California in three communities where when provided for free, up to 75 per cent of people chose to use plastic bags. A small charge of 10 cents however, made many reconsider as that percentage dropped to only 16 per cent

You can't manage what vou don't measure, that is to say, there is no way to know what the air quality is like without measuring it. It would be sensible for schools to carry out their own checks for both indoor and outdoor air quality. This can be done effectively by hiring a qualified professional for indoor air testing.

 Adequate air ventilation & source control: One step to improving indoor air quality in schools is to improve building ventilation. Schools must ensure the school ventilation system is working properly, undergoes regular inspection and maintenance, and has its filters replaced on a routine basis

 Comprehensive cleaning programme: A clean school is important to every member of the school

Plastic equals convenience; it is readily available, offered everywhere. By making people pay a price, it forces them think of the (mostly) cost free alternative

Sure, you might be able to find other uses for those plastic bags but there's no denying that they will eventually find their way into a landfill and contribute to the ever-increasing

community. Schools should be sure that hallways and classroom floors are wet mopped and surfaces dusted frequently using safe, non-toxic cleaning products and paints. It is also imperative to identify will reduce the spread of infectious illness, as well as the triggers for asthma and allergies.

Strong scents and fragrances can contribute to poor indoor air quality that can be unhealthy to students and teachers alike. Allergic and asthmatic patients report that certain odours, even in the smallest amounts, can trigger an episode. Encourage your child's school to ask its students and employees to refrain from wearing scented products. Every parent wants to

now becoming worldwide problem of plastic pollution. And, yes, some establishments here have taken their own steps towards greener living by providing plastic bags that are either partially or completely biodegradable, but switching them out for indefinitely reusable cloth bags is a much better alternative for the environment.

Remember the ozone hole? Well, it seems that thanks to initiatives taken to curb CFC production the ozone hole is predicted to be healed by 2050, so there is reason to remain hopeful when it comes to quelling the issues related to plastic pollution.

The hunt's on again

ITH its bawdy sense of humour, disorderly cast of characters, and hard core kills and action, The Predator does a lot right to reinvigorate the 31-year-old series.

It doesn't hit the heights of the original starring Arnold Schwarzenegger, and few action films ever will but this is finally a follow-up worthy of the name. Shane Black (who played a supporting role as Hawkins in the 1987 original) co-wrote and directed this continuation of the franchise, bringing his signature blend of dark, profane comedy, and

offbeat familial dynamics to the material. The Predator blends humour and heart as it explores two broken families: one, a group of self-proclaimed 'Loonies'

- psychologically damaged veterans bound for a military psych ward - and the other is the McKennas, a military family that's fallen apart for a host of reasons

The latter includes dad Quinn (Boyd Holbrook), a former soldier now employed as a mercenary, mum Emily (Yvonne Strahovski), and their young autistic son Rory (Jacob Tremblay).

Both families imbue this Predator film with a humanity that's been lacking in the series for some time. and the solid ensemble cast Black has assembled bring his battered creations and sharp dialogue to life with verve and conviction. I found myself truly connecting with this group and willing them to succeed as their dynamic evolved and layers of their personalities were revealed.

Not that all of the characters have that much to them though, mind you. Olivia Munn's evolutionary biologist, Dr Casey Bracket, initially seems like she might serve a key function by offering exposition and scientific insight but at a certain point she becomes just another character with a gun.

Strahovski has a couple of decent

scenes that show Emily is almost as much a force for the bad guys to reckon with as her estranged husband, but she's not terribly consequential in the long run

Faring far better are Trevante Rhodes as 'Nebraska' Williams, (seemingly) the most well-adjusted of the Loonies who gets a few nice male bonding moments with McKenna, and the duo of bickering-but-devoted buddies Coyle (Keegan Michael Key) and Baxley (Thomas Jane) get the lion's share of the jokes. Augusto Aguilera's Nettles also gets a few dumb-sweet moments along the way, but as entertaining and likable as the Loonies are they're merely supporting players to Quinn McKenna.

Holbrook brings a world-weary resignation to the role: McKenna has seen it all, so much so that he doesn't even seem particularly surprised to learn that aliens exist. He has some warm moments with his son that help humanise him, but when you get down to it McKenna is there to kill and break things Holbrook's gruff-but-relatable

portrayal helps make this otherwisecliché macho character appealing. Meanwhile, Jacob Tremblay once again proves he's one of the best child actors working, giving a nuanced performance as Quinn's gifted son Rory, a role that could've easily been overplayed or reduced to a plot gimmick in lesser

hands. But as much as a solid crew of human characters are necessary for an audience to be emotionally invested in a story about many of them being gruesomely hunted for sport, a Predator movie lives or dies based on how cool and intimidating its title character is . and that's where The Predator proves woefully inconsistent.

While we get all the usual path of destruction associated with the alien hunters, the introduction of a bigger, meaner variety of the already absurdly lethal original version raises the stakes of what the creature and the series is capable of ... until it just peters out.

Outside of his strength and size, this new Predator doesn't seem particularly better or more cunning than his smaller counterpart.

Furthermore, the home stretch is a little disappointing, with the action and the characters' fates so quickly rushed through that it's hard to keep track of who's alive and who's dead, shortchanging both the titular alien hunter and the emotional payoffs to several of the main players' arcs.

Some of the digital effects in the final sequence on-board a Predator's starship are also ropey at best.

Despite that, The Predator is, in many ways, a throwback to what made the 1987 original so beloved: it includes many of the same elements, such as the rowdy camaraderie amongst ludicrously macho protagonists, a debauched wit and a primal battle between man and heast

If you can forgive a slightly underwhelming ending, it's well worth hunting a ticket.

Final editions of iconic bug

A FTER 80 years, Volkswagen has announced that they are officially squashing the iconic Beetle car in 2019. The Beetle was originally commission in the 1020

commissioned in the 1930s by Adolf Hitler as the 'people's car' (or *volks wagen* in German). Designed by Ferdinand

Designed by Ferdinand Porsche, the curvy car was affordable, practical and reliable. Eight decades later, the 'bug' (as it is affectionately known) has been snapped up by 21,529,464 customers, making it the longest-running and most-manufactured car of a single platform ever made.

Germany stopped producing Beetles in the late 1970s, but in 1998 Volkswagen rolled out the New Beetle, which was meant to be a visual flashback to the original Type 1 design but was essentially a VW Golf. Another variation was

introduced in 2012, but sales have been steadily declining — down to around 15,000 last year from some 43,000 in 2013 — so the decision has been made to axe it.

To pay tribute to the car that helped make Volkswagen the world's largest automaker, VW will release two last models, the Final Edition SE and the Final Edition SEL.

Final Edition models are distinguished by special paint colours — Safari Uni (basically beige) or Stonewashed Blue inspired by the Última

Edición (last edition) versions of the original Beetle from 2003. VW is also offering Pure White, Deep Black Pearl, and Platinum Grey as alternative options.

Other changes include 17inch aluminium alloy wheels for the SE trim level, and 18-inch alloy wheels with a multicolour design meant to reference the Última Edición's combination of steel wheels, hubcaps, and whitewall tyres. Final Editions get model-specific upholstery as well — cloth and leatherette with diamond pleats for the SE, real leather for the SEL.

They get the same powertrain as other Beetle models, meaning a 2.0litre turbocharged fourcylinder engine producing 174 horsepower. That power is sent to the front wheels through a six-speed automatic transmission.

to have increasingly turned to larger cars such as crossovers and sports utility vehicles. Volkswagen, in the wake of

the diesel emissions scandal and huge investment in electric vehicles, says it will look to slim down its model range with a greater focus on family and electric cars. "The loss of the Beetle

after three generations, over nearly seven decades, will evoke a host of emotions from the Beetle's many devoted fans," said Hinrich Woebcken, chief executive of Volkswagen Group of America.

Hitler originally commissioned the car in order for a cheap and practical mass-produced car to be made available to the German people and to work on the country's new road network. But the outbreak of war would stall its production, as military necessity took precedence. The plant was severely damaged, then fell into the hands of Allied Forces, who were eventually to play a large part in its recommissioning.

Production began to take off in the late 1940s, and by 1955 a million of the cars were driving on German roads. The design would find international fame in the 1960s and '1970s in films featuring Herbie the Love Bug, a racing car with a mind of its own.

It was also popular with the

1960s counter-culture types who extolled the Beetle's small, practical, but aesthetic qualities.

In fact, *GulfWeekly's* Editor Stan Szecowka's first car was a sky blue Beetle, also called Herbie. He bought it for BD45 second-hand, complete with a wobbly rear wheel and a 6V battery.

It has not yet been announced when the final Beetles will be flying in to the kingdom, but the current 2018 model is available from the Behbehani Brothers showroom in Sitra for the starting price of BD11,000.


Car testing grounds ready to suck it and see

DYSON, the British company best known for its ground-breaking vacuum cleaners, is planning to expand its electric vehicle development on a former airfield.

The company said it plans to build more than 16km of test tracks at the former RAF Hullavington base in southern England. It also plans new office buildings for more than 2,000 staff that will eventually be employed at the site. Overall, Dyson has said it will invest more than two billion pounds (one billion dinars) in its electric car programme. Founder James Dyson is one of Britain's most successful entrepreneurs. Two hangars dating from 1938, have already been restored where 400

employees now work. In the next phase of development, the company is proposing to build tracks to put battery-powered vehicles through their paces, including handling and stability, off-road driving, a skid pan and a runway for speeds of around 161 kph. It will join an increasingly crowded field, as traditional automakers such as Mercedes-Benz, Audi and Jaguar Land Rover launch their own EVs to compete with Tesla.

Dyson has indicated it plans to incorporate in-house solid state lithium battery technology, understood to be lighter than conventional ones which hold much more energy, promising extended range for electric vehicles. The cars are expected to launch in 2021

The new development bodes well for the season ahead, with the famous 'Red Wall' sure to be called upon to push its team over the line during a gruelling season to come. Indeed, it was arguably the 16th man who settled this most tense of ties.

He said: "I'm absolutely chuffed, that was a tense game and could have gone either way. The momentum




swung so much and it went down to the last kick

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Hamilton's sitting pretty

EWIS Hamilton won the floodlit Singapore Grand Prix from pole position on Sunday to extend his championship lead over Sebastian Vettel to a commanding 40 points.

The Mercedes driver made a clean start and was largely untroubled as he beat Red Bull driver Max Verstappen by nine seconds, with Vettel much further back in third.

"I'm so excited," a jubilant Hamilton said. "I came here knowing that Singapore is a hard one for us. But I'm always optimistic, thinking that if we're really diligent and do our work, we can create some chances.

"Then Friday was already a good day for us. Saturday didn't start off well, but then all of the sudden that special lap came in. Knowing that we would start on pole, I knew that it was a great opportunity for us to capitalise on.

"I had a great start and from then I was able to manage it. When I hit the traffic, I was just mindful not to take any risks. When you start to get closer to another car, you start losing grip and start sliding around more, so there's a higher chance of mistakes. If you're lucky you catch the cars at the right point and they let you by so you don't lose any time, but I always caught them at an unfortunate point.

"The guys weren't letting me by. My heart was in my mouth for a minute. So when Max was right behind, I had to go on the defensive, and I thought to myself 'bro, you're not getting by - not today!'

"It was physically such a demanding race, so I'm relieved that it's over now - it felt like such a long night, but I'm super grateful for the result. I know I can't get ahead of myself, we can't get ahead of ourselves."

The four-time Formula One champion recorded his seventh win of the season and 69th of his F1 career. Vettel's championship bid crumbled when he crashed from pole here last year and then went on to lose the title by 46 points to Hamilton. It is looking increasingly

like a repeat scenario for the

Ferrari driver, who now has just six races left to catch Hamilton in their bid for a fifth F1 title.

Vettel was unhappy with his team after qualifying in third place behind Verstappen, and the German driver sounded irritated during Sunday's race after a team strategy error to send him into the pits for a tyre change, before Hamilton, failed to work

Instead he lost position and crucial points, dropping back behind Verstappen having earlier overtaken him. "We tried to be aggressive in the beginning and obviously it didn't work out," a despondent Vettel said. "I think, with the way we raced, we didn't have a chance. I said before the weekend we can only beat ourselves and we didn't get everything out of the package."

Hamilton has won four of the past five races and leads Vettel 7-5 in wins this season.

The only thing bothering Hamilton seemed to be the sweltering conditions. Despite the night-time start, the temperature was around 30 degrees Celsius and the humidity intense, meaning drivers lost up to nine pounds in fluids.

"T'm spent," Hamilton said moments after victory, crouching down by his car. His teammate Valtteri Bottas was fourth ahead of Ferrari's Kimi Raikkonen and Red Bull's Daniel Ricciardo. Two-time F1 champion Fernando Alonso, who won the inaugural race here 10 years ago, was seventh for McLaren in his final F1 season.

Hamilton's stunning pole on Saturday night was a recordextending 79th in F1 and among his best.

Vettel almost bumped into Verstappen as they headed into the first corner on Sunday, but they just avoided contact.

Moments later, Vettel got past Verstappen with a great move on Raffles boulevard while behind them Sergio Perez knocked his Force India teammate Esteban Ocon into the wall and out. The incident meant a safety car came out on to the track for four laps.

When the race re-started, Ferrari gambled on pitting first for new tyres by bringing in Vettel first. Mercedes pitted Hamilton moments later, and when Vettel came back out he was still behind Hamilton and lost more time getting past Perez.

Verstappen was the next in, almost colliding again with Vettel into Turn 3. Verstappen held position, Vettel dropping one place.

"No chance, we are again too late," Vettel complained over team radio, taking another apparent swipe at team strategy.

Perez had another incident later in the race. The Mexican driver got frustrated when stuck behind the Williams of Russian driver Sergey Sirotkin and collided with him as he tried to pass. On Mexico's National Independence day, Perez crossed the line a lowly 16th, having also likely lost the team points when he knocked out Ocon.

Hamilton's only scare was when he was held up by Frenchman Romain Grosjean and Sirotkin as they scrapped for position near the back. It slowed him down and enabled Verstappen to close the gap, but the Dutchman couldn't quite get close enough to attack.

Time is running out for Vettel, who realistically has to win in Russia in two weeks' time if he is to get back into title contention.



With the Ryder Cup a few short weeks away, I'm already giddy in anticipation of one of my favourite sporting events.

Some (in fact, many) may think that golf is boring to watch, but I challenge them to catch this famous duel between Europe and the US and not feel the adrenaline as the biggest names go up against each other in a match-play format.

We're still a couple of weeks out, but battle lines are being drawn and the familiar rivalry is heating up.

This year, the competition will be held in mainland Europe for only the second time in its 91-year history. Le Golf National in Saint-Quentin-en-Yvelines, France, is the location where Team USA will be hoping to retain the cup after they were victorious on home soil two

years ago. The match-play format has shown time and time again that the on-form stroke play golfers can't always turn it on when playing one-on-one. In fact, the format brings out the very best in some players who never quite achieved what their talent suggested on the Tour. For others, this is the fifth major and even more important than the others.

As usual, there are likely to be a few upsets here and there. Some of the American team are playing the best golf right now, but the Europeans will be keen to avenge their one-sided loss in 2016 and will be playing for pride.

US captain Jim Furyk will have to keep his players motivated to keep both the European players and the crowd as quiet as possible.


It is widely expected that Tiger Woods will have a significant impact on this Ryder Cup, both because he is playing his best golf in years, and also because anyone playing against him will have to deal with the attention the star receives.

Europe have at least four rookies playing for them this year so they will have to start quickly, otherwise they may become overwhelmed by the USA's experience.

Tyrell Hatton is a player to watch out for. He's making his Ryder Cup debut for Europe, and the young English star has a reputation for being quite a fiery character. He's not guaranteed to win his matches, but for sure he'll be good entertainment for those watching.

Another rookie to keep your eyes focused on will be Justin Thomas. The young American is in top form, and many are tipping him to be the standout performer of the tournament. Look for

fireworks if Thomas and Hamilton are drawn to play each other.

The top three players in the world are American, so look for big performances from Dustin Johnson, Brooks Koepka and the aforementioned Justin Thomas. Young American golfers Jordan Spieth and Rickie Fowler will be looking to add to their Ryder Cup experience by notching another few wins.

Europe are not favoured to win in France, but they might have a couple of aces up their sleeves. The two most recent French Open winners, Alex Noren and my old schoolmate Tommy Fleetwood are both among Europe's ranks for the competition in September. They both won the tournament at Le Golf National so if they can replicate their recent form once more they are going to be a match for anybody.

Last time, Europe team captain Darren Clarke had an inexperienced team that didn't put up much of a fight on American soil, losing the 2016 Ryder Cup 17-11 at Hazeltine National Golf Club.

They will hope that playing familiar ground will make them more competitive and, if Europe cannot secure a win, reducing the six-point deficit is something that must be accomplished. Europe team captain Thomas Bjørn added some experience with his wildcard picks, and one of the men expected to perform well is Mr Ryder Cup himself, Ian Poulter. As I mentioned earlier, Poulter may have flattered to deceive in major championships, but he would be arguably the first name

on any captain's Ryder Cup team sheet. There's no warrior you'd rather ride into battle flailing a titanium golf club than Poulter, who fires himself up into a new gear for his continent when the emotions and atmosphere kick in.

Bjørn has a total of four wildcard picks this year, so some of Europe's heroes from Ryder Cups gone by have been included in the team. Joining Poulter will be Paul Casey, Sergio Garcia and Henrik Stenson. While Bjørn hasn't necessarily picked the form players, he has picked those who he knows can be relied upon to be a match for anybody on their day.

The inclusion of Garcia was particularly controversial, with the Spaniard suffering something of an annus horribilis just a year on from the best season of his career, where he lifted the Masters. Many more in-form players were overlooked at his expense, so there will be considerable pressure on him to relinquish his somewhat unfortunate label as a nostalgia pick.

Europe's other picks include Open champion Francesco Molinari, newly-crowned World Number One Justin Rose, superstar Rory McIlroy and Jon Rahm. Thorbjorn Olesen snagged the last qualifying spot after his performance at the Made in Denmark tournament.

The USA's automatic positions are all wrapped up, so the only mystery surrounding their team was who the captain would pick as his wild cards. Like Bjørn, the US captain had four picks, and he didn't overlook golfing legends Tiger Woods and Phil Mickelson for two of those spots.

That left another two places open, and Furyk was always likely to go with the players who are on top form but missed out on the automatic spots.

Bryson DeChambeau agonisingly failed to qualify for his spot, but the US captain included him in the final line up anyway. As well as those mentioned, he will join Bubba Watson, Patrick Reed, Tony Finau and Webb Simpson. With only one rookie in their ranks (Thomas), it's hard to see where the USA's weaknesses are, but it's up to the Europeans to find and exploit them.

The American's are heavy favourites to lift the trophy once more and if they manage to put some daylight between themselves and Europe in the early stages it's hard to see anything but a US victory. If Europe are to win they must start strong and hope they can grind out a victory.

Of course, I shall be fervently cheering for Europe, but I sadly believe that the current roster of American golfers is ridiculously talented. On paper, they have arguably the strongest pool of players in history and I think they will win 15 $\frac{1}{2}$ - 12 $\frac{1}{2}$.

Luckily, sport isn't won on paper. And, perhaps more importantly, my predictions are usually terribly wrong.
