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# Green rescue act

NIMAL welfare champions are hoping to clean up on vet bills thanks to a unique green partnership involving a recycling initiative.

The cash-strapped Bahrain Rescues shelter in the Southern Governorate has collaborated with a hygiene and cleaning service company in a scrap metal fund-raising partnership.

The eBin Company reached out to the non-profit rescue organisation that is run by around 15 volunteers, of which three are full-time, to support them as the costs of treating injured abandoned pets continue to mount up.

"Although we are paying off a big chunk of our bills on a weekly basis, there are constantly mistreated animals finding their way to us and we simply can't turn them away," said Mojda Banahi, the group's public relations representative and spokesman.

"We have tried to minimise our invoices as much as possible but we can't ignore an emergency and even if we manage to pay some of the costs, the bills continue to pile up.

"Hopefully, the funding raised by this initiative will help cover the medical bills for injured animals as well as allow us to purchase food for the animals under our care.

"Currently we have about BD1,800 to pay off at one clinic and around BD400 to another. And, we still have to find the rent money to pay, as

"We hope this campaign will help raise awareness about our struggle, raise funds for our fur babies and also help the environment through recycling metal scraps."

The shelter and recycling company are spreading the word to construction companies, waste management concerns, compounds and other corporations to spare a minimum of one tonne of scrap metal to them and in return eBin will donate the value of that soon-to-be recycled metal to Bahrain Rescues.

abandoned animals for the past four years, including birds, cats and dogs, rabbits and turtles.

"I do need to point out because this is a common misconception – we are not rescuing strays," added Mojda. "We rescue animals that have been injured and are in mortal danger. "Many are domesticated

pets that have been abandoned, thrown out or their owners simply lost interest in them. There are a lot of people who buy pets or breed them and then just cannot commit to them, especially if an animal loses its purpose or becomes a financial strain.

"The animals then get dumped on the streets to fend for themselves and because of their domestic upbringing; they do not know how to survive on their own.

"My message would be that if you can't care for an animal or are willing to take that animal in for the next 15 years of its life, or are ready to pay for any kind of medical issue it might face, you should absolutely NOT get an animal.

"You can volunteer at shelters and support people that do rescue animals instead because we struggle a lot with this kind of issue. And, the more that we feed this profit hungry machine, the more that these poor animals will suffer. So unless you are willing to make this a lifetime commitment, please do not get a pet – help us help these animals instead!"

And once Covid-19 restrictions have eased and people are able to be out and about, Mojda hopes they will stop by the visitorfriendly shelter and give the rescues some much needed TLC too.

"Our aim is to make Bahrain Rescues a home for people that love animals and for those that want to learn more about them," Mojda added.

### Catch 'em you UN

SPIRING young Bahraini artists are being given the chance to sharpen their digital art skills by experts in the field, for free, as part of an initiative.

The US Embassy has teamed up with Cartoon Planet, an animation and graphic design studio based in Al Janabiya, to launch the Artists for a Cause programme.

It aims to support the kingdom's talented teenagers and adults aged from 15 to 25, from various charity and philanthropic societies, who want to pursue a career in digital arts.

The programme was conceptualised by digital artist and creative director of Cartoon Planet Mohamed Almahdi, who was supported in the past by the US Embassy when he attended a workshop at the Centre for Cartoon Studies. There he





met well-known cartoonist Josh Neufeld with whom he worked on a graphic novel in 2013.

"I conceptualised Artists for a Cause because I wanted to give Bahraini youth the chance to learn and develop their digital art skills by



introducing free workshops taught by both American experts and local artists," he said.

"The goal is to make it more feasible for creative Bahraini youth to fulfill their treasured dreams and allow them to learn skills that will help the

community and assist them in pursuing their desired career." The programme kicked off

on Sunday in the presence of Dr Shaikha Rania bint Ali Al Khalifa, secretary general of Alia Centre for Early Intervention, in addition to Ethan Goldrich, the Chargé d'Affaires at the United States Embassy in Bahrain.

the programme will create synergies between those who support the cause of art and those in need.

"It gives the youth a chance to co-operate with others in giving back to the community," added the representative.

"It also cultivates a generation of professionally



charities, orphanages and societies including Al Kawther Society for Orphan Care, AIESEC in Bahrain, Bahrain Society for Sickle Cell Disease Patients, Ayadi Relief, Bahrain Society for Children with Behavioural and Communication Difficulties, Fazat Shabab, and the Bahrain Philanthropic Society.

The workshops will teach basic and advanced skills in graphic design, 2D animation, cinematography, voice acting and more. Participants will learn about Adobe Illustrator, Photoshop and Animate. The classes will be





conducted by Paul, who is a two-time Eisner-award winner, Elliot Cowan, who is a 2D animation academic. Denis St John of Peanuts Studio which is home to Snoopy, as well as Andy Warner, Kimberly Schmidt, and others.

The best 12 works of art created during the workshops will be published in a 2022 table calendar -500 copies of which will be distributed to societies and youths taking part in the programme.

Participants will also receive digital attendance certificates as a token of appreciation.

BABY born with a painful internal health problem has been successfully treated at a leading Bahrain facility.

Baby Hala Majeed Alsadiq started showing symptoms resembling constipation shortly after birth but the restricted bowel movement proved to be much more serious.

Under the expert care of Royal Hospital for Women and Children (RHWC) paediatric gastroenterologist Dr Suhail Shabib, she was diagnosed as suffering from anal stenosis, a condition where the child is born with a narrow anal passage.

A three-hour long surgical procedure was performed at the RHWC bringing an end to the family's nightmare having previously being wrongly advised by friends to treat her condition as constipation.

"When I examined her, she had recto-perineal fistula which is one of the anorectal malformations in children where the rectum and anal



area are not well developed," explained Dr Shabib. "We started her on dilatation and washout for one month then she had an examination under anaesthesia to locate the sphincter - a circular muscle that normally maintains constriction of a natural body passage.

"The fistula opening was outside the sphincter and that indicates the need for surgical correction." During the operation, medics reconstructed the baby's rectum and anal area successfully. "She had a smooth recovery and she started passing stools normally just a few hours after surgery," added Dr Shabib.

"She completed her hospital course and was discharged home and she now has normal bowel movements, four to five times daily, with no difficulty." RHWC Paediatric Surgery Consultant Dr Hussein Ahmed Hamdy said that constipation in children was a common problem that can often be managed with dietary modification and medications but it could also be a 'complicated problem needing surgical intervention'. "A detailed history and

a physical examination are the key to diagnosing the underlying cause of



constipation and directs the management of the condition," he explained. "We always encourage parents to seek medical advice if their child is constipated.

"It could be also due to a surgical problem which can be corrected giving the child a normal lifestyle.

"Always make sure to give a detailed history and have your child examined by an experienced doctor."

The RHWC boasts one of the most advanced neonatal intensive care units in the kingdom and has been offering a comprehensive range of clinical services exclusively for women



and children since its inauguration in 2019.

The 10,000sqm facility features 65 inpatient beds, three operating theatres, three high-dependency rooms, four labour and delivery rooms and four day-care or minor procedure rooms.

The hospital also offers an extensive range of services including antenatal and a well woman clinic, gynecology, family medicine, endoscopy, gastroenterology for children and adults, bone densitometry, cosmetology, minimal invasive and bariatric surgery, fertility clinic (IVF) and a round-theclock emergency unit.

Gary Manalo uses cubism to depict everything from the kingdom's fish vendors to his son's aquaculture inklings, but his childhood artistic memories are coloured in gray just like his earliest pieces, using charcoal from the streets of Calbayog, Philippines.

"I experienced poverty early in life which pushed me to find creative ways to fund my artistic journey," the 43-year-old father-of-two





told GulfWeekly.sup"I would often take part in<br/>competitions with the goal<br/>of winning, because that waschi<br/>my

supplies. I used charcoal in crafting my art when I was a child, and when I took part in my first competition, I only had one pencil brush and a borrowed watercolour kit.

"My classmates' renditions were much brighter because they could afford higher quality materials, but the judges were impressed with my technique."

Gary did not win that competition, but it encouraged him to keep going. And he soon went on to win a number of regional and national level competitions, using each event to further refine his technique.

"Raul Isidro, one of my mentors, used to say, 'Pinta lang ng pinta,' which means you can only be a painter if you keep painting. This has driven me to continue creating art, no matter what else life threw my way."

And life certainly did throw its fair bit at Gary. When he finished high school, he wanted to become an architect, but was unable to find a programme he could afford. Instead he took up General Drafting at Northwest Samar State University, but on the side, kept attending art seminars and workshops, as well as participating in competitions.

It was at one of these workshops, at the cultural centre in Calbayog city in Philippines in 1991, that he discovered cubism.

It was a turning point. Cubism is an early-1900s avant-garde art revolution in Europe, in which objects are analysed, broken down and reassembled in an abstract form, depicting the subject from a multitude of viewpoints to represent it in a greater context. "In addition to Pablo Picasso, the father of cubism, I was fascinated by Filipino national artists like Ang Kiukok, Vicente Manansala, Botong Francisco, Legaspi, Malang and Raul Isidro," he said.

"To this day, I am fascinated by their styles and techniques especially the colour rendition, shapes, lines, figures and abstract forms.

"I am still working on my own signature approach to cubism, but I like to balance my composition and colour rendition. I use strong colours to visualise my life on the

# F1 plot thickens



**S** UNDAY'S Formula 1 Grand Prix in France was the definitive sign that the championship pendulum this year is swinging away from the Silver Arrows in favour of its new mistress, the Red Bulls.

Max Verstappen took pole and then snatched back first place in Lap 52 of a nail-biting race, also taking the fastest lap to solidify his lead over last year's champion Lewis Hamilton of Mercedes.

Behind Hamilton were, in order, Sergio Perez (Red Bull), Valtteri Bottas (Mercedes), Lando Norris (McLaren), Daniel Ricciardo (McLaren), Pierre Gasly (AlphaTauri), Fernando Alonso (Alpine), Sebastian Vettel (Aston Martin) and Lance Stroll (Aston Martin).

While the highlights of what might have been possibly the most exciting race of the season so far are widely available online, there are three key takeaways from this race that are sure to have implications throughout the rest of the year.

**\* It's audition season!** While a number of multiyear contracts have already been announced including Norris and Esteban Ocon (Alpine), it's the older drivers that are under pressure to perform in the



next two races leading up to Silverstone.

Rumours have already been circulating of George Russell being called up to the partner seat at Mercedes, indicating a possible exit of Bottas, either to Williams or out of F1 altogether.

This weekend's stellar performance from the Finn is proof enough that he does not intend to take this lying down.

Last weekend, Bottas also seemingly changed pace from his usual second-fiddle act, calling out the team for their short-sighted strategy as they went for a tested single pit-stop strategy instead of going for two, like the Red Bulls.

Despite performing better than he has all season, he called it 'a disappointing race', indicating that he knows he will have to do better to outshine Mercedes team principal's new favourite kid-on-the-block Russell.

**\*** Team cohesion is key One of the longest-running debates in F1 is whether teams should employ twodriver strategies or the more typical primary-support tactic.

While egalitarians will argue for the former, history has shown that this ends up being counterproductive as intrateam rivalries spill over on to the standings, typically damaging both drivers. That being said, Red Bull

especially has had a tenuous history with its circuit companions for Verstappen, their golden pony boy. Alex Albon and Pierre Gasly can both tell you about their experience trying to get even half the attention and support that the dastardly Dutchman seems to demand.

This year, however, Perez seems to have come in after earning the team's respect and is so far being utilised just as effectively as his team mate on and off the track. Even Aston Martin, notoriously owned by Stroll's dad, has been equitable with its strategy, giving both Vettel and Stroll chances to shine. And as a result, both drivers seem to be the better for it – best put in the words of Aston Martin team principal Otmar Szafnauer after Sunday's race, "Both of them drove supremely disciplined races to deliver a double-points finish at Paul Ricard today."

While competition between drivers can be good as in the case of McLaren, the top and bottom teams, Mercedes and Haas, have struggled with increasing friction between drivers as the stakes get higher.

McLaren has somehow been able to balance goodnatured competition between the drivers while nurturing their golden boy, Norris.

#### \* Devilish details

The finest details from pit stop lengths to tyre pressures are proving ever crucial this year, as drivers are winning by razor-thin margins – in fact, no driver has won by more than 29.148 seconds this year, and the closest win was by a mere 0.745 seconds in Bahrain.

Even a few extra tenths of a second in the pits can end up costing precious points, with overtaking getting more and more challenging especially on the European circuits.

The FIA is also closely monitoring these races, policing everything from tyre-change strategies to rule-skirting technologies, like Mercedes' Dual Axis Steering.

Every year, the FIA stewards' office becomes the off-track battleground as team principals keep up their steady stream of complaints to put rivals off their game, and this year, drivers also have stepped in.

Hamilton, last week, accused the Red Bulls of playing with their tyre pressures during Qualification, leading to a rule change after both Stroll and Verstappen's tyres went kaput on the track.

As the season heats up, so will the off-track snitching strategy, which will definitely make for an interesting, albeit mostly inaccurate, season 4 of *Drive* to Survive.

The Steiermark Grand Prix is next on the calendar, running this weekend at the Red Bull Ring in Austria.







Raring to g



THE kingdom's heavyweight hopeful Danis Latypov has spent the past two months in the UK sparring alongside Great Britain's Olympians in preparation for the Tokyo Olympics next month ... and he is not planning on pulling any punches until he wins gold.

The 30-year-old boxer has been dreaming about bringing home an Olympic medal since he was a schoolboy and hopes all his hard work – with Bahrain's national boxing coach Tony Davis by his side – will bring success and inspire young Bahrainis to take up the sport.

"I have dreamt about this my whole life," said Latypov, who followed in his father's and brothers' boxing footsteps. "At the moment, the Olympics are all I have in my head and my aim is to put on some beautiful boxing in the ring and win gold!

"I hope that by winning a medal I will inspire the youth of Bahrain to play more sports and understand that discipline, hard work and patience pays dividends in all aspects of life.

"For me it has led to the Olympic Games and the chance to turn my dream into reality."

Davis has been delighted with Latypov's work ethic, desire and confidence and hopes his coaching experience can help mold his fighter into reaching his full potential.

"It is a marvellous achievement, not only for Danis but for me too," admitted Davis.

"I thought I had given up that dream of coaching an Olympic contender when



I left Great Britain (GB) Boxing. However, I have been able to utilise my experience and leadership to guide Bahrain to the Olympic Games and create history. It really is Guinness Book of Records stuff!

"These Games will be different with many more millions of people tuning in to watch and, hopefully, this will inspire many more children to take up sport, especially boxing within the Kingdom of Bahrain and, more widely, across the GCC.

"Bahrain will be the only country to represent boxing from the GCC and we are the newest country to international boxing."

Latypov has been training at Davis' former stronghold - GB Boxing in Sheffield - at the English Institute of Sport. GB Boxing was established in 2008 to manage the World Class Performance Programme (WCPP) for boxing in a bid to train and develop the best male and female boxers from England, Scotland and Wales for major international tournaments and the Olympic Games. During the GB Boxing

Camp, not only did Latypov train alongside GB Olympians but also with the current heavyweight champion of the world Anthony Joshua, who Latypov described as a 'very friendly and humble person'. He also has been sharing his journey @danisboxing001 on *Instagram*, describing training with Joshua as the best and most motivational experience of his life. Latypov also applauded the camp on its gym facilities

and the coaching staff. Davis was also impressed with Latypov's training and progress.

The former England international boxer and onetime army boxing team head trainer, said: "We have been able to maximise all elements along with video analysis of potential opponents at the coming Olympic Games. "We will move to Dubai

tomorrow to carry out our final preparation camp that has been prepared by my former team mate and now World Boxing Council (WBC) president of the Middle East, Amir Khan. "The aim is to medal,

although it will be very tough as we will be facing the very best boxers in the world, however, we have been able to carry out great preparation.

"This would not be possible without the support of the president of the Bahrain Olympic Committee Shaikh Khalid bin Hamad Al Khalifa, president of the Bahrain Combat Sports Council Shaikh Salman bin Mohammed Al Khalifa and the Bahrain Olympic Committee.

"In a little more than two years we have managed to implement boxing along with a coaching and officiating structure and become the leading force within the GCC.

"Sport is about changing people's lives and, hopefully, we can bring that to reality next month. However, we have gained lifelong memories already within the sport, especially training with the heavyweight champion of the world, for example. "Nothing is impossible!"
