It took Maryam three months to put the pieces together. It includes a shot from Dubai provided by friend Abdulla Fageeh and voiceover work





It has also been featured in Lebanon at the Tyre International Short Film Festival and in Bolivia at the Black Cat Award International Film Festival. This year it has been nominated as the Best **Documentary DXB Shorts** International Film Festival in Dubai.

The short film will also be featured at the LA Independent Women Film Awards in the US next month and once it's done making its film festival rounds, Maryam is planning



on sharing it on YouTube.

"It has been premiered in four film festivals so far and I hope it will be displayed at more festivals to come," she added.

Maryam has also won the Chromatic Award with honours, twice, which is an international competition of colour photography open to both professionals and amateurs. She also received an honourable mention in the food photography category in 2020 and an honourable mention in fashion photography in 2021.

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A message to reconnect



MOVING Punjabi family-film, written and directed by Bahrain resident Preety Praveen, has been shot in the kingdom and is set to be screened at one of the island's theatres in the near future.

The one-hour movie, entitled *Bas Ik Vaari*, revolves around a father and a daughter struggling to reconnect after complicated circumstances and misunderstandings create a rift between them.

"Where the daughter tries to bridge the gap, the father shows a cold shoulder to her efforts," said Indian expatriate Preety, a psychologist and passionate writer from Mahooz who moved to Bahrain in 2009. "Will they be able to see through the dark fog of delusional misunderstandings and reunite as a happy family?

"Bas Ik Vaari is a Punjabi word which means 'at least once' and as the name states, we all deserve a chance to speak and vent out feelings at the right time and in front of the right people."

Preety had written the story a couple of years back and after the pandemic she revisited her tale and decided to put it on the big screen.



"The shooting was finished in just two weeks," she added. "But as they say, the real work starts after the shooting finishes.

"My whole team had been working dedicatedly to finish the project for more than nine months. Everybody involved in this project took the tasks on out of passion. They have tried their best to give their time along with their other commitments.

"The idea of writing, shooting, technical work, cast and crew, everything has been conceived and conceptualised in Bahrain. We are hoping that our audience would feel connected with the story, acknowledge our hard work and take a beautiful message from our movie."

The associate producers are GoAlive and the main cast involves Gursahej Kaur, Praveen Nambiar, Anagha Kulkarni Parkhi, Asar Ziya, Jagdeep Pal Singh, Kathu Sachindev, Sandeep C Menon and Amina Syed. The director of photography is

Sachan Chandran and editing is done by Priva Lal Achary.

The lyricists are Preety Praveen and Karthick Raj and the music has been composed by Shibin P Sidiq and Ishpreet Kaur Virdi. The background music is also provided by Shibin and Dreams Digital Media Bahrain and the singers include Ishpreet Kaur Virdi, Ashna Varghese and Sobin C Jose.

"We made this movie from our hearts and are hoping that we would be able to touch the emotional chords of our audience as well," said Preety.

This isn't her first movie experience as she has written and directed an hour-long play called Aashiyana Mera, which was screened at the GOPIO event in Bahrain. *Onam in Oman* was another hour-long comedy play that was showcased at various labour camps.

Movies called *Hesitancy* and *Lakeerein* are also shorts that she made for social causes. Preety has also written a novel called *Cross Connection* and it was published in 2019 in Bengaluru, India.

"In Bahrain Media City, I've created and presented two shows – an entertainment show titled Rangla Punjab and an educational show called Children's Hour," she said. "I've worked with BMC Film production in an



upcoming Malayalam movie entitled *Ankke Enthinte Keda*, which is all set to get released. However, *Bas Ik Vaari* is the biggest project I've done till date."

Aside from her creative endeavours, she is associated with the Indian Community Relief Fund (ICRF), the Pravasi Legal Cell (PLC) and the Indian Ladies Association (ILA).


"I've given my counselling services to many in need and would love to be a helping hand for anyone who is going through a rough patch in their life," she explained.

Emotionally enchanting



HETHER it was colourful caricatures on canvas or astonishing art sculptures; nothing was missing from Ahmed Anan's highly-emotional solo exhibition at the Art Centre in Manama.

The showcase, entitled *The Shirt of Absence*, in collaboration with the Bahrain Authority for Culture and Antiquities (Baca), features more than 100 paintings on paper, canvas and mixed media, along with bronze sculptural works at the Centre located near the National Museum.

This exhibition, which was opened by Farah Mattar, Baca's director of culture and arts, is a tribute to the 55-year-old visual artist for clinching second place in the 48th edition of Bahrain Annual Fine Arts Exhibition last year ... which meant more to him than anyone can imagine.

"I'm honoured to feature my collection of artworks," said Ahmed, who won several accolades over the years and was the president of the Bahrain Contemporary Art Society from 2018 to 2020. His last solo exhibition was in 2022 in Tangiers, Morocco.



"My exhibition reflects the ordeal of loss that a person can go through as well as the personal experience that I've experienced. As a result of a sudden shock in my life, it changed the way I presented my work from previous exhibitions. I've added works of audacity to the mix that have a sense and feeling to hopefully reach the recipient with different interpretations."

As the expressive artist told the *GulfWeekly*, many from the cultural community are aware of his tragic loss that shook him and his family to the core.

"All those who know me, know my story," he said.
"I lost my son Yousif, who was only 18, from what we suspect was a heart attack. He was very athletic and




was a weightlifter with the federation. It was so unexpected that it took me a lot of time to process."

He is considered a 'third generation' Bahraini artist that has exhibited locally and abroad. He has always been inspired by iconic women, as well as human rights and nature. However, this exhibition features his pain. He used an array of

mediums in his artwork including ink, candle wax, rust, seashells, different pastes and acrylics, oil and water colour, alongside collage.

"My works vary this time in style, technique and colours, as they were completed during different periods of my life and in places far apart between Bahrain, France, Morocco.

The sculpture in Egypt was completed over a period of two and a half years," he added. "This is my first display of sculptural works in bronze.

"My Moroccan exhibition also featured just lineaments but this has figures and emotions as well.

"This is my message to all viewers – life is full of joy and is also full of sadness, so why not express it. People run away from sadness and pain but we should embrace it because it is all part of the cycle we call 'life'."

He has noticed that the audience felt a 'different energy' from this exhibition.

"Perhaps they recognise true honesty and the genuine emotions that I have experienced," he explained. "Some were very moved by the artwork and that was the feedback I received. It's an exhibition that has to be attended to be truly felt."

The exhibition is open daily to visitors, until June 17, from 9am to 8pm.

Aspiring to achieve



IHE International **Paralympic Badminton** Championship staged in the kingdom has proved to be a smash hit with the hundreds of paraathletes from across the globe who have been in Bahrain competing for medals and glory.

The popular racket sport, which has been hosted by the Bahrain Paralympic Committee (BPC) and Bahrain Badminton and Squash Federation for a second-year-in-a-row, concluded yesterday (May 23). It featured around 100 matches of doubles and singles per day and resulted in notable victories for many of the island's star paraplayers, including awardwinning Paralympian Roba Alomari.

The wheelchair-bound paraathlete is actually known for her discus, javelin and shotput skills but decided this year to try her hand at badminton.

"I'm thrilled to have won a match in the doubles category on Day One of the competition with my Iraqi teammate, Mohammed Karim," said the 32-yearold from Hamad Town, who tackled the team consisting of Australian player Fiona Singh and English player Joby Ranjanathan and enjoyed the taste of victory. The first game ended 21-13





and the second one was settled with a tight 26-24 success

More than 300 players from 42 countries including Japan, Poland, Spain, Italy, Egypt, France, England, Germany, India and more, participated in the championship. Bahrain was represented by 17 men and eight women.

According to the BPC, the competition proved to be an important part of the preparation and qualification plans for the Paris 2024 Games.

"I prepared in the best possible way to compete and gain results, especially

as I am competing here, at home, in Bahrain so I wanted to show up!" she explained. "I only started preparing for this 10 days before the competition so to notch victories for me with such a short duration of training is a victory in itself – a first in the history of para-badminton. It means so much to me.

"I thank my badminton coach Abdul Rahman Al-Abbasi for his support as well as my teammates for all their motivational encouragement. They would join me during the weekends just to train with me and help me improve my technqiue."

Alomari's second win came on Day Two in a singles match against Ugandan Sarah Naziwa.

Alomari is no stranger to raking in medals. During her sporting career, she has competed in the UK, the UAE, Kuwait, Morocco, Indonesia, China, Brazil, Oman, Tokyo and South Korea, and clinched more than 25 gold, 13 silver and six bronze medals in her sporting career. She had participated in the Grand Prix series in 2019 landing three medals – gold in discus, silver in javelin and bronze in shotput. Last year, she achieved two gold medals in javelin and discus throw and

a silver in shotput.

The national team as a whole just missed out on reaching the semi-finals. Nonetheless, the Bahrain squad feel privileged to have played a part in such a major championship and players like Alomari are looking forward to doing even better in this sport in the future.

"I aspire to achieve more," she added. "I hope to always make my kingdom and the organising committee proud. They worked so hard in preparing for this tournament and ensuring

everyone had a great time at the championship and it showed."

Other teams and coaches, such as Swedish national badminton team coach Paniz Yousefi, were impressed by the quality of the championship's organisation.

She said that the tournament exceeded her expectations in terms of competition and praised the BPC.

"The Bahrain Paralympic Committee has done a great job," added Yousefi who is a **Badminton World Federation** coach, tutor and founder of a project called Parallel Play. "In terms of competition, it was better than expected with a good level of players and matches. I commend the organisers! The future looks bright for Paralympic badminton in the world and we hope that the level will continue to rise higher and higher. We're really looking forward to the next competition."

OHAMED AI Hermi, who recently made a splash for being the first Bahraini athlete to represent the kingdom in a global freediving championship, is back in the water and training extensively in preparation for two national competitions.

The 31-year-old Federation Internationale de Natation (FINA) swimming coach and freediver competed against 350 divers from 44 countries at the World Freediving Indoor Championship staged in Kuwait and enjoyed every moment.

"To be the first to raise the Bahrain flag at the Confédération Mondiale des Activités Subaquatiques (CMAS) freediving indoor championship still feels amazing," said the fire officer at ALBA who is also a 'fin-swimmer', the sporting term for an underwater sports athlete. "I can't explain my feelings, it was just 'wow!'

"It was a pleasure to represent my country in the biggest event in the freediving world for the first time. I felt the positive energy and it has pushed me forward to want to compete more."

He remained so motivated that he started training with his renowned Croatian coach Lidija Lijic on the same day he landed back in the country.

"I work out underwater and also do a 'dry workout' based on a specialised plan by my coach," added Al Hermi, a level one national coach certified by Bahrain Olympic Committee.

"Now, I'm preparing to participate in at least swimming-pool and is swum in fractions of a pool length alternating apnea swimming with passive recovery at the pool's ends. Dynamic no fins is swimming a distance

horizontally underwater, usually in a swimming pool, whilst wearing bi fins (two separate, unconnected fins) or a monofin (both feet in one fin).

Al Hermi is also classified as the second fastest in the whole of the Arab world in the Speed Dynamic Apnea 2x50m category.

He enjoys competing in different disciplines which also include static breath holding and sprint 100M breath holding.

His adoration of everything aquatic started when he was four, swimming and snorkelling at the local pool with his father Arif, who was a member of the Bahrain national team in the early 1980s.

"Eventually I was asking to take on more depths, distances and breath-holding that I found my way to freediving," he added. "I was freediving as a hobby and when I started focusing on my technique and performance, I found that I improved a lot with my distance and technique.

"Many of my family and friends advised me to take part competitively when they saw the levels I reached so I started to attend Freediving School to learn more and develop my skills."

He became a certified, licensed free diver in 2017 and has been making waves ever since. His personal best so far, as reported in the *GDN*, is a depth of 30 metres ... but he is aiming for a new personal best.

"A special thanks goes out to everyone that supported my journey, especially my family and friends," he said. "I also want to thank the Arab teams - including Saudi Arabia, Oman, the UAE and Kuwait - that took me under their wings during the recent tournament and made me feel one with them, as well as the Croatian team.

"Thank you for all your encouragement and support. This competition was to gain experience and knowledge. It's just the beginning for me and there is more to come!"

A CULINARY CRIME



ERRARI is reportedly preparing to offer seven-time world champion Lewis Hamilton \$50 million to leave Mercedes for the Scuderia at the end of the season

Hamilton, 38, has repeatedly said he plans to re-sign with Mercedes once his contract expires at the end of the year. However, the *Daily Mail* reported Monday that Ferrari president John Elkann has been "in close contact with Hamilton."

Hamilton currently shares the all-time record of seven championships with legendary Ferrari driver Michael Schumacher. He narrowly missed out on No. 8 in the final race of 2021. He was eclipsed by Max Verstappen, who is now charging toward his third consecutive world championship as Red Bull has emerged as the dominant force in Formula 1 the past two years.

Meanwhile, Mercedes has

struggled to keep pace. That has led to speculation that the Brit may be more open to a move to Ferrari, where current drivers Charles Leclerc and Carlos Sainz are under contract through

In a scenario where
Hamilton makes a move to
Ferrari, it raises the question
about the Scuderia's current
driver lineup. The team has
reportedly begun contract
negotiations with Leclerc,
but the possibility of a
swap with Leclerc going to
Mercedes and Hamilton
teaming with Sainz at Ferrari
has emerged in rumour
circles.

Mercedes team principal Toto Wolff was recently asked about Leclerc, but insisted that his focus remains on re-signing Hamilton.

"Nobody doubts Charles' ability and he is a good guy," Wolff said at the Azerbaijan Grand Prix last month. "He is 100 per cent committed to Ferrari and we are 100pc committed to putting pen to paper with Lewis."

For his part, Hamilton has also remained consistent in his stance that he intends to remain with Mercedes.

"I'd be lying if I said I'd never thought about ending my career anywhere else," Hamilton said at the Miami Grand Prix earlier this month. "I started at McLaren, I'd like to think I'll always be a part of the McLaren family, I started there when I was 13 years old, so I thought about what it would look like if I was at McLaren one day.

"I thought about and watched the Ferrari drivers on the screens at the track and of course you wonder what it would be like to be in red. But then I go to my team, to Mercedes, and this is my home.

"I'm happy where I am. I haven't signed a contract yet, but we are working on one."



IERRE Gasly's fears of being the first Formula
One driver to be hit with an automatic one-race ban have been eased with two points having expired.

Gasly had been sitting at 10 points due to a series of minor offences over a six-month stretch last year.

Any driver who accrues 12 points in a 12-month period would be levied with an automatic one-race ban under the FIA's new sanctioning system.

The first two of Gasly's 10 points came when he collided with Aston Martin's Lance Stroll at the 2022 Spanish Grand Prix last May. With last weekend's Emilia Romagna Grand Prix at Imola cancelled due to flooding, those two points dropped from Gasly's total.

Gasly, who left Alpha Tauri for Alpine this season, still leads all drivers on the grid with eight points. The 10 he has accrued overall have been for a variety of offences including a pair of collisions, speeding under a red flag, for being too far behind the safety car and for exceeding track limits in order to gain an advantage.

The most recent of the Frenchman's penalty points were levied last October. F1 stewards have limited penalty points in 2023 to instances of unsafe driving, and Gasly has

not collected any additional points this year.

Gasly is currently 10th in the drivers standings, having earned eight points entering this week's Monaco Grand Prix.

He took over the Alpine seat vacated by Fernando Alonso, the former world champion who currently sits in third place for Aston Martin behind the Red Bull tandem of Max Verstappen and Sergio Perez. Gasly's teammate Esteban Ocon is two points behind in 10th place.


Alpine has struggled thus far in 2023 and sits tied for fifth in the Constructors standings with 14 total points, tied with rival McLaren entering Monaco.
