


T'S ONLY CRICKET!

HE most anticipated match of the International Cricket Council (ICC) World Cup 2019 between India and Pakistan attracted a global TV audience of one billion people and digitally united South Asian expats living in the kingdom.

Many settled in front of their smart phones, some waited for text messages and others gathered at expat clubs on Sunday as all eyes focused on the action staged at Manchester's Old Trafford Stadium in England.

As far as results go, since the start of the ICC World Cup, India had won all six previous World Cup matches against Pakistan and they did it again despite the rain trying to spoil play. Ramesh Swami, a 61-year old Indian flooring business manager based in Salmaniya, who watched the match at the Indian Club with friends and 'virtually' with his 91-year-old father back home in India, celebrated Father's Day with a mutual love of the game. "We had to share the moment and were speaking throughout the game," he explained.





It is estimated around 290,000 Indian expats call Bahrain their home and more than 100,000 Pakistani expats also live in the kingdom and.

most if not all followed the game as best they could on what was a normal work day here, rather than a day of leisure in Europe or back home

It's not known if any cricket-lovers from Bahrain

were lucky enough to secure any of 26,000 seats at the stadium. Tickets sold out within hours of going on sale, with some ardent followers reportedly paying almost BD2.000 for match and airplane tickets to attend from the region.

And, fans almost lost their investment as dark clouds loomed overhead, which could have forced a draw in a city renowned for its wet weather.

Both teams have been forced to accept draws earlier during this competition due to washed-out conditions – Pakistan in its match against Australia and India in its duel against New Zealand.

Ramesh called it the 'spoilsport' factor.

But the show went on, despite fits and starts due to showers, or fear thereof, with much fanfare and cheers drowning out the rotors of the helicopters summoned to dry out the pitch.

After losing the toss, India batted first, racking up 336 for 5 in 50 overs on a wet pitch – a record for a one-day international at Old Trafford.

Indian cricketer Rohit Sharma scored his second century of the World Cup and Captain Virat Kohli put up 77 runs before a caught ball led to a contentious call by the umpire and a potentially unnecessary walk-off by Kohli, which prompted calls on Twitter to reward him the Noble Peace Prize for not reacting.

Pakistan started its batting spell in the evening chasing a monumental target before rain stopped play again after 35 overs. Because of the late start to the match, the Duckworth-Lewis-Stern (DLS) method was employed to give them an adjusted target of 302 from 40 overs. This meant they had to score an insurmountable 136 runs in 5 overs, which they were unable to do, despite bold efforts by Fakhar Zaman and Imad Wasim. Pakistan was always behind the run-rate

So India extended its record to 7-0 against Pakistan at World Cups with an 89-run victory in an encounter that likely will remain the mostwatched game of the six-week tournament.

Pakistani expat, Sajid Butt, 49, an owner of an electronics business who lives in Manama, found the Pakistan team to be 'tense' and disagreed with the call to bowl first, agreeing with Pakistan Prime Minister Imran Khan's suggestion that setting a target by batting first would have been a smarter strategy.

India-Pakistan is not merely the biggest fixture in cricket; it has a fair claim to being the biggest in all of sport. The geographical proximity, sibling-like rivalry and occasional tensions between the two countries, always make this the loudest and most-watched match at the World Cup.

Fans of the underdog,
Pakistan, often go to exorbitant
ends to prepare for a victory,
no matter how far-fetched it
may seem. Some showed up
with a white horse on which
to ride away victorious,
while others prepare victory
parties with lots of fireworks
and festivities, which end up
happening anyways, albeit
with a more sombre tone.

The Pakistani fans in Bahrain

generally watched the match in their living rooms, while many Indian fans met at the Indian Club and other restaurants, some of which ran special promotions based around the match.

Despite the rivalry and historical tension between the countries, a love of cricket brings the communities together. Sajid emphasised that it was after all, just a game and gave the two communities a chance to bond over an exhilarating fixture.

Paul Culas, 44, who lives in Gufool, said that especially

when living away from home, cricket seems to connect the communities in a supportive and positive way.

S. Amjad Hussain, an emeritus professor of surgery and humanities at the University of Toledo, agrees.

Pakistan and India's cricket rivalry goes back to their independence in 1947. They have played cricket not as much for the sake of the game but to either redeem or enhance the national honour.

But it does not translate in animosity between the peoples of both countries, he said. "While on the cricket field the decidedly partisan crowd roots for their country's team, off the field the people are friendly and extremely hospitable to each other," added S. Amjad.

"In the past people from one country while visiting the other to watch a cricket match, were consistently received with open arms. "Cricket has also played an

important role in diffusing tensions between India and Pakistan. In 1987 the countries were on the verge of war that neither country wanted. Considering that both countries have nuclear weapons, it was important to defuse the situation

"India was poised to play Pakistan on home turf. The Pakistani strongman General Zia ul Haq seized the opportunity and let India know that he would like to visit India and watch the match. As a result the tensions eased and somehow cricket saved the day

"On another occasion in 2005 President Pervez Musharraf of Pakistan went to see the two countries play in India and the visit to see the match turned into a summit of sorts between the leaders of the two countries."

India and Pakistan appear to have been on war footing toward each other ever since their independence from Great Britain in 1947 and they have fought three inconclusive wars over the disputed northern Himalayan territory of Kashmir. But still they find cricket as a means to ratchet down tensions. One Indian supporter at the recent match in London sported a T-shirt that said that the 'Winner Takes Kashmir'.

For such an intense rivalry, it's still a lopsided contest when India and Pakistan meet at the Cricket World Cup. Since nothing has worked to resolve the festering Kashmir issue, S. Amjad suggested, perhaps they should bet Kashmir on their next encounter on the cricket field ... as long as it's not a World

It reveals that Bahrain has over decades built an insurance industry that is now comprised of around 100 regulated entities.

"The industry is highly saturated with relatively low levels of differentiation and digitalisation," said Khalid. "Compared to banking, the insurance industry continues to lag in terms of adopting the latest technologies and customer-centric approach.

"As InsurTech solutions emerges, it will dramatically transform the insurance industry. Such transformation will impact the value chain, enhance efficiencies and the customer experience, create new products, and redefine business models.

"With the rise of millennials and ever greater levels of technological advancement, adoption of and collaboration with InsurTechs will further support the industry to shift from a product-centric world to a customer-centric world. Additionally, this can support spreading further awareness of the insurance industry away from motor and health

and increase the overall insurance penetration rate.

"Through this report, we aim to shed light on the current status of digitalisation in Bahrain's insurance industry and explore how InsurTech can transform the industry and develop it further."

The use of smartphones and other digital devices enables companies to directly reach their customers, and for customers to directly contact their insurers. With a local smartphone penetration rate of 158 per cent, the insurance market in Bahrain can leverage this opportunity and increase their digital channels of communication with their customers.

This method of enhancing customer experience is adopted by 50 per cent of players in the local insurance market and by having a widespread use of mobile and online applications. Hence, insurers can unlock new revenue streams by exposing their products and services to the uninsured population who have access to internet.

With emerging technologies, new business

models are developed with customers being at the forefront of innovation.

One of the most popular business models on the rise is on-demand insurance. This model is specifically apparent in covering only those risks that arise within a certain event. Examples would be to activate travel insurance as soon as a flight is booked or to pay for car insurance based on its usage.

These advancements help insurers become more customer-focused and also focus on niches that were not covered before allowing for greater due diligence and risk profiling for policyholders.

And the next step will be digitally enabled operations and management. The application of AI and 'big data' within any organisation is highly useful in collecting data and analysing customer behaviour, the report points out. Instead of relying on historic generic data, insurers can collect real-time specific data on their customers.

Such data helps in providing insight on customers' interests and sentiment. The submitted data can further assist

insurers in tailoring their product offering and targetting to efficiently promote brand awareness and yield higher return on investment. The key areas of processing improvement could be found in risk profiling, claims processing, product offering, premium pricing, fraud detection, and underwriting. Thus, leading to an overall improvement in the delivery of insurance and management of its operations.

In conclusion, that given the low priority for digitalisation at the current stage of the insurance market, the report highlights that altered customer behaviour and expectations will drive the change toward digitalisation.

Customers will likely call for better digital experiences within the insurance market following their experience with alternative industries.

The report also highlights that the local insurance market can prospectively thrive and secure customer satisfaction with internal structural changes and the implementation of relevant modern technologies

across various stages of an insurance transaction.

The aim of the report is to both gain an understanding of the existing state of digitalisation in Bahrain's insurance market as well as the necessary steps that need to be implemented to accelerate the trend.

Moving forward, the intention behind the report is to provide a long-term reference for key stakeholders including local insurers, government entities and FinTechs to uncover the most suitable approach towards promoting digitalisation efforts in the market.

Some of the facts and figures presented have been extracted from the Central Bank of Bahrain's database, although the analysis of the report does not reflect the views or position of the CBB and was conducted independently by Roland Berger and Bahrain FinTech Bay.

Simultaneously, the report's primary source for data was a survey circulated among insurers in Bahrain.

The survey questions were broken down into key segments including organisational strategy and mind-set, customer journey and access to information and digitalisation efforts at different stages of operations, including quotation and claims management.

Following the distribution of the survey, the data was collected and analysed to provide further understanding on the current status of the market.

Additionally, the results were utilised to establish the path forward in regards to emerging growth drivers and opportunities. Recommendations were also built from the analysis to create a 'crucial framework' for varied stakeholders in the ecosystem to digest as a means of promoting the growth of digitalisation in the local insurance market.

All the Italian-style favourites, such as Margarita, colourful Veggie and Pepperoni are included in the choices, but the talking point has been the creation of two toppings only available at this venue

yeast-free pizzas.

The Kimchi features a spicy homemade sauce, fresh mozzarella and Kimchi, a staple in Korean cuisine made from salted and fermented vegetables, most commonly napa cabbage and Korean radishes

I have become a very big fan

of this offering which adds a delicate chili kick and a crunch to the pizza experience.

However, the big talking point is the Crust & Crema Special, served either spicy or non-spicy, featuring marinated beef. Just not any old marinated beef, marinated with a secret Woo recipe Divine texture and it's clear why it's Crust & Crema Seef's signature dish.

Known in Korea as 'bulgogi which in English means 'fire meat' which is a fair translation as these marinated slices of beef are grilled on a barbecue or on a stove-tor

griddle. Sirloin, rib eye or brisket are frequently used cuts of beef for the dish.

Another hot piece of conversation is the pizza oven itself which took the patience of a saint to arrive following broken part issues and transportation angst but now it's really cookin' in more ways than one.

The dull grey exterior was freshened up with a bright white splash of paint and video game fan Chorok decided to give it an added Italian flavour by introducing a touch of Super Mario

The games follow Mario's adventures, typically in the fictional Mushroom Kingdom with Mario as the player character. A Super Mushroom is a red mushroom that serves a particular function depending on the game so now the pizza oven has been painted to look like one and, of course, who doesn't like a slice of mushroom on a pizza?

The problem is, the sparkling pizza oven is now the hot topic of debate over whether it looks more like a ladybird than a mushroom. Readers. please note, ladybirds have black spots!

Either way, the pizzas delivered by Chef Roland Cahatian are outstanding with prices ranging from BD3.500 to BD4.900.

Famed for its in-house roasted coffee, breakfasts, cakes and gourmet desserts, Crust and Crema became a welcome addition to the culinary scene at Galleria Mall in Zinj in 2016.

Its original outlet in Saar closed as a result of parking, maintenance and operational issues and the fact that it was surrounded by shisha cafés.

The Woos went in search of new premises and were

delighted to find the answer to their dreams at the recentlybuilt Sanyan Residence in Seef. It is in such a superb spacious location boasting a mezzanine floor, plus easy parking outside and to get there you swing left at the lights, instead of right heading for the malls.

Another unique offering are bowls of Acai, a Brazilian super-food. Grown wild on the banks of the Amazon in abundance, farmers now sustainably harvest and sell it Fairtrade with no negative impacts on the environment.

Sold as a sorbet, it's bursting with antioxidants, and is also blended with fruit if preferred. One tropical bowl even comes with peanut butter, fruit and a hint of chocolate.

But the coffee reigns supreme, which started another debate on our table. Stan Jnr, who is used to drinking the bitter stuff from multi-national chain outlets, was convinced to try it without heaps of sugar. Sure enough, it was good enough with milk alone. A sweet lesson learned.

They reported in the Journal of Agriculture and Food Chemistry that they were surprised at results indicating the micro-greens contained four to 40 times more vitamins and carotenoids than their mature plant counterparts

Micro-greens are the culinary cousins of seed sprouts and baby greens, but differ from both.

Sprouts are the youngest of the seedling family, and the entire plant can be eaten, including shoots and roots, according to horticulturists. Popular seeds include sunflowers, lentils, peas mustards and alfalfa



The most popular microgreen flavours come from peas, carrots, broccoli, arugula, beets and mustards

Micro-greens are an easyto-grow, four-season indoor crop. They require just a few gardening tools - sanitised

trays, seed, a shallow growing media, heat mats if airconditioning is flowing inside and, lastly, sunny windows, no problem in Bahrain! It usually takes eight to 14 days for seedlings to be tableready after germination.

Some species, however, grow more quickly than others. Herbs such as parsley, sage, mustard, dill, basil and cilantro can take around three

And, they're a great environmentally-friendly talking point at dinner parties. Through things such as growing our own microgreens indoors or outdoors, we can mimic the actions of our ancestors who would have readily identified and eaten these greens as a part of their daily diets.

Gotta catch 'em all

ETECTIVE Pikachu is a perfect homage to Robert Zemeckis's classic Who Framed Roger Rabbit? set in a Blade Runner style neo-noir experimental world where Ryan Reynolds brings his Deadpoolesque persona with comic timing and punchlines.

The global phenomenon, which ran its 20th TV anime season and the widely-popular augmented reality mobile game *Pokémon Go*, now has a live action film to add to its vast repertoire.

Based on the 2016 Nintendo game of the same name, the first live-action Pokémon movie turns out to be better-than-average in the video game adaptation genre.

Justice Smith stars as Tim Goodman, a nerdy 21-year-old son of a private investigator who sets out to crack the case of his father's mysterious car accident with the help of his dad's former Pokémon partner, Detective Pikachu

Pikachu, voiced by Ryan Reynolds, is a hilariously wise-cracking adorable furry yellow little creature.

Finding that Tim is the only person to hear Pikachu, they chase clues together through the dark underbelly of Ryme City, a metropolis where humans and Pokémon live side-by-side.

Howard Clifford (Bill Nighy) is the visionary icon behind this model city of human-Pokémon cohabitation. Police Lieutenant Hide Yoshida (Ken Watanabe) has Pokémon partner,

grumpy dog Snubbull and junior reporter Lucy Stevens (Kathryn Newton) has Psyduck, who must be kept calm at all times with spa music and foot massages.

There are plenty other monsters who helped Ryme City work like Mr. Mime, Snorlax, Pancham, Pangoro, Emolga, Rufflet, Sneasel, Doduo, Arcanine, Growlithe, Purrloin, Golurk, Joltik, Totodile, Audino, Golem, Comfey, Kingler, as well as legendary Mewtwo.

Human characters and human elements were rather bland in comparison!

Rob Letterman, who has directed entertaining films like Shark Tale, Monsters vs. Aliens and Goosebumps, was certainly the right choice for the film. Cinematographer John Mathieson (Gladiator) made sure there is an incredible amount of colour and the setting should look like Blade Runner with its massive skyscrapers with colourful billboards

The film's main location, Ryme City, is well realised – it looks like a combination of London's shiny skyline and Tokyo's smoky streets. The movie has some brilliant shots on location in downtown London and in the Scottish Highlands

The best thing about the film, however, is the relation between Pikachu and Tim Goodman. Ryan Reynolds delivers his cutest performance possible with Pikachu. Justice Smith, too, has an endearing performance – from being a socially awkward guy, the only person without a Pokémon partner in the city to develop a heartfelt father-and-son bonding.

This is not a story based on the traditional catching and battling of Pokémon. The director promised a fantasy vision but it comes in small doses in shallow, CGI-heavy noise.

Letterman, along with three credited screenwriters Dan Hernandez, Benji Samit and Derek Connolly tend to rely on CGI sequences and expositoryheavy flashbacks delivered through a hologram technology.

The mixed-genre of the film created yet another world that welcomes everyone into its embrace, from the 90s kids to the children who will be exposed to Pokémon for the first time. For non-Pokémon fans, Ryan Reynolds is the saving grace.

VITAMIN D is very important for overall health and wellbeing. A major source of vitamin D comes from exposure to sunlight. However, with fear of skin cancers in the last decade, people have significantly cut their sun exposure and, with the use of sun screens, have dramatically reduced the vitamin D levels leading to major health problems

The evidence concerning skin cancer relates to excessive unprotected sun exposure and not to moderate exposure to the sun in the early morning, or late afternoon, away from midday - the peak time for harmful ultraviolet rays.

There is now substantial evidence of a high rate of vitamin D deficiency in our region, reaching more than 90 per cent of young women and to a lesser extent among males. This leads to an increased risk of bone disorders like rickets in children (bowing of the bone and disrupted bone growth leading to deformities), osteomalacia (softening of the bone) and osteoporosis in adults.

Moreover, there is evidence of increase pain suffered by osteoarthritis patients with low vitamin D status and a lesser response to rheumatoid arthritis treatment

There is also strong evidence of an increased association with diabetes, thyroid disorders, neurological diseases like multiple sclerosis, other autoimmune disorders like rheumatoid arthritis, inflammatory bowel diseases, and even certain kinds of cancers are more among those with low levels (non-skeletal effects of low vitamin D).

Cancers of the colon, prostate, breast and ovary have been linked to low levels of vitamin D.

There has also been evidence of increased heart disease in large scale studies, hypertension and stroke. Moreover, another study confirmed increased artery diseases of the extremities.

Age-related memory problems have been linked to lower vitamin D levels as well as poor mental health and symptoms of seasonal affective disorder, premenstrual syndrome and depression

It is almost impossible to consume adequate vitamin D through diet alone; while supplements are an important alternative, most people still don't get the recommended amount

We must dispel the myth that women with osteoporosis living in sunnier latitudes do not have to worry about vitamin D.

THERE has been a lot of waste in the media recently, of Ramadan, an issue which



this problem, and how can Bahrain follow suit?

In South Korea, the government in 2005 banned food waste from reaching landfills and today 90 per cent of food waste in Korea is recycled. It is repurposed as either biofuel (obtained from the liquid squeezed

out of the food waste) or as animal feed.

The citizens of Korea are made to pay for the food waste they produce, by placing it in prepaid preweighed bags, or in some states, having an automated e-bin to calculate how much they need to pay based on how much food waste they throw out.

Looking to another country. France in 2016 introduced a new law that prohibits grocery stores from throwing



away unsold food, which is instead donated to charities in need. What's more, lessons on agriculture and food sustainability form part of school curricula, and certain companies have to report on the amount of food they waste on a monthly basis

Such initiatives have not been in vain. South Korea was able to reduce food waste from 5.1 million tons in 2008 to 4.82 million tons in 2014, and France in 2017 bagged first place in the Food Sustainability Index, which ranks around 67 countries on food sustainability.

A more individualistic alternative would mean following in the footsteps of Bea Johnson and Lauren Singer, two environmentalists who challenge themselves daily to live without generating any rubbish, including food waste.

But when it comes to environmental concerns. while some may argue that intervention on the part of the government isn't necessary provided we all do our part, I think that more significant strides can only be achieved if legislature is involved.
















Just a bump in the road

Patrick Mallejacq, Secretary General, PIARC World Road Association looks ahead to the 26th World

Road Congress in the Gulf region this October and examines one of the key topics up for discussion whether transport authorities around the world are ready for the advent of driverless cars.

RIVERLESS cars look set to be the future. For a few years now, the technology has been making headlines around the world as we grapple with what this newest innovation will mean for our everyday lives.

We are right to be excited. Driverless cars represent a significant shift in how we will come to rely on transport in the future. Already in many developed economies we are seeing the diminishing ownership of vehicles, with more and more people relying on on-demand transport services like taxis, ride-hail services or public transport.

What is less clear though is the impact this will have on our roads, what infrastructure driverless cars will rely on to make their technology work and what countries around the world may need to do to make a future of autonomous vehicles a reality.

Take white road markings for example. Driverless cars use these to help guide themselves - and in a lab or controlled environment this works well. But the real world is very different. In certain parts of Europe road maintenance budgets just haven't kept up with the levels of demand and white markings are not that easy to distinguish.

This is just one example. Road signs are another. Driverless cars will have to be programmed to read particular types of road signs – but which ones? These are the sorts of decisions that need to be made now, as equipment like this can be

expensive, and in many cases road administrations will not be able to fund them.

Manufacturers of driverless cars rely on the basic road infrastructure to be in place to be able to operate their vehicles. They also expect the infrastructure to be in a good state of repair, since even autonomous vehicles will be affected by down-to-earth potholes. But planning infrastructure takes vears and

then developing it takes years too. And, when it's there, its design can't be easily changed.

So, it is a matter of planning. Planning has always involved strategiclevel decisions but now the conversation could become really complex with many different factors.

The learning is clear. To get driverless cars on the road we need to bring together road authorities, manufacturers, technology companies and other experts to begin planning for a future where driverless cars are part of our everyday lives.

That is why, every four years, we hold the PIARC World Road Congress bringing together thousands of the world's foremost experts in road infrastructure, transport and technology.

Organised by the World



Department of Transport (DoT), the next World Road Congress will be held in October with more than 5,000 delegates from 120 countries and at least 40 government ministers expected to attend.

The congress is where we continue these discussions. One of our taskforces is

ontinue these discussions. One of our taskforces is looking specifically at the possible infrastructure implications of driverless cars on roads around the world. They are working on their report, to be called 'Autonomous vehicles, challenges and opportunities for road authorities' and will present it at the event.

The fact this has been identified as a priority topic for discussion speaks volumes as to how important road authorities consider the challenge – and opportunity – of driverless cars.

It is an exciting future. Many countries, such as the UAE, are leading the way in the quality of their road infrastructure and are well placed for the advent of driverless cars. The aim of the congress is to share learnings between countries and make the future a reality more quickly.

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Bring on the old school ride

REIGNING champion Lewis Hamilton believes returning to an old-school style of racing would solve Formula One's ongoing problem with parity.

The four-time world champ and current leader in the standings said the vast separation between the top teams and the lower teams is hurting the sport. Mercedes has won all seven races this season.

F1 carved its reputation in decades of daredevil acts and used to be famed for such high-speed drama but at the Canadian Grand Prix it was deemed acceptable to fine Ferrari driver Sebastian Vettel for an unsafe re-entry back onto the track stripping him of a much-needed win.

As reported last week, the Montreal crowd watched in amazement as Vettel theatrically grabbed the big No. 1 sign parked in front of race winner Hamilton's car and moved it to where his should have been in the empty No. 2 slot. Then Vettel

did the opposite with the No. 2 sign, hauling it over and dramatically plonking it in front of Hamilton's car

"People do continue to comment that it's boring," Hamilton said of the inequality between teams.
"Ferrari wins for a period
of time, McLaren wins for
a period of time, Mercedes,
Red Bull. How you stop that?

"If I had a choice, I would go back to V12, naturallyaspirated engines, manual gear boxes. I would make it harder for the drivers. Take away all these big runoff areas that you have everywhere. You should not have steering assist. Or if you have steering assist, you have to keep it low. I like having it low so it's harder for me."

"You should be physically exhausted after a race," he added. "It should be so exhausting, like a marathon. I could probably do two or three races in a row, and Formula One should not be like that."

The disparity between teams goes well beyond this year. Mercedes has won the last five F1 championships while Red Bull won the previous four.

Racing Point driver Lance Stroll echoed Hamilton's sentiments. "Look at the NHL, the NFL, the NBA, the teams are so close," the 20-year-old told reporters. "That's because it's capped properly, it's managed properly. That allows for exciting competitions. It would be great to see the same thing in Formula One. Instead of two seconds between the field, it comes down to tenths. That would really spice things up."

Stroll is one of the drivers usually stuck in the middle of the pack, well behind Mercedes, Ferrari and Red Bull. He finished ninth in the last race.

in the team's fortunes as they became one of the strongest outfits in the region.

Despite being ravaged by four season-ending injuries early on, Tonkin guided Bahrain to third place in the West Asia Premiership, before narrowly being defeated by Abu Dhabi Harlequins in the play-off final in his first season

The year after, the 36-yearold again guided the kingdom to third place in the Premiership but this time the men in red defeated Dubai Exiles to claim the West Asia Cup.

However, it is the legendary 2018-19 season which the friendly giant - whose coaching career began as the head coach at Carmarthen Quins RFC and Pontypool RFC before becoming the head of rugby at Cardiff University - will be remembered for long after he's gone.

The season started in style

back in September as they claimed the Asia Rugby Western Clubs Champions League by defeating the Abu Dhabi Harlequins in front of the famous 'Red Wall'

The team then dominated the Premiership by winning 14 of 15 games before a nervy, narrow victory over Dubai Exiles in the West Asia Cup saw them claim a hattrick and prove themselves as the dominant force in the continent's western region.

It's a tough act to follow for the next man in charge, but the process is already underway with the rugby club's committee and Tonkin himself overseeing applicants and conducting interviews.

Rugby club chairman Mike Cunningham lavished praised on Tonkin whilst assuring fans that the club's success will not stop with his departure.

"In the three years since he's been here, Tonkin has been the driving force behind the resurgence of rugby in Bahrain," he explained.

"Not only has he reversed the fortunes of the first team, but the select team as well and has been essential in keeping the second-tier Gulf Conference going and giving fringe players regular experience and game time.

"He's well-liked and respected as a coach by all the members, players and management team. We're hugely disappointed to lose him, but we're also extremely happy and proud that he's gone to such a big role. He deserves it.

"As for what's next ... we've had interest from a number of high calibre coaches and we brought one out last week to have a look at the club and another is coming next week, whilst we've held a number of *Skype* interviews.

"No decision has been made yet and we are keeping candidates confidential, but rest assured that we want to get someone in as soon as possible to organise and prepare for the defence of our crowns."

A nation to nation debacle

PORT never stops. For many amateur players their preferred game will take a seasonal break, but for those who love to watch, there is always something on, always a score to check, highlights to watch and opinions to express.

The summer period is often a time for some of the biggest sporting events, namely World Cups and the Olympics and over the last week we've been able to feast our eyes on both the cricket and women's football fiestas.

The biggest sporting events attract the biggest viewing figures. Personally, I want to see the best versus the best – athletes performing at the peak of their powers competing against each other on the biggest stage.

Mo Farah has won many races, he has probably tripped over in many too, but as a viewer I will always



remember his tumble in Rio, to do it on that stage against elite runners, to get back up and still win, it almost had a kind of magic to it.

For athletes too, representing a nation in a sports biggest event is the pinnacle of their careers and fulfilling a childhood dream.

So why do we routinely deny elite athletes the chance to perform on the biggest stage with overly strict registration rules?

One full international appearance, for example, and that's it, you can't represent anyone else.

Last year, in my role as a Juventus Bahrain Academy coach, I was fortunate enough to meet Estelle Johnson, a professional footballer in the US.

We talked about her career

and her highlights. She was extremely grateful for the opportunities football had given her but she didn't hide there was one thing she still wanted ... the chance of appearing on the international stage. Specifically, it would be a dream to make a World Cup appearance.

Fast forward 12 months, I see her again, this time on TV donning a Cameroon shirt for their opening World Cup fixture.

I then thought back to another point of our conversation. Estelle came close to the US squad on a few occasions. I imagined an alternate reality where 10 years prior, an injury-hit US national team coach puts young Estelle on for the final 15 minutes of a qualifier

against Aruba and that is all that her international career amounts to.

Cameroon would miss out on a player that would have improved their squad. Estelle would miss out on playing at a World Cup and both the viewers and the tournament would therefore miss out on seeing Cameroon at her best. The absurdity of this goes even deeper.

Denmark, Hong Kong and Peru are just three of the 25 different foreign countries English cricketers have been born in. If you're interested in knowing the others a quick internet search will provide you with the answers. In fact, current England captain Eoin Morgan is an Irishman by birth and there are no issues with him representing England, nor should there be.

If England were to deselect him though, why should there be an issue with him playing for Ireland?

If he was suddenly not good enough for England it would not affect their team selection but would, however, potentially raise the standard for Ireland and, therefore, the standard of competition overall.

The current system forces teenagers to make decisions that will affect them for the rest of their career, with no real way of being able to predict the hurdles they may face. It also allows the biggest and the best nations at the time to hoard young talent, weakening other nations who could have otherwise utilised their abilities, if not now, at a later date.

For Sevilla FC forward, Munir El Haddadi, this is his reality. Aged 18 and a 13-minute cameo appearance against Macedonia for Spain in 2014 means that his international career is almost certainly over at the tender age of 22

Had he not played, he would also be eligible for Morocco and would almost certainly have been a starter for them in the 2018 World Cup.

He appealed to FIFA and

the footballing body rejected the plea. He appealed to the Court of Arbitration for Sport (CAS), which upheld FIFA's ruling.

Who does this benefit? It isn't Morocco, it isn't Munir, it isn't Morocco, it isn't Munir, it isn't the fan in the stadium or the TV viewer, or the competition itself. Vincente Del Bosque, Spain's manager at the time, even said that he is 'sorry' and feels responsible for the situation.

As an amateur in my seasonal break I look at this and think to myself; why don't they do what we do?

Every year, we effectively become free agents, reregistering for our teams or finding new ones, as long as we are eligible to play, we can sign the form and be good to go.

At the start of every international tournament cycle be it the Olympics or World Cup, athletes could register with whichever eligible nation they choose, free agents can be added at any point and you can have as many athletes registered as you want.

From the start of qualifying to the end of the tournament you can only register with one nation. An athlete will likely get perhaps three or four chances during their career to be a part of the biggest sporting event. So, like in the unfortunate case of Munir, no athlete would miss out on a whole international career due to a 13 minutes appearance as a teen.

Prior to the start of every qualifying would be the international transfer window.

I understand that my solution may appear overly simplistic but with so many great minds (and so many more great bank accounts) in sport, surely there has to be a better way.

The historic win made the players national heroes instantly, receiving plaudits from the masses - everyone from PM Justin Trudeau to rapper Drake.

Disappointment for the Warriors in their last ever home game at the Oracle Arena, 47 years after they played their first, but an achievement that is still being celebrated in Toronto.
