Top of the world!



HE kingdom's newly-crowned Miss Universe Evlin Khalifa aims to inspire and influence Bahraini women in a bid to see more Arab representation globally, as well as to make a difference in other people's lives.

The 24-year-old multitalented model had captured the hearts of a nine-strong star-studded panel of judges with her charisma, communication skills and campaigning passions, while competing against six other fabulous Bahraini finalists including Ghadeer AlShayeb, Maya Malalla, Lujane Yacoub, Maryam Naji, Shereen Ahmed and Maria Malalla in the second edition of the beauty pageant.

"It is a big blessing and this is definitely the happiest moment in my life," said a thrilled Evlin.

The Bahraini-Russian had topped the selection process, which featured a series of activities staged by the Miss Universe Bahrain organisation, led by Dubaibased Yugen Group of Companies and presented in an eight-part YouTube series called Purpose.

The finalists, who were shortlisted from more than 300 Bahraini applicants aged between 18 and 28, took part in a number of workshops and photoshoots, which included a trip to Dubai.

you think a woman becomes empowered', had wowed the committee that sealed her roval fate.



"As cliché as it sounds, with great power comes great responsibility," she said. "Now that I have a platform, I plan to use it to inspire and influence Bahraini women and to be their voice.

"I love my country and my people and my dream is to make them proud to the best of my abilities. My goal is to be purposeful and now that I have the title of Miss Universe Bahrain, I feel like I am where I'm meant to be - it was a long way but my dream finally came true."

Her first Miss Universe inspiration was Pia

Wurtzbach from the Philippines who won the crown in 2015. It was the Philippines' first victory in 42 years and the third victory of the country in the pageant's history.

"I really admired her, not just for her beauty, but her passion and intelligence," said Evlin. "I think at that moment, the whole world knew and admired her the same way that I did - so I thought why can't Arab women have a representation on an international level such as Miss Universe?

"Then, last year, history was made when Manar Jess

Deyani was crowned the firstever Miss Universe Bahrain to compete in the 70-year history of Miss Universe.

"I felt so proud that finally Bahraini women have a platform to showcase our culture, our country and our people. At that same moment, I thought about representing my country too and here I am now, where I am supposed to be."

The 26-year-old Manar Jess Deyani, who is a fashion designer from Riffa, promoted inclusivity, raised awareness about mental health during her reign and was delighted to pass on the torch to Evlin. She said that it felt 'emotional first and foremost' when she passed on the crown and secondly 'proud'!

"I felt an instant connection with Evlin," said Jess. "As stunning as her face is, her personality is sensational. One of the main reasons I was captivated by her charm is her kindness, strength and intelligence. This girl is a warrior! You could sense her potential. I see many similarities between us and it takes a lot of courage to carry quite a heavy crown, to continue the legacy and history-making in the most gracious way. We Bahraini

girls are growing stronger and we are here to build an empire of empowering women and advocating for our cases."

Jess suffers from a disorder that causes her anxiety and depression while Evlin faced issued ver her weight which she managed to overcome with the help of her family. She aims to continue highlighting health issues as well as campaigning on behalf of the environment and other good causes.

"I also plan to dedicate my time to helping causes and organisations that are close to my heart such as Smile Train," said Evlin. "Unfortunately, children with clefts suffer from external conditions that prevent them from properly breathing, eating and speaking. I want to increase awareness and encourage more people to support."

Her dad Abdulla, mum, and brother, Nader, are all so proud of how far Evlin has come which she says, gives her even more confidence.

"My dad had no doubts that I could win this competition from the beginning and my mum still can't believe my victory," she added. "My mum is happiest to have my dream come true. Even my grandmother lost her voice watching the final episode.

"In such a short time, I felt like I have gained a new family from my co-finalists and team members," said the striking star. "I never felt like I was in a competition because the atmosphere was always supportive. I also got to meet a lot of iconic people including top fashion designer Furne Amato and



celebrity makeup artist Vimi Joshi."

Evlin is now putting all her focus on training and preparing for the 2023 Miss Universe competition with her team.

"There will be a lot of travelling involved and I can't wait to start and share this journey with all of you," she said. "I want to show the world how beautiful, intelligent and talented Middle Eastern women are. I want to see more Arab representations globally may it be movies, music or beauty pageants."

ATIRE AT ITS BE



razor-sharp one-act comedy cutting through the veneer of polite society is set to be staged next month by the Manama Theatre Club (MTC).

God of Carnage, written by the award-winning Yasmina Reza, is the directorial debut of Ghassan Chemali and will be performed live on October 11, 12, 14 and 15 at the British Club of Bahrain at 7.30pm.

The play centres on the aftermath of a fight between two grade school boys. The boys' parents meet to have a civilised discussion about the incident, which devolves into chaos.

Alan Raleigh, a corporate lawyer, played by Ahmed Nasimi, and his wife Annette (Hana Ali) visit the home of Veronica Novak (Amy McGavin), an author interested in Africa, and her husband Michael (Ghazi Alshehabi).

While respect and objectivity are put forward in the beginning, small comments, incidents and disagreements gradually lead to an explosion of anger, accusations and insults. The four characters switch alliances as the conversation evolves, and bigotry, sexism and selfishness are unleashed.

Originally written in French, the play was translated into English by Christopher Hampton, and has enjoyed acclaim in productions in both London and New York.

"The play is rather demanding for actors since it's one act and they have very little time off-stage to rest during the one-and-ahalf-hour duration of the play," Ghassan,45, told GulfWeekly.

"However, it is rather easy to direct since it's very well written and involves only four actors in a single space. Once I had decided on the






set, which I also designed, things went smoothly.

"Unfortunately, starting to work on this play just as the Covid-19 pandemic was ending proved to be problematic. Just a month before the initial opening night in June, two actors and I caught the virus and had to miss out on rehearsals, so we ended up postponing."

Although this is Ghassan's debut as a director, he has acted in a number of amateur plays in Beirut, Paris and Manama as well as a Lebanese award-winning movie Heaven without People currently available on Netflix.

"I had only directed a couple of skits before this play and had really enjoyed the process," the Lebanese director, who works as a heritage consultant by day, added.

"Most of my experience has been in acting, and I've done many acting workshops and been in some plays and



theatre with tightly knit dramatic content. This play is one of those. It's also a satire on middle-class society and its hypocrisy, with a lot of sarcasm and irony. I had seen the adaptation made for the screen by Roman Polanski, and actually played the role of Alan in a production back

place in a single place, the apartment of the Novaks, but Ghassan wanted to create a contrast between two worlds within the set.

"The backwall of the Novak's apartment comprises, on the left side, a dark, unsettling wall with souvenirs from Africa hanging on it and, on the right side, a long bookshelf with a lot of books," he explained.



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Peek into an artisti



creative Shaikh Rashid bin Khalifa Al Khalifa has captivated art lovers in Europe yet again, this time with a mini retrospective exhibition featuring his artistic career ... all under one colourful roof.

The Bahrain National Arts Council chairman's Spectrum solo exhibition, held in June at the Liechtenstein Landesmuseum in Vaduz, the capital city of Liechtenstein, not only garnered high praise but also resulted in the design of postage stamps and stamp collection sheets by the Liechtenstein Postal Museum (a branch of the Liechtenstein National Museum), who were inspired by his work.

His past exhibition boasted traditional Middle Eastern architectural principles with specific palettes and tones that are characteristic to the landscape of Bahrain in





aluminium and steel forms.

This showcase, which is also being exhibited at the Liechtenstein National Museum as of September 7, is entitled *Cusp* and features a selection of his works, from atmospheric landscape paintings that mark the beginning of his

artistic career in the 1970s to his latest robust aluminium and steel installations.

The aim is to show the stylistic transitions that define certain periods of his artistic

"I am grateful to be exhibiting in Vaduz for the second time this year and to have the opportunity to present this selection of works that define certain periods of my artistic career," said the 70-year-old who studied Art and Design at Hastings College of Art and Design, Sussex, England. "I often draw on aspects of my heritage, culture and surroundings. I am so pleased to share my most personal work in a country with such a rich culture and amongst a people with whom I was previously so warmly received."

According to Svetlana Prodanova, media consultant

of the RAK Art Foundation, which was set up by Shaikh Rashid in 2020 to provide a platform as well as opportunities for emerging artists and creatives, 'this exhibition not only presents the diversity of Shaikh Rashid's oeuvre in terms of style and medium, but more importantly shows how despite this diversity, there is an undercurrent that flows through decades of his

creative work'.

"In order for people to understand Shaikh Rashid's latest work, it is important to understand his evolution; where he has come from and where he is going," she added.

That is why around three works from each 'period' of his illustrious creative career were selected for the exhibition — starting with his early landscapes which

are oil on canvas - to feature his drive and evolution in art. Shaikh Rashid had been interested in art and archaeology from an early

archaeology from an early age. His artistic development grew from traditional landscape paintings and figurative, ephemeral oil paintings in the 80s to more abstract forms in the 90s.

"Shaikh Rashid's figurative works from the 80s are also oil on canvas, as are works

from the early 90s which for the sake of this exhibition we titled *Metamorphosis*," added Svetlana.

Shaikh Rashid's keenness to try something new allowed him to explore three-dimensional aspects as an artistic medium. He began to bend the canvas, which led him to convex canvases. This approach was then developed further in recent years when he transformed convex



canvases into aluminium supports. This in turn was broken up into many small surfaces, reminiscent of the layout of Arabian cities and of Arabian windows.

In the 2000s, Shaikh Rashid began to abstract his work, removing details and adapting various textures on the surface.

Aluminium became the focus of his work from 2010 - first by employing glossy lacquer paint on its smooth façade, and then focusing on enamel, which lead to a much more minimalistic approach to his work.

"The architectural forms that arose through these works inspired Shaikh Rashid to consider the architecture of his own culture, which lead to the development of his *Maze* and *Parametric* series in 2018 and finally his

Spectrum series from 2020-2022," explained Svetlana.

Shaikha Rashid also made his collection of contemporary art accessible to the public and throughout his career, participated in numerous international exhibitions, art fairs and biennales around the world including Dubai, Vienna, Berlin, London, Moscow, Miami and in Istanbul, to name a few.

Liechtenstein National Museum director Rainer Vollkommer said he is 'delighted and honoured to have the opportunity to exhibit the fascinating work of Shaikh Rashid bin Khalifa Al Khalifa' and 'hopes that through this exhibition, we will grow to better understand one another and learn from each other'.

The exhibition ends on October 16.



HE 2022 Formula 1 Esports Series **Pro Championship** kicked off last week with a nail-biting three-race opening event, with the Bahrain-owned McLaren pulling to the front of the constructor standings with 86 points.

The sixth season of the F1

Esports Series kicked off on September 14 with a 29-lap virtual race at the Bahrain International Circuit (BIC), followed by a 32lap race at Imola and a 26-lap race at Silverstone.

New McLaren driver Lucas Blakeley took the first and second race wins of the championship, and Red Bull Racing Esports driver Frede Rasmussen won the third.

In the first race, Blakeley started on pole, but had to grapple with reigning champion Jarno Opmeer in order to take victory. In a perfectly-orchestrated move, he and McLaren team mate Bari Boroumand got past Opmeer's Mercedes coming down the main straight on Lap 21.

In the second race, Blakeley duelled with Red Bull Racing



Esports' Marcel Kiefer, cementing the Scot as this year's favourite with a 29point lead after two races.

"We've done it again!" the excited driver posted on Twitter after the race.

"Outstanding work to

absolutely everyone. This felt like the longest race of my life. Good game Marcel! Let's keep it up going into the next race."

The third race was rougher for the Scot, but he was still able to

make it to the podium.

Blakeley

"I struggled a lot with the car and wasn't quite as confident as in Bahrain, but I'll take P3 all day," he explained on Twitter.

Rasmussen took home the top prize at the virtual Silverstone race, after struggling in the first two races.

An uncharacteristic mistake in the curtain-raiser in Bahrain earned him a penalty, and he was stuck in a queue for the lead in Imola, unable to pass. Nothing and nobody would stand in his way in Silverstone, though, and he

Ronhaar. Qualifying in Silverstone came with a few shocks, not

crossed the line just ahead of

runner-up Kiefer dropping out in Q1. Usual suspects Blakeley and Rasmussen placed well, but Opmeer could only muster P9. Rasmussen put it on pole, Sebastian Job filling the P2 spot for AlphaTauri, and Ronhaar just behind.

the leaders – Blakeley (P4) and Longuet (P5) – came in to trade for the Mediums, but they emerged ahead of Opmeer. The reigning champion's gamble on a tyre differential didn't work out, just five days prior.

Leading duo Rasmussen and when the pit stops shuffled out, they maintained the lead. The loser in all this was Job, demoted to fourth, with Blakeley taking his spot on the podium.

The first event leaves Lucas Blakeley firmly top of the pile, boasting a 21-point gap with Rasmussen in second.


Ronhaar's spellbinding first event sees him positioned third, ahead of doublechampion Opmeer, and


Boroumand rounds out the top five.

In the team standings, McLaren lead the way after three consecutive podiums for Blakeley. Hit and miss

The event will be held under the patronage of Bahrain Trust Foundation chairperson Dr Fatima bint Mohammed Al Balooshi.



"Charity is all about generosity and empathy," added Rasool.

"Our main goal is to raise more funds than the past year to support our project in collaboration with Bahrain Trust Foundation to build a library for children in a school in Kerala, India.

"Libraries are essential, especially in poor areas that don't have access to the Internet and other
