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
AHRAINI dancer Abdulrahman Al Hamar aka Huey Flava won first place at the latest edition of the popular Sole DXB breaking competition in Dubai and hopes to further promote the art following its addition as a 'new sport' in the Paris Olympics this year.

Break dance is a dynamic, acrobatic street-born style performed by individuals known as b-boys and b-girls. It's a part of hip-hop culture, which originated in the African American community in the Bronx in New York City.

B-boy Huey was one of two to represent the kingdom at Sole DXB, an annual lifestyle and street culture festival, held in Dubai Design District in the UAE. The event features a range of artistic mediums including dance to create an enjoyable, educational experience.

Celebrating hip-hop culture, the 2023 edition held in December witnessed the participation of 120 dancers from countries around the world, including Bahrain, Oman, Saudi Arabia, the UAE, Kuwait, Morocco, Tunisia, the US, Russia, France and the UK. Huey bagged the first place, spotlighting Bahrain's breaking scene on a regional platform.

"It was a great experience performing in an energetic atmosphere with so many other creative people," the 29-year-old told *GulfWeekly*. "Not only did I get to connect with other dancers but also to learn – the judges provided

us with valuable feedback.
All in all, I will cherish the experience as it pushed me to reach new heights, and offered me the opportunity to be part of such a vibrant community."
Huey got into breaking

Huey got into breaking by chance in 2007 when he came across some people throwing shapes at Andalus garden. The style intrigued him but it remained just a hobby until the day he met his hero a year later – then, there was no looking back.

"I met my inspiration (international breaking sensation) Jawhar Zitouni aka Jazzy Zilla from Tunisia and learned a lot about dance from him. I have been breaking for 17 years and it's been an enriching experience, learning and competing," he revealed.

The Zayed Town resident

is a three-time winner of the Red Bull BC One Bahrain Cypher and claimed the Middle East crown in 2018 when he bagged first place in the Red Bull BC One Cypher Middle East. In 2019, he was invited to participate in Dancesport, a competitive dance competition that's part of the Asian Games, and came fourth. Huey has also qualified for other international dance events like the popular Yalta Summer Jam in 2019 and took part in several small jams in the Gulf region. In a double whammy,

the kingdom had its proud moment when Bahraini

b-boy Mubarak Salmeen aka Brookie Funk qualified in the top four at Sole DXB. He has won many local and regional competitions, including Battle Of The Year in Dubai in 2012, the Slam Fam jam in Dubai in 2017 and 2018, and the Keep It Real jam in Thailand in 2017.

Brookie Funk, also a Jazzy Zilla fan, took up the dance form after being inspired by his brother Ahmed Salmeen — one of the first generation of Bahraini break dancers. He has been practising the art for the last 17 years.

"Ahmed was one of the best but had to stop due to a car accident. That didn't deter him and he switched to music and became a DJ. He is one of my greatest inspirations," the 30-year-old explained, adding that he decided to 'carry on the tradition'.

Breaking first featured at the Summer Youth Olympic Games in Buenos Aires in 2018 and following its outstanding success, it was added to the Paris 2024 Olympic programme as a new sport, which has lit a spark in the hearts of local talents to represent their country on an international scale.

"Our passion for breaking has given us motivation to work hard and grow in the regional and international scenes, and having a sponsor will surely help us further to represent Bahrain in many global events and even the 2024 Paris Olympics," Brookie Funk said.

"We are focused on investing in the younger generations' growth by conducting regular classes in several schools and studios. Our goal is to have a place of our own to teach and share the positivity of hip-hop," he added.

Both Huey and Brookie Funk are actively involved with the Red Ants Army, a local 'authentic hip-hop movement' established in 2008.

ORMER Bahrain resident Arnab Sengupta has published his third book, filled with poems based on his experiences growing up as a teenager in the kingdom before moving to the UK for his higher studies.

The 18-year-old poet, who grew up in India, Bahrain and the UK, published Luminescence: 50 Poems, umpTEEN Hues recently, dealing with more mature themes than his debut book Iridescence - 50 Poems by a Teenage Dreamer, released in 2020.

"I think my writing deals with more mature themes now, so it has been categorised as young adult rather than kids' poetry," Arnab, who is currently pursuing his education in London, told GulfWeekly.

"My vocabulary has expanded considerably and my style has evolved, however, my introspective writing process has remained consistent."

As GulfWeekly previously reported in 2020, Arnab's first book Iridescence reflected four themes - the hidden world, the blues, hope and relationships.

His latest book is divided into six sections.

"From truth-revealing poems that illuminate the 'lightbulb' in our minds, to the poems that do 'firefighting' required to extinguish the fires of the world; from the 'daydreaming' poems that shine a light on my soul, to 'pentapoetic', a special section that deals with five poems that were written in the span of 30 minutes about the emotions I felt in that pocket of time; from the poems that were dedicated to the people who showed me the light like 'fireflies', to the poems about radiant love that burns yet soothes like the 'sunflowers' flourishing in the gardens of the world, these poems paint a journey from the darkness of uncertainty to the light of introspection and selfconsciousness," the young writer explained.



"As this book was named after the phenomenon of producing light without heat, I wanted each of the sections to be named after sources of light.

"I did come up with them in hindsight, as I usually do with my poetry.

"I never limit myself to certain topics, and really write about a lot of things. Sections are made in hindsight, once the time to generalise them arrives.

But the poems overlap between sections.'

Having lived in Bahrain for nearly five years, Arnab moved to the UK earlier this year with his parents.

In addition to Iridescence, he has also previously published a novel NOMD – Will Five Teenagers Save the Planet Earth'.

"I write whenever an idea strikes me,' he explained, when asked

"I write very often, in fact, I cannot imagine a week without writing. I find my inspiration in everyday things. In the minutiae of everyday life. I think we often ignore these 'ordinary' moments and simply look for beauty elsewhere, whilst all this time, the beauty was in these moments that we ignored so carelessly.

capture the essence of these moments and show the world the beauty of life itself so they can appreciate it more often.

"Sadness arises, according to me, when we fail to appreciate our life.'

Arnab has won several poetry prizes, including 'Outstanding Gen Z Poet' by Dr Anamika, the first female poet to win the Sahitya

Akademi Award, one of the highest honours for poets in India.

He is also a musician, and has released a number of singles including Sunflower, Dead End, One Man Show, Memories, and Secret Crush.

Luminescence was officially launched at Harbour Hotel, St Ives, UK by James Murphy, the Europe-focused leader for Al Gore's Climate Reality Project, alongside storyteller and researcher Serena Rosaria.

Not one to rest on his laurels, Arnab is already working on his next project, which deals with loss.

"Loss is something humans find difficult to comprehend, and how much ever we try to fix ourselves, just like we try to fix a broken pot, there's a sliver that just is lost into the sands of time," he explained.

"This next project tries to capture that, and deals with how to deal with loss."

IX of Bahrain's top creatives are threading the needle between the art and craft of fabric in a unique exhibition being showcased in Muharraq.

The Beyond the Thread group exhibition, which runs until May 30, features art pieces by Bader Al Saad, Christine Khonjie, Giuse Maggi, Hala Kaiksow, Mhairi Boyle and Noor Alwan, and is on display at the Bin Matar House under the umbrella of Shaikh Ebrahim Centre for Culture and Research.

"The artists in the exhibition have embraced textiles, fabrics and fibres as one of their primary mediums and sensitively explore material and process for artistic expression, metaphorical meaning and tool for critically questioning our environmental footprint and social impact of economic production processes," the exhibition's curator Melissa Enders-Bhatia told *GulfWeekly*.

"By so doing, the selected artists also tap into the rich textile and craft heritage in Bahrain, from the weavers in the village of Bani Jamra to the Kurar and Al Naqda embroidery traditions, the use of the indigenous palm tree for palm leaf weaving and paper making and inspiration from local Islamic architecture and embedded abstract decorative patterns.

"Fibre art has broadened the idea of what art can be and embraced the symbolism, embedded knowledge and gendered and colonial histories inherent in the medium. The artists in the exhibition show us unique interpretations of this medium through artworks created specifically for the exhibition *Beyond the Thread.*"

In Bader's (Instagram: @ imbaderthanthat) So My Heart May Be At Peace series, the needlework artist stitches together his passion for cross-stitching with his spiritual connection with the Holy Quran.

According to Bader, this collection encapsulates the Sufi pursuit of a peaceful soul by embodying four main characteristics: 'ekhlas' (Arabic: devotion), 'tawakul' (surrender), 'sabr' (patience),

and 'ehsan' (excellence/doing good). These four main characteristics are then broken down into three pillars: 'alamer' (God's commands), 'alwa'ad' (God's promises), and 'al jaza'a' (God's rewards).

Meanwhile, Hala's (IG: @halakaiksow) *Rooting Systems* explores a return to land, both metaphorically and physically, and what it means to shape and be shaped by the environment.

"In this work I explore paper as a medium that can be both rigid and fluid, that can offer shelter but maintain its fragility at the same time," she explained.

"The work is then embroidered with cloth and thread that takes its colour from the madder root that has been harvested from my garden to create the vibrant blood-red hue, that guides the audience through the work and allows them to take refuge under its lines."

Similarily, Mhairi (IG: @ mhairi.boyle) has drawn her inspiration from Bahrain's natural features, building on her 2020 project *What She Sees*, which was exhibited in the Bahrain Pavilion at Expo 2020 in Dubai.

Her four-part *inLAND* | *COASTal* series uses natural dyes created with dried date seeds, spices and locally grown herbs as well as seaweed.

"The pieces are all hand

woven by Habib Al Rasool from Bani Jamrah, who has inherited the craft and knowledge from his late grandfather, and father Saleh Al Rasool," she added.

Noor (IG:@noornalwan) is also building on a previous work, adding to her 2021 series *Sacred Spaces*, which adapts her grandfather, Mohamed Janahi's drawings into spatial installations using embroidery on textiles.

In Sacred Sanctum, she is inspired by a dome in one of his earliest drawings of a mosque, and reinterprets it into a human-scale size made out of multi-coloured sheer organza and embroidery.

"The hung dome with its translucency and movement

invites people to enter and experience it within to create a fleeting space of sanctuary," she added.

Over in the Forever series, Italian multidisciplinary artist Giuse (IG:@ fibre.e.natura) addresses the importance of repurposing salvaged materials, exploring the interplay between form and colour, experimenting with plastic materials and employing textile techniques including quiltying, stitching, mending, embroidery and crocheting.

Drawing inspiration from Bauhaus textile art, she integrates simple coloured shapes to convey depth and create an illusion of dimension.

"Deliberately narrative threads, through embroidery, connect the fabric's composition, allowing abstract landscapes to emerge," she added.

Taking inspiration from her passion for prehistory, Christine's (IG:@khonjie) *Embroidering My Shadow* piece builds on nature-based myths in a style reminiscent of historic cave paintings.

"Embroidering is walking step by step on an unknown path, tying up the thread, cutting it, going forward again, and losing my way, from light to darkness, the needle tattooing a dream body," she explained.

SONG FOR PEACE

S rapper Macklemore ignited social media this week with the release of *Hind's Hall*, paying homage to a Columbia University building renamed by student protesters, and tackling the ongoing Israel-Palestine conflict.

The song is a powerful anthem that pays tribute to Hind Rajab, a six-yearold Palestinian girl killed by Israeli forces in Gaza.

It samples the iconic Ana La Habibi (Arabic: I belong to my love) by Fairouz, weaving a melancholic yet hopeful soundscape.

Macklemore, a longtime advocate for Palestinian rights, pulls no punches. The lyrics critique the status quo, questioning the perception of peaceful actions like divestment from Israel as threats. Lines like, The people, they won't leave/What is threatening about divesting and wanting peace? highlight the song's core message.

More than just a condemnation of the conflict, the song celebrates student activism. Macklemore praises the protesters who occupied Columbia's



Hamilton Hall, forcing its renaming to 'Hind's Hall', and urges others to follow suit: Block the barricade until Palestine is free.

Macklemore references police brutality, systemic oppression, and the silencing of dissent on social media. This creates a powerful tapestry that connects the Palestinian struggle to contemporary issues in the United States.

The release comes amidst renewed tensions in the Middle East and US. Pro-Palestinian protests erupted on college campuses across the US in recent weeks, echoing the actions depicted in the song.

Macklemore announced that all proceeds from the song will be donated to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East.

This move further amplifies the message of solidarity with the

Palestinian people. The song's impact is undeniable.

Though not yet available on mainstream streaming platforms, a preview clip posted on Macklemore's *Instagram* has already garnered millions of views.

"This is a powerful and necessary song," said Sarah Jones, a student activist from Georgetown University. "It's great to see an artist with such a platform use their voice to speak up for what's right."

Hind's Hall has reignited discussions about the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, student activism, and the role of artists in social change.

DANCEABLE ANTHEMS

RITISH-ALBANIAN pop powerhouse Dua Lipa has dropped her highly anticipated third studio album Radical Optimism after a four-year hiatus since the disco-fuelled triumph of Future Nostalgia.

The album, released on May 3 boasts an impressive list of collaborators, including Tame Impala's Kevin Parker and pop veteran Ian Kirkpatrick.

The artist delivers on her promise of a 'psychedelic-pop-infused tribute to UK rave culture'.

Lead single Houdini sets the tone with its pulsating bassline and hypnotic vocals, while Training Season throws in a

dose of electro-pop grit.

Tracks like *Illusion* and *Come with Me* showcase her knack for crafting catchy hooks and earworm melodies, perfect for latenight club sets.

However, some critics have found the album lacking in the depth and innovation that she established with *Future Nostalgia*.

While the production is polished and the sonic palette is diverse, the overall sound leans heavily on familiar pop formulae.

Tracks like Don't Go Twisting My Words and French Exit feel like retreads of previous hits, lacking the originality that made Dua Lipa a pop phenomenon. Despite the mixed reviews, *Radical Optimism* is undeniably a collection of well-crafted pop anthems.

Her signature sultry vocals and confident delivery shine throughout, and the album's undeniable danceability makes it a perfect soundtrack for carefree summer nights. Ultimately, *Radical Optimism* is a solid pop album that delivers on its promise of danceable anthems.

While it may not reach the groundbreaking heights of *Future Nostalgia*, it reaffirms Lipa's position as a pop powerhouse with a knack

for crafting infectious tunes.

Born in London to Albanian parents,

Dua Lipa's musical journey began at a young age, heavily

influenced by her father's rock band background.

At 15, she returned to London with aspirations of becoming a singer, uploading covers and original songs online while working as a waitress.

Her breakthrough came with the 2015 self-titled debut album, featuring hits like *New Love* and *Be the One* establishing her signature sound: a blend of 70's disco, 80's pop, and 90's club music.

Her sophomore album, *Future Nostalgia*, cemented her status as a global pop phenomenon, winning critical acclaim and multiple awards, including three Grammys.

"But he's got one more thing now hasn't he – world champion!"




