

asked them to reimagine and remix it, with full creative freedom," Khalil Qureshi, one of the band leaders, told *GulfWeekly*.

The group, known for blending jazz, blues, funk and psychedelic elements to create its own unique vibe, also includes Ryan John on drums, Karl Roderick on rhythm and lead guitar, vocalist Joshua Pandit on synth, Szabi Nigo on trumpet, Rod Collins on saxophone and Ryan James on bass

guitar. On Alchemists and Imaginaries, three Bahraini artists - Ahmed Zainal, Fadal Nazir aka PapaPush and Arif Albolushi aka DJ Mysterioo Arif - made three distinct



remixes of the original song, over a span of six months. "Ahmed gave it a drum and

bass spin, while PapaPush went down the dubstep route and DJ Mysterioo added a house music feel to the song, and it was astounding to listen to and enjoy each version," Khalil explained. "I couldn't have imagined the song sounding so different yet unique, and I felt proud, inspired and in awe when I first listened to the songs."

In total, there are four songs on the EP, including the original *Midnight Blooms*.


Last year, the song earned the band the title of 'Debut Recording Artist of the Year'



at the Musivv Awards, while also being nominated for 'Band of the Year'.

Musivv is a platform, in a digital magazine format, that discovers and develops independent musical artists in the UAE and the Middle East, and their awards has honoured more than 50 independent creatives since its inception in 2019. Not one to rest on their laurels and despite a busy live performance and personal schedule, the band is already hard at work on its next single Indus, which is expected to be released over the summer.

Artistic abode

TRADITIONAL Bahraini house demolished in 1963 has been given a new life by a Yemeni architect who has created a miniature model of the historic dwelling.

The artistic recreation of the house was commissioned by its owner's granddaughter Faten Al Ashgar, and beautifully executed by popular miniaturist and multimedia artist Ali Moeladawilah.

The house was located in Fareej Al Fadhel (Al Fadhel neighbourhood) in Manama before it was razed.

Ali has crafted the model using a watercolour painting of the building as reference, while drawing from his experience as an architect for the structural details.

"Faten approached me requesting a custom piece for her grandfather's house, but the only memory they had left was an old watercolour painting, which lacked details," the 29-year-old who currently resides in Melbourne, Australia, told *GulfWeekly*.

"I have never visited Bahrain and so I had to research old photos of Bahraini houses to get a proper understanding of the architectural styles present at the time."

This is the creative's third collaboration with Saudi-based Faten who has previously bought two pieces – 'Maktabah' or miniature bookshelves – from Ali and is keen to buy more of his works.

Faten was born in Saudi but her maternal grandfather, who is originally Saudi Arabian, moved to Bahrain in the 1920s where he lived for many years.

"I never saw my grandfather's house, but my mother, uncles and aunts talked about it a lot and so I pictured it in my mind. I had an old painting of the house and thought of bringing it alive with a miniature creation," Faten said.

"Having bought other artworks from Ali last year, I thought he would be the right person to commission this

project. I like his attention to detail and his structural accuracy.

"When I saw the finished product, I found the architectural elements and colours were replicated closely. He even took the damaged and missing

Faten's family still lives in Bahrain and she hopes to visit the kingdom this month. Though Ali has always been a creative with an 'obsession' with architecture, he dabbled in miniature art back in high school, when he built a 3D model of a library. Eventually, he enrolled in RMIT University in Melbourne, Australia, to study architecture but quickly became 'disenfranchised by the profession's lack of creativity'. "I was always working on

somebody else's same old boring designs, never my own," Ali said. "I felt like my creative

spark was dying and so I began exploring alternative fields, which led me to start a business as a full-time artist. "I came across several


creatives pursuing miniature art while scrolling on *Instagram* and knew right away that I needed to give this a shot – it was the perfect outlet to express my passion for architecture and building.

"I use a variety of mediums, from clay, foam, wood, resins, acrylic paints, plaster, texture paste, and whatever gets the job done. I'm always exploring new materials and tools to push my craft," Ali revealed. More recently, he has been exploring the world of 3D

printing. Like traditional artists would sell prints of their

paintings, Ali wanted to make his designs more accessible and began 3D printing designs that he created digitally, including DIY (do-it-yourself) kits that let you assemble your own


pieces using 3D printed parts. "The first of these kits that than expected and so I'm planning to design more. The bulk of my work, however, will remain handmade, from wood and clay carvings to hand painting and moulding," he added.



ORE than 400 musicians from **17 schools** across Bahrain came together this week to share their talents and compete for the trophies during a recently held student music festival.

also won the Secondary Large Instrumental Ensemble trophy, and their school mates Yasmeen Majed and Mohammed Alnajjar took the Secondary Small Instrumental Ensemble trophy.



T was a golden weekend for Bahrain Victorious 13 with an Ironman win for Kat Matthews and a World Cup win for Max Stapley, *writes* Lisa Pringle.

Matthews successfully defended her Ironman North America Championship title in Texas on Saturday in a dramatic come-from-behind victory.

The British long-course champion hurdled challenges before and after the starting line to produce the win over two minutes faster than the rest of the field.

Matthews was wellrecovered from the calf tear that ended her T100 Miami race early last March, producing the day's fastest marathon to negate the effects of a five-minute bike drafting penalty and a four-minute deficit on the swim.

It closely mirrored the circumstances of Matthews' win last year, when she overhauled a nine-minute deficit after the bike to clinch victory in the final kilometres of the marathon.

It had also been part of her comeback to racing after a car collision ruled her out of competing at the 2022 Ironman World Championship in Kona.

"I didn't really think I would get to complete the entire race, to be honest. I've had an interesting and very optimistic build after suffering injury seven weeks ago, so I didn't really know what the run would hold," she said.

"There was something about returning as last year's winner – it felt like the entire crowd

was cheering for me." Along with retaining the title of Ironman North America Champion and securing her start at the Ironman World Championship in Nice, France, Matthews also drew first blood in the new Ironman Pro Series taking home the maximum 5,000 points toward the year-end standings and the opportunity to claim part of the \$1.3 million bonus pool per gender and the top place bonus of \$200,000. Stapley claimed his first ever World Triathlon victory at the World Triathlon Cup Chengdu on Monday. The Olympic distance race was one of the few remaining World Cup stops in the Olympic qualifying period with a start list of heavy hitters hunting for their Paris 2024 berth, but Stapley proved more than up for the challenge.

The British rising star figured in a motivated breakaway on the bike, and held strong on the run in a final four-way battle with Tayler Reid (NZL), Jonas Schomburg (GER), and Mark Devay (HUN).

On the final few kilometres, Stapley surged to take the lead with only Reid coming with him. But just as Reid came up to his shoulder for the pass, the Kiwi veered away vomiting from the exertion. Schomburg came past Reid, but Stapley stepped



on the gas to leave no doubt about who would break the tape. Reid recovered enough to deny Devay the last spot on the podium. Stapley said, "There were a few guys – we see each other in every race – in the break and we were gagging for it. So once [we had] gone I was just motivating the troops to get it going. If I would have finished 30th at least I would have committed to it. That's how I want to race – swim, bike, run. If I die out on the course, I die out on the course."

This coming weekend Lauren Parker lines up for the Paracycling World Cup race in Belgium, while Kate Waugh takes on some French Grand Prix racing.

WOLFF KNOCKS BACK 'RUMOURS' ABOUT VERSTAPPEN TALKS

Recedence Formula One team boss Toto Wolff has knocked back speculation about a meeting with Max Verstappen's management after this weekend's Miami Grand Prix.

Mercedes are looking for a replacement for seven-times world champion Lewis Hamilton, who is joining Ferrari at the end of the season.

Reports in Germany have suggested Verstappen's father Jos and manager Raymond Vermeulen would meet Mercedes team coowners Wolff, Ineos boss Jim Ratcliffe and Mercedes Benz CEO Ola Kallenius. Asked about it at an event in New York for team partner WhatsApp, with a race car emoji projected onto the Empire State Building lit up in green, Wolff told *Reuters Television*: "No,

as Hamilton's replacement although the Dutch driver has a Red Bull contract until

Verstappen is cruising towards his fourth successive title with Red Bull, having won four of five races so far this season, despite internal divisions resulting from a female employee's allegations of inappropriate behaviour against team boss Christian Horner.

Horner has been cleared of the allegations, which he denied, and remains in charge but Verstappen senior has said the team risks being torn apart if Horner stayed.

The future of the team's top designer Adrian Newey is also uncertain, with media reports last week that the technical head was seeking to leave Red Bull.

"Adrian Newey is an iconic engineer in Formula One with a great track record and again, also there are so many people talking about what he eventually might do and whether he leaves Red Bull or not," said Wolff.

"I'm just looking at it like a fan and watching that space." Mercedes are bringing an upgrade package to Miami after a patchy season so far. Hamilton finished

runner-up in the first sprint of the season in Shanghai on April 24 but has otherwise yet to finish higher than seventh. Team mate George Russell has a best of fifth and Mercedes are fourth overall.

"We don't really know what to expect because it's been a tricky season so far. Let's see what the stopwatch says," said Wolff, who attended the event with Hamilton.

Hamilton took the wheel at a Formula One demonstration run on Manhattan's Fifth Avenue on Tuesday.

The Mercedes car also has a 'WhatsApp button' on the steering wheel that drivers can press when they want to talk to their engineers.

"WhatsApp is all about secure and instant communication and the main interaction between the driver and the engineers is via that button... it's such an innovative idea that all of us came up with and we're very proud," said Wolff.


