

N emerging Bahrain-based band Night Dippers is set to release four new singles this summer, inspired by a spectrum of emotions and experiences ... from love to a casual night out.

Offering an eclectic mix of influences from blues to punk, and rock and roll to country, song writers and vocalists Alex Craine, who is also on bass, and Alex Longden, on guitar, along with Matt Cowley on drums, are set to present *Lost Boy*, *On The Road*, *One Minute 47 Second Love Song*, and *Cyber Stalker*, two of which are currently being mixed and mastered in the UK and will be released next month.

All three band members work day jobs but share a passion to create music in their off time.


"Lost Boy is about meeting mysterious women," Craine told *GulfWeekly*. "I took my own mysterious woman, my wife, (smiles) and we visited

a legendary bar – Johnny's Bar – in Greenwich Village, which is famous for having a fantastic punk rock juke box. The song is based on that night out in New York but fictionalised a bit and Alex (Longden) came up with the music for it."

Night Dippers' creations are collaborative - whether it's the tunes or the lyrics, and while there's no set formula, Craine and Longden try to




meet at least once a week to exchange ideas and play. Drummer Matt usually adds his beats later.

On The Road, set for release next month along with *Lost Boy*, brings to life Craine and Longden's shared experience of coming home to family after a long time apart. In the past, they have both held jobs that entailed being away from home. *One Minute 47 Second Love Song* and *Cyber Stalker* will follow in June and have equally interesting back stories.

"My wife said to me, 'why do you never write love songs', so that was the answer to it," Craine said about *One Minute 47 Second Love Song.* After years of playing covers, the bass enthusiast felt he needed to take his

felt he needed to take his passion for music to the next level, which is how he got into song writing eight years ago. Craine's words are influenced by stories and television shows, among other things, and while they might be inspired by his personal experience, they are often fictionalised, like on *One Minute 47 Second Love Song*,

which is about somebody who finds himself getting in and out of love often. "I came up with a bass riff

one day and shared it with Longden who is now working on the guitar part and we will soon get together and record *Cyber Stalker*," the artist and chief executive officer of Bahrain Financial Harbour added.

The Saar resident, who has been part of many bands since his teenage years, including Dubai-based punk rock ensemble Gone Rogue Dxb, met Longden through a work acquaintance. Together they decided to collaborate on their love for music and Night Dippers was formed in November last year.

"I was having my annual health check-up, and my doctor prescribed a quick blood pressure test. When I went to show my reports, he told me I was a night dipper – I thought that's a great name for a band but had no idea what it meant. I later found out that when you sleep, for some people their blood pressure climbs, which is not good, and for some their blood pressure dips and doctors call them night dippers," Craine revealed. Last year, Night Dippers released two singles Whole Again and Half Life. They are determined to record at least one song a month and have 10 roughly demoed songs in

While they are more of a 'recording project' for now, the artists are open to new ideas of showcasing their work. So, is a gig on the cards anytime soon? "Never say never," quipped Craine.

Night Dippers has around 20,000 hits across platforms from more than 26 countries including the UK, US, UAE, Dominican Republic, and India. Their work is available on *Spotify*, *Amazon*, *iTunes* and *YouTube*, among others.

SERIES of events to raise awareness about autism are set to be staged by local groups working for the cause, coinciding with Autism Awareness Month in April.

Supporters and volunteers from the community have come together in solidarity to organise marathons, interactive sessions and fun activities for children with autism, including lively story-telling sessions.

Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD) is a developmental disability caused by differences in the brain and the affected people often have problems with social communication and interaction, besides showing restricted or repetitive behaviours or interests. They may also have different ways of learning, moving, or paying attention.

The United Nations General Assembly designated April 2 as World Autism Awareness Day to educate about autistic individuals around the world. The theme this year is 'Moving from Surviving to Thriving: Autistic individuals share regional perspectives', underpinning the shift from merely raising awareness to also promoting acceptance and appreciation of autistic people and their vital contributions to society.

In keeping with the spirit, Bahrain Society for Children with Behavioural and Communication Difficulties -Alia for Early Intervention is organising its annual Run For Autism on April 27 from 9am to 1pm at Exhibition World Bahrain, Sakhir. Participants of all ages, abilities and fitness levels can register. The event will be attended by dignitaries, including Tourism Minister Fatima Al Sairafi and Social Development Minister Osama Al Asfoor. Cash prizes and gifts await top performers at the finish line.

In addition to the race, Run For Autism will also feature children's entertainment and family fun, including a story session. Those who wish to

share their stories and autism journey, as a way to promote understanding about the disorder, are welcome. All proceeds from registrations and optional donations will be used toward the Alia Comprehensive Autism Centre. For more details, follow @aliaautismcenters on Instagram.

"The Alia Comprehensive Autism Centre is poised to become a beacon of hope and progress," director Dr Rania Al Khalifa told GulfWeekly.

"It leads the community with its unique blend of Applied Behaviour Analysis therapies and in-centre programmes designed to enhance socialisation skills crucial for our students' development," she added. Earlier this week, Naval

Support Activity (NSA)

Bahrain sailors visited the Alia centre and interacted with students through cooking classes, physical training and musical sessions, among other activities. The sailors also had an educational experience as they joined the students during occupational therapy, cognitive behaviour therapy and applied behavioural analysis sessions.

There will be activities exclusively for children on the autism spectrum as well. Interactive Minds Centre for Rehabilitation in Salmaniya is organising an awareness and support event tomorrow (April 26) from 2pm to 6pm. Volunteers from the non-profit community group Special Families Support (SFS) will accompany their children in fun activities, from Zumba dance to movies and painting. 
"We are happy to be participating in this event and will be joined by volunteers from the non-profit group One Heart Bahrain," an SFS representative added. "SFS Global is celebrating 25 years this year, and the Bahrain chapter completes 11 years. We work with children on the autistic spectrum and their parents, offering support, which is truly enriching."

Omnia Centre for Autism and Special Education is organising social and fun activities for its children in co-operation with the medical undergraduate students of Arabian Gulf University today (April 25). REACH Behaviour and

Development Centre coorganised two story-telling sessions earlier this month, with the British School of Bahrain and Neo Books and Coffee, where The Adventures of Talal the Teddy Bear, following his journey with autism, were read out loud to children.

Think Behaviour and Development Centre with Radio Bahrain organised Bubbles of Kindness this month. The event encouraged individuals, families, and businesses to step outdoors any day in April and fill the sky with bubbles, capture the moment with a photo, and tag it as #BubblesOfKindness - if you haven't already, go ahead and join the campaign.

"Bubbles remind us of a spectrum, representing different shapes and sizes and even reflecting different colours. They serve as symbols of hope and happiness and our journey as a community towards understanding, acceptance, and inclusivity," a Think representative explained.

The Canvas & Conversations art exhibition, opening on Saturday, April 27, will run until May 11 and is being held at the Bahrain Artistic Frames Centre in Budaiya. It is being organised and curated by Bahrain-based Indian artist and creative Sudeep Deshpande.

"Visual art needs to be heard, just as it needs to be seen," the 43-year-old architect, painter and metal sculptor told GulfWeekly.

"Experiencing a work of art becomes more of a tour in an art gallery and is merely left to a visual experience. If a painting or a sculpture catches an eye, it is admired by the viewer, looked upon and enjoyed by the audience.

"But the moment there is conversation about the very purpose of making of that painting or that sculpture, the viewer can then dive into the process from conception to completion.

"The dynamic of looking at it enhances the work, changing the impression of that particular work of art and the artist.

Pulse of Pop

AROUND THE WORLD IN MUSIC, TV, BOOKS AND MORE - BY NAMAN ARORA



ORROR and mystery fans are in for a chaotic treat, with the upcoming, highly anticipated Netflix series Dead Boy Detectives set to premiere today, April 25.

This darkly comedic, supernatural detective show, based on the popular DC Comics characters created by Neil Gaiman and Matt Wagner, promises a thrilling exploration of the unseen world, all through the eyes (or lack thereof) of two undead teenagers.

Charles Rowland and Edwin Paine are not your typical detectives. Tragically murdered in their youth, they opted out of the traditional afterlife and instead chose to stay on Earth, forming the Dead Boy Detectives agency. Operating from a hidden location, they tackle paranormal cases that the living world cannot handle.

The series, developed by Steve Yockey, takes inspiration from the source material while carving its own path.

"It's definitely set in the Sandman universe," Steve explained, referring to *Netflix's* previous foray into the world of Neil Gaiman, "But it's very much its own story."

Fans of Neil's work can expect the signature blend of dark humour and unsettling horror, all wrapped around a

compelling central mystery. Leading the charge are actors Jayden Revri and George Rexstrew as Charles and Edwin, respectively. While both characters are deceased, their personalities couldn't be more different. Charles, the sardonic cynic, finds solace in logic and deduction. Edwin, on the other hand, embraces the chaos of the afterlife, often relying on intuition and a touch of the macabre. Their contrasting styles create a dynamic partnership, fuelled by their shared desire to solve mysteries and perhaps, just maybe, find some semblance

of peace in the afterlife. Joining them is Kassius Nelson as Crystal Palace, a quirky psychic who acts as their reluctant connection to the living world. Crystal's abilities allow them to bridge the gap between the mortal realm and the spectral plane, providing them with muchneeded information and occasionally landing them in sticky situations.

Dead Boy Detectives promises laugh-out-loud moments as the boys navigate the absurdities of their post-mortem existence. They'll encounter strange entities, battle otherworldly

demons, and all the while, crack a few morbid jokes. However, beneath the surface of the humour lies a deeper exploration of loss, grief, and the search for meaning in the face of mortality.

The series boasts a visually stunning aesthetic. The world of the Dead Boy Detectives is a vibrant tapestry of the macabre, where abandoned buildings pulsate with unseen energies and the veil between realities is paper-thin. The show's creators have gone to great lengths to create a unique visual language, one that reflects the bizarre beauty of the afterlife.

BOOK UP! CAPTIVATING

new novel, Miss Morgan's Book Brigade by Janet Skeslien Charles, hits shelves on Tuesday, April 30.

This heartwarming tale weaves together the stories of two remarkable women, separated by decades, yet united by their love of books and a mission to bring solace and knowledge during times of hardship.

The narrative centres on Jessie 'Kit' Carson, a passionate librarian working at the New York Public Library in the early 1900s. When the horrors of the first World War engulf Europe, Kit stumbles upon a life-changing opportunity. Boring dominance?

RED Bull boss Christian Horner rejected suggestions that Max Verstappen had made Formula One boring after the triple world champion took his domination to new heights in China at the weekend.

The Dutch 26-year-old's first win in Shanghai sent him 25 points clear of Mexican team mate Sergio Perez after five races and was his fourth win of the season. He has also started all five from pole position. Verstappen has now won half of all the races held since Formula One last

raced in China, in April 2019 before the Covid-19 pandemic. McLaren's Lando Norris, runner-up on Sunday, told reporters earlier that the sport

was witnessing a greater dominance than ever and "the only exciting races have been the ones that Max is not in.

"If you see the same driver winning every single time without a fight then of course it does start to become boring and that

is obvious." Horner said Verstappen's performances needed to be appreciated. "Max is a special talent and it's a golden moment for him," he told

reporters. "As we've seen with every single driver it doesn't last forever and I think it's enjoying the moment, being in the moment and there's no guarantees that we'll be able to give him a car like this every year for the next five years.

"It's doing what you can, while you can. "He's just like a metronome. The pace that he showed last year, he's just continued that through," added Horner, whose team also won four straight titles with Sebastian Vettel from 2010-13.

"Since the last Chinese Grand Prix he's won 50 per cent of all the races. He's won 21 of the last 23 races. He's in fantastic form, at one with the car and at one with the team and enjoying his racing." Horner said there was 'no ambiguity' about where Verstappen would be racing in 2025, referencing public overtures by Mercedes boss Toto Wolff despite the champion having a contract to 2028. Mercedes were dominant

from 2014 to 2020 and have a vacancy for 2025, with seven-times world champion Lewis Hamilton switching to Ferrari -- who had a similar golden era with Michael Schumacher in the early 2000s.

"I think sometimes it's just designed to create noise," said Horner of Wolff"s comments.

"We've moved today ahead of the amount of races Mercedes have won in the modern era. The team's in form, why on earth would you want to leave this team?

"His (Wolff's) time would be better spent perhaps focusing on the team rather than the driver market.

"Have you heard George Russell is out of contract at the end of 2025? Maybe he might not be so keen to stay in '26. The market moves around."



CHINESE GRAND PRIX WAS A 'CRAZY RACE'

CHAMPION: Verstappen

WO-TIME world champion Fernando Alonso described the Chinese Grand Prix as a 'crazy race' after battling to secure P7 for Aston Martin, while teammate Lance Stroll received a 10-second penalty for a collision with Daniel Ricciardo.

Alonso had a promising start, jumping into P2 on the opening lap, but the race quickly devolved into a series of safety car periods that disrupted his strategy. Forced to make an additional pit stop, Alonso almost lost control of his car in the final corner, adding another layer of drama.

"Yeah, definitely, [a] crazy race," Alonso admitted, reflecting on the unexpected twists and turns.

"A lot of things happened for us in the race. We had a great start, P2 the first

couple of laps, then a few Safety Cars that probably didn't help our strategy and made us save the tyres a little bit and last until the end. We had to make another stop, so that was not ideal. At the end [I] nearly crashed, but then fastest lap and P7, so all in all I think a good weekend."

Despite the challenges, Alonso managed to salvage a decent result, finishing seventh and securing the extra point for setting the fastest lap.

While Alonso ultimately salvaged points, his teammate Lance Stroll faced a different fate. After starting the race from P11, Stroll looked poised to potentially challenge for points, but his race took a turn for the worse following a collision with Daniel Ricciardo during a safety car restart.

When Alonso locked up on the approach to the hairpin, a concertina

effect occurred where the drivers behind had to brake to avoid the car in front. Stroll, though, did not slow down in time and crashed into the back of Ricciardo's RB, with the damage significant enough to put the Australian out of the race.


"I don't understand it," Stroll commented on the incident. "I think it was a concertina effect in the hairpin. Someone braked in front and then I think it was like everyone kind of braked. The car in front of me just stopped right in front of me, I had nowhere to go and, yeah, it was just one of those really weird racing incidents."

The stewards deemed Stroll to be at fault and handed him a 10-second penalty for the incident. He expressed his disagreement with the decision, arguing that the collision was a result of the chain reaction triggered by the car in front.




