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INGERS from all over the region will be arriving in Bahrain for the firstever choir festival to be held in the kingdom on March 1.

Manama Singers, arguably the oldest multicultural community choir in the kingdom, is organising Choir Fest Bahrain, which will showcase a variety of musical styles, languages, cultures and traditions ... a fitting tribute to the GCC's cosmopolitan nature. The event will be held at the Cultural Hall.

"The choirs are from a variety of backgrounds and cultures, sharing and singing a variety of music. We have choirs from schools, churches and the community, and all ranging from 15 to 70 singers," Manama Singers musical director Jo Diciolla told GulfWeekly. "We are excited to have invited choirs from the region too, including Saudi Arabia, Kuwait and Dubai. The festival will showcase a celebration of our own styles of performance, intertwined with different languages, cultures and traditions.'

"In December 2022, some of our singers went to watch the YMCA (Bahrain) choir, comprising more than 50 singers from several Indian church congregations here, put on their Christmas carol service event," the 33-yearold Saar resident added. "I had not seen or even heard of any other large choirs since I arrived here in Bahrain seven years ago, so, I was surprised and had such a wonderful evening singing along and enjoying the music.

"This made me realise that maybe there are more choirs on the island, and how wonderful it would be

if we could get together, share our music, and create something magical.

"I took the idea to our choir committee and there was eagerness to

pursue it further. We did some research and before long we had a long list of choirs to contact. We began the journey last summer, and here we are, with more than 10 choirs attending, from Bahrain and beyond, with a festival that is actually going to happen."

Among the choirs that will participate in the event during



the F1 weekend is the YMCA Bahrain.

"This is a great opportunity to share our music with one another," YMCA Bahrain choir conductor Shajimon Christudas said. An electrical engineer by profession, Shajimon is a fan of music especially Carnatic, a traditional style

from South India. "We will build good harmony, not only in music but also in our new relationships and friendships," he added.

Driving down from neighbouring Saudi Arabia, the Najd Choir from Riyadh will also perform at the musical showcase.

"This festival will encourage people from the GCC to get involved with music and join a choir," Lebanese expatriate Adnan Rachid, who formed the Najd Choir in 2019 said. "I hope it will get the attention of ministries and those in government, and those unfamiliar with choirs will come to discover the many talents in the region. More importantly, I hope the festival will spread joy, love and happiness to those involved and those listening," the professional musician and choral director who has been singing and leading choirs, including the UNESCO amateur choir, since the age of 15, added.

Bahrain-based Welsh expatriate Tom Matthias, a music teacher and choir leader at Nadeen School, is all

set to present the talent that he's been nurturing.

"The Nadeen School Choir has performed in numerous live events this year, but never alongside another choir. The festival will be an exciting experience for the students, and myself, to take part in," the Manama Singer pianist said.


In the past, Tom has been on the judging panel of Harmony Music Centre's Gulf Musician Idol competition and this year, will put on the production of Matilda, among other projects.

Manama Singers will also be one of the performing choirs at the festival. They currently comprise about 40 singers across a wide range of nationalities, including English, Welsh, Scottish, Irish, French, Italian, German, Swiss, Swedish, American, Indian, Pakistani, Malaysian, Kiwi (New Zealand), Jordanian, Lebanese and Zambian. Manama Singers celebrated their golden jubilee in 2022.

"Our vision for the festival is to share a love and appreciation for choral singing in present and future generations in Bahrain, by connecting musicians from diverse cultural backgrounds and traditions from within the Kingdom and beyond," Jo explained.

Tickets for Choir Fest Bahrain go on sale early February and will be available on Platinumlist.

Changing the marrative





AHRAINI writer, editor, artist and educator Fatima Al Saad has collaborated with well-known Dubaibased creative Deema Al Alami to compile a collection of poignant anthologies that brings the Palestinian narrative to light.

48 Stories of Exile from Palestine, an English language book that aims to connect the English-speaking and Palestinian communities, is set to hit the shelves in March.

It highlights the personal accounts of victims from the 1948 Al Nakba (meaning 'the catastrophe') and the 1967 Al Naksa (setback), which witnessed the displacement of thousands of Palestinians. The stories shed light on their enduring hardships.

Among the many people involved in bringing the Palestinian plight to light through this 112-page book were 48 authors, 13 illustrators, five editors and 20 volunteer readers belonging to diverse ethnic backgrounds, including Bahraini, Kuwaiti, American,

British, Indian, Irish, Russian and Swedish.

An excerpt from one of the stories reads: "By the next day, as Jiddo Assaad rightly predicted, the settlers returned, shooting and murdering him in his own home. His widow and sons never returned to Palestine. They had to grieve their painful loss away from home, in Jordan, where they would eventually become citizens. Jiddo Assaad's story of ensuring his family's safety and staying to protect his home, is one that will never leave us, his proud descendants.'

"When the violence (ongoing war in Gaza) escalated early October, I was affected much like everyone else," 40-year-old Fatima, one of the editors on this project, told GulfWeekly. "I wanted to do something with my voice as a poet but I had this odd paralysis, like my throat was locked, and I was feeling lost and ineffective as a human. When I heard about this book, I knew instinctively that this was the opportunity where I could support the cause and speak up for Palestine."

Deema, the publisher and initiator of this project, is

partly Palestinian and has a personal connection with the stories.

"My paternal grandparents were forced into exile from their home in Jerusalem and carried the weight of displacement and longing for their homeland," the popular children's author revealed, adding that her father was born in exile.


"Growing up, I visited them in Amman (Jordan) every week. Those memories laced with the aroma of Palestinian cuisine and the melody of our traditional music, as well as their accent and use of Arabic metaphors, all keep Palestine alive in my heart."

Though Fatima has closely followed Palestinian history over the years, she found working on this project an educational experience.

"I had to research to get context and details to some parts of the narratives I was editing, which taught me about specific events and massacres that affected the movement of the people in their own land," the Amwaj resident, who is set to participate in a Palestine-themed art exhibition soon, added.

Art for Palestine will showcase her installation that's been inspired by some of the stories she has edited for this book.

"As I read the stories and spoke to the descendants of Al Nakba, I learned about Palestine in its former glory, as a beautiful, peaceful and progressive land. Before this, the image I had was the

sieged and war-torn land we see today.

"Palestinians, even in their displacement, have empowered themselves with education, knowledge, skill, patriotism, and more.

"I hope to visit the country some day and pray at Masjid Al Aqsa in Al Quds. I want to pick oranges from the trees, and taste the figs and watermelons..." the selftrained energy healer added.

All proceeds from the sale of the book will go toward

supporting Palestinians in their pursuit of education, a common theme that threads through the stories.

"I am grateful to everyone who played a role in getting this book published, contributing their time and expertise pro bono," Deema added. "This collective effort not only highlights the power of storytelling but also reaffirms the shared humanity in relation to any group of oppressed people, and especially Palestinians. The book stands not just as a collection of narratives but as a testament to the resilience and unity of people from diverse backgrounds in supporting the Palestinian cause."



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An aromatic Asian adventure

HE Four Seasons
Hotel Bahrain Bay
knows how to
elevate humble street
food staples and serve
them in a fine dining
restaurant. That's what
my companions and I
discovered during the
Four Hands Dinners,
which have made a
comeback this year
after a successful last
season.

American Bar and Grille at Borgata Hotel Casino and Spa executive chef Aram Mardigian joined hands with Four Seasons Bahrain's executive chef Brian Becher to serve up a special dining experience at re/Asian that featured creative interpretations of fun Southeast Asian street food, and the day before at CUT by Wolfgang Puck.

"One of our main motivating factors behind events like this is offering our guests something different," Chef Brian told *GulfWeekly*, adding that it's just as exciting for the staff who get to learn and do something new.

The Four Hands Dinners with Chef Aram marks the start of a series for this year.

"I was excited right off the bat," the culinary creative based in New Jersey revealed. "It's any chef's dream to travel around the world and understand different cultures. I enjoyed exploring the local fare such as the traditional Bahraini breakfast. I also visited the local fish market, which was a great experience."

Chef Aram's cooking is largely influenced by his







partly Italian roots that originate in Calabria. And, Calabrian sausages were one of the highlights of the Four Hands Dinners hosted at CUT, which also featured other crowd-pleasers such as Wagyu Beef on Weck, a New York-style roast beef sandwich originating in Buffalo, and Argentinian Choripan, a traditional grilled chorizo sandwich.

My foodie friends and I enjoyed re/Asian's dim-lit

ambience, which instantly put us at ease. I could hear chatter spaced with laughter throughout the fully-booked restaurant. We sat at a table close to the window, with

sweeping views of Bahrain from the 50th floor.

As we were warming up with peppy numbers by the DJ, we were served a flavourful concoction infused with Japanese tea, which got our motors running, gearing

us up for the feast ahead.
We had to try out some
appetisers on the menu,

specially

crafted

for this
event by
Chefs Brian
and Aram. We
selected the Prime
Beef Kimbap, a parcel of
refreshing, colourful pickled
vegetables and silken tofu.
We also ate the Crispy Lamb
Belly, tender meat coated in a
sticky and slightly sweet five-

spice glaze, which complemented the protein.

Chef Brian stopped by our table for a friendly chat, revealing his longtime friendship with Chef Aram since 2007 and

calling him the 'undisputed king of sandwiches and sausages'. We concurred on the first bite of the Grilled Chicken Kimchi Sausage recommended by him.

Springy and encased in a crispy skin, they were a burst of herby goodness, further elevated by the 'awesome' sauce on the side. While we enjoyed eating them with sticky rice, they were a delight all on their own too.

The Whole Roasted Sea Bream, one of our mains, was a unanimous hit at the table. Chefs Brian and Aram did a fantastic job of infusing this characteristically clean tasting protein with potent flavours, which didn't overpower. The subtly sweet and sticky Hunan sauce clung to the fish, which had a satisfying meaty texture, and the crispy, earthy eggplant ribbons, offered another flavour dimension.

We also tried, what I can say is, the richest steak I've ever eaten. The Japanese A5 Wagyu beef with just the right ratio of fat to meat was cooked to perfection and melted in our mouths. The umami flavour complemented the bloody juices and the side of rustic sweet potatoes.

Our meal was paired with premium red grape, which we continued to sip on as we waited for dessert, a selection of the Coconut Sticky Rice with fresh mango and a quenelle of Fresno chilli ice cream. Reminiscent of the streets of Southeast Asia, this dish was equal parts decadent and divine. The Vietnamese Banana Cake garnished with a nutty sesame tuile and piped whipped white chocolate was art on a plate.

The proactive and friendly service added three stars, or should I say seven, to a fascinating culinary journey. I look forward to returning for the next Four Hands Dinners and can't wait to find out what's in store.

AHRAINI artist Feryal Ishaq Bastaki is excited to co-host her first art exhibition for this year from February 3 to 5.

Ten young artists will showcase their works to the local art community at the event where Feryal's vibrant creations will also be on display.

"I have a series of exhibitions lined up this year, the first of which will be for young artists and university students at a media centre in Janabiya. I'm organising this showcase with my partner Bader Al Aali, who, like me is an experienced artist, and will participate too," the Saar resident told *GulfWeekly*.

The local talent practices numerous artistic styles, including Khayyami, a form of Persian art. A popular theme in this art form is 'lovers amid nature', which Feryal feels might be 'too bold' for some and hence she decided to blend this style with traditional Bahraini art, a widely accepted style in the Arabian Gulf.

"While Khayyami represents the romantic side of me, pop art represents my tough side," Feryal revealed, adding that she uses bright colours with clear strokes for the latter, a testament to her personality, which is 'a mix of


which is 'a mix of cat and lion'.

She also practices digital art and uses acrylic paint for her physical paintings.

Feryal's artistic process involves sketching on photoshop and shifting to canvas after assessing the final result.

Two of her favourite creations are *Pearl*Merchant's Daughter and Bahraini Woman.

"The latter portrays the traditional Bahraini woman with mashmoom (a local plant variety with multiple uses including medicine and accessorising) in her hair," she said. The subject

and big, which puts the total focus on the eye, and her forehead is narrow. To balance the aesthetic, one eyebrow was enough. Viewers don't even notice it, unless I draw their attention to it," she added.

"I'm fascinated with portraits and my main focus is Bahraini culture," added the Omar Khayyam fan, who is inspired by the artists in his poetry and continues to refer to their art especially when she paints a face.

Omar Khayyam was a popular Persian mathematician, astronomer

Last year, Feryal fulfilled one of her goals of permanently exhibiting her works at malls and hotels.

"I had mentioned Naseef restaurant during a television interview, and the owner, Ameena Naseef, kindly invited me to display my creations at Seef Mall in Seef District during Ramadan. It's now showcased there permanently. I would also like to express my appreciation to The Art Hotel and Resort general manager Ramez Nemeh for displaying my art on a TV screen in the hotel's lobby," she added.

Feryal, who began doodling at the age of 12, owes her artistic achievements to her

high school art teacher who noticed that her drawings and paintings were better than most other students her age.

However, she believes her career in this field took off at university when she enrolled for an art course as an optional subject. It was there that she honed her skills, especially sketching.

However, life had other plans for the creative who went on to become an English language teacher after graduating in English literature with a minor in French from the University of Bahrain.

"I worked at several government schools and teaching took all of my time and energy," Feryal explained. "Eventually, I landed a job at the Ministry of Education where I was promoted to join their Educational Supervision Directorate and worked there for many years.

"Art seemed to fade, until I decided to retire and pursue painting full-time. Persian art has always been my inspiration, those beautiful faces with sleepy eyes... I don't have a formal degree in art but I learned through persistent observation until I mastered the techniques.


"I started participating in art exhibitions in 2012. So far, I have showcased my work in Bahrain and Tunisia and I've also displayed at online exhibitions in Egypt and Italy."

AROUND THE WORLD IN MUSIC, TV, BOOKS AND MORE - BY NAMAN ARORA

REBOOT of the popular TV series Buffy the Vampire Slayer is in the works, according to country music legend and uncredited producer for the original show Dolly Parton.

Dolly's production company, Sandollar Productions, which the singer co-founded with her former manager, Sandy Gallin, had coproduced all seven seasons of the show, as well as the spinoff show Angel.

"They're still working on that," Dolly told reporters, without specifying who is involved in the project.

"They're thinking about bringing it back and revamping it.'

Buffy the Vampire Slayer was created by writer and director Joss Whedon, and centred around the eponymous character, the latest in a succession of young women chosen by fate to battle against vampires, demons and other forces of darkness.

The series received critical and popular acclaim, and is often counted among the greatest television series of all time.

American film director and producer Fran Rubel Kuzui had attempted to reboot Buffy with a new movie in 2009.

However, fans of the show, and some of its cast members, had criticised the project for not involving Joss. In 2018, Joss and producer and

screenwriter Monica Owusu-Breen collaborated on a proposed reboot with a Black actor playing one of the leads, but it received backlash from fans who assumed a Black actor would play Buffy.

On X, formerly known as Twitter, Monica suggested the reboot would introduce new characters, but "There is only one Buffy," she wrote.

Although plans for an onscreen reboot have yet to come to fruition, the world of the show has extended to other mediums.

Several 'Buffy' cast members reunited last year for an Audible series set after the events of the show, which concluded in

Slayers: A Buffyverse Story picks up 10 years after the 'Buffy' series finale and focuses on a new slayer, Indira (voiced by Laya DeLeon Hayes), and **Buffy's former vampire** lover, Spike (voiced by James Marsters).

Anthony Head, Charisma

Carpenter, Juliet Landau, Emma Caulfield, Amber Benson, James Charles Leary, and Danny Strong also reprised their roles from the TV series.

Speaking of the original series, Dolly added that while she was 'very involved,' the credit for the show's success is down to the people who worked on it every day.

"A lot of my work was done just conversing back and forth with the business people there," the singer added.

"I have to give more people more credit on Buffy the Vampire Slayer than me. That little show did great."



FACING FEARS

N animated fantasy adventure comedy in which a young boy faces his fear of the night is set to hit Netflix this weekend.

To be released digitally on February 2, Orion and the Dark, produced by DreamWorks, has been directed by Sean Charmatz and written by Charlie Kaufman.

The official synopsis for the movie, based on a children's book of the same name by Emma Yarlett, reads: "Orion seems a lot like your average elementary school kid – shy, unassuming, harbouring a secret crush.

"But underneath his seemingly normal exterior, Orion is a ball of adolescent anxiety, completely consumed by irrational fears of bees, dogs, the ocean, cell phone waves, murderous gutter clowns, and even falling off of a cliff.

"But of all his fears, the



thing he's the most afraid of is what he confronts on a nightly basis: the Dark.

"So when the literal embodiment of his worst fear pays a visit, the Dark whisks Orion away on a roller coaster ride around the world to prove there is nothing to be afraid of in the night.'

Orion is voiced by Jacob Tremblay, with Colin Hanks as the adult version of the character, while Paul Walter Hauser voices Dark.

ADIOHEAD members Thom Yorke, Jonny **Greenwood and Tom** Skinner are back with a new album, this time under their relatively young band The Smile.

Wall of Eyes is The Smile's second album, after the band made its surprise debut in a performance streamed by Glastonbury Festival in May 2021 and released their first album, A Light for Attracting Attention, to acclaim in 2022.

Thom does the vocals on the album, while joining Jonny on guitar, bass and keys, as Tom mans the drums for the critically acclaimed work.


The album has been recorded in Oxford and at the famous Abbey Road Studios in London, UK with strings performed by the London Contemporary Orchestra.

The fight for victories, podiums and allimportant points is set to intensify as the region's premier drag racing series hits the quarter-mile strip at "The Home of Motorsport in the Middle East"

In the two previous meetings, around 250 competitors from Bahrain, Saudi Arabia, UAE, Kuwait, Qatar, Canada, and US took part.

This week's programme kicked off last night and continues today with back-to-back nights of Test

and Tune, from 6pm to midnight.

Qualifying will be held on Thursday from 3pm onwards, setting up pairings for eliminations on Friday from 2pm onwards.

Tickets to Test and Tune cost BD2 per person for each night along BIC's Beyon Grandstand. Tickets for Qualifying and Race Day are BD5 apiece for the Start Line Grandstand and BD3 for the Beyon Grandstand.

The BDRC 2023/2024 season features five rounds, with the next one scheduled from February 6 to 9, setting the stage for the championship finale from March 19 to 22.

EWLY re-signed McLaren driver Lando Norris is confident that the team will be in the mix for race victories in 2024, but is patient for a championship challenge.

Bahrain-owned McLaren turned heads last season by going from struggling for points to regularly fighting for podiums, with highly effective upgrades being implemented following a technical reshuffle.

The newly re-signed Norris came close to scoring McLaren's first Grand Prix win since 2021 on several occasions, taking six P2 finishes, while team mate Oscar Piastri managed to triumph in the Qatar Sprint race.

"It's both the team's goal and also just a personal goal that I've always had," he said of his and McLaren's constructors' and drivers' title ambitions. "Am I convinced I'm capable of doing it? Yes. Am I convinced the team is capable of doing it? Yes.

"I don't think it's just last year and how we turned things around, I don't think that's the only thing I would say that's convinced me. It's just everything that goes on day to day, people that are here, work ethic, mentality, approach to everything."

McLaren last won the constructors' championship in 1998, while Lewis Hamilton in 2008 is their most recent drivers' champion.

Pushed on when he feels McLaren could challenge for titles, Norris called it "a difficult question" to answer, but hopes the team's momentum means it is close.

"There were moments we were close to winning races last year, and a few races we were not miles away from a



Red Bull," he added.

"We're the closest we've ever been (to winning a race) since I've been here and for many, many years, but fighting for a championship is a bigger step. If you ask me do I think I can win races this year, I'd be inclined to say yes, but to go straight into winning the championship, I think that's another level.

"(It's a step) both for myself, (as) racing at the very top is not something I've necessarily done for a while, but also for the whole team. For everyone here at the factory it's a different kind of level and excitement, for mechanics a different level of pressure and excitement." He continued: "Do I think we're ready to challenge them? Yeah, absolutely. In those situations, and there's opportunities where we've been fighting against Red Bull, Ferrari, Mercedes, going against them head-tohead in strategy, pit stops, all of those things, and the majority of times we've executed them extremely well.

"When it comes to pressure, I think everyone is in a very good position, but as soon as you mention fighting for a championship, everyone's mentality changes a little bit. But I feel I'm ready to go against Max Verstappen and Lewis and fight against them."

McLaren will hit the track with their new F1 challenger at Silverstone on February 14, having already presented the livery that will adorn Norris and Piastri's MCL38s, and are gearing up for the pre-season testing in Bahrain from February 21 to 23.




