Virtual vortex



AHRAINI filmmaker and director Maryam Abdulghaffar's latest film, inspired by the hidden complexities of the digital realm, is making waves at film festivals around the world.

Noor Al Ezla (Arabic for 'the light of isolation') has also earned an honourable mention at the prestigious Egyptian Aswan International Women's Film Festival (AIWFF).

Maryam was the only Bahraini to be shortlisted by AIWFF and to receive a grant to produce her film.

The seven-minute Arabic movie, with English subtitles, revolves around Muhammad, a reclusive young man struggling to connect with people. He spends his days alone. One day, he comes across a beautiful girl named Nour on *Instagram* and they soon fall in love. However, after some time, Muhammad discovers that Nour is not a real person.

"I had a dream about artificial intelligence (AI) taking over people and controlling them, which got me thinking. I decided to build on the notion and make it a script for a film," Maryam told *GulfWeekly*. The AIWFF empowers aspiring filmmakers and offers financial support and resources to produce films and the 34-year-old submitted her idea.

"I didn't think anything of it but they selected my script and so I travelled to Aswan in Egypt in February and directed the film," she said. "We were provided with the crew and actors and I loved the experience," she added.

During the screening at AIWFF last month, *Noor Al Ezla* got an honourable mention from the judges because of its 'cinematic feel'.

"It was a great moment and all the hard work had paid off. I remember that there were limited resources to work with, but this was good because it challenged our creativity," Maryam said.

"We shot the film in one and a half days with a completely new cast who didn't have much experience in front of a camera. We faced some challenges training them and choosing the right location, especially since we had limited time, but thank God it all went well. I had to remove some parts of the film during editing since I felt it would work well without them," the Hamad Town resident revealed.

Maryam has been the recipient of numerous awards for her films, documentaries and photographs. She also won in the Media Industry category at the Middle East Women Leaders Award last year. In addition to exhibiting a creative streak, she harbours an entrepreneurial spirit and is the founder and chief executive of Imprint Production, which offers marketing consultancy and visual content production services.

Not one to rest on her laurels, Maryam is currently working on two new feature documentaries – her most preferred style of storytelling.

"I can't reveal what they are about at the moment, but I would like to say I will always love documentaries more than narrative films. Documentaries inspire me to tell true and untold stories. That's why I started Imprint Production. It's the first Bahraini production house that focuses only on documentaries," she added.

EOPLE across ages hit the dance floor at a Bhangra workshop led by international dancing sensation Hardy Singh, who visited Bahrain this month as part of his Middle East tour.

Bhangra is a high-energy Indian folk dance style native to the north Indian state of Punjab. The workshop was organised by Aura Arts Centre in Adliya, and Punjabi Virsa, a new expat community, decided to grab the opportunity and offer its members a chance to meet the artist and get to know

Punjabi Virsa was founded in 2023 with the idea of bringing the Punjabi community together by exploring and promoting their culture and traditions - 'virsa' means heritage. The platform also conducts various activities, including Punjabi language classes for children, public speaking sessions and more.

"I am thrilled to be here for the first time, but it's definitely not going to be my last," Hardy told GulfWeekly. "It's endearing to see such a thriving Punjabi community here and also to witness the importance given to art particularly dance. The energy of the workshop is a testament to the vibe of this island," the dancer and professional trainer for more than 15 years added.

Hardy is no stranger to the Gulf and grew up in Dubai where he currently lives with his wife Sarbjeet Kaur. While he has been dancing since the tender age of 10, he formally established Pure Bhangra, arguably the only 'happening' Bhangra crew in the Middle East, in November 2011. He has led dance workshops in the UAE and around the world, and also travelled to judge various competitions, including Bhangra Dance



Off in Malaysia, Bhangra Auckland Da in New Zealand, the Youth Fest for Middlesex University in London, and many more.

"Dance and music is such an integral part of Punjabi culture. Bhangra is in my blood and so, I decided to take my love for this art form to the next level and started Pure Bhangra with just seven crew members. Today, we are more than 30 of us and together, we have hosted numerous workshops in the UAE, Muscat, and Delhi," he said.

"Seeing the enthusiasm

in Bahrain, I would love to have similar workshops here and I live right next door (in Dubai), which makes it all the more tempting," he added.

The social media sensation, who holds degrees in mechanical engineering, interior design, and finance and marketing, has close to 75,000 fans on *Instagram* alone where he posts videos of his workshops that he conducts with Sarbjeet, and collaborations, including with viral dance group Quick Style earlier this month.

Nine dimensions



UNIQUE exhibition immersing art lovers into the creative minds of nine talented contemporary Bahraini and Arab artists is taking centre-stage on the walls of Al Bareh Art Gallery.

The Nine by Nine exhibition, which opened last week and runs until June 5, highlights the work of Bahraini artists Abbas Yousif, Adnan Alahmed, Ali Mubarak, Hassan Alsari, Jamal Al Yousif, Khalid Farhan and Mohammed Almahdi, alongside Emirati Najat Makki and Iraqi Salem Mathkour.

"This innovative show offers a unique experience, granting each featured artist their own dedicated wall space that transforms into a personal, self-contained gallery," curator Hayfa Aljishi told GulfWeekly.

"As you wander through the exhibition halls, you'll encounter nine distinct spaces, each one a window into an individual artist's singular creative universe. Here, viewers can fully immerse themselves in the unique artistic vision and process of each participant. The walls contain a variety of painted murals and sculptural installations.

"Despite the diverse backgrounds, media, and aesthetic approaches of the nine artists, the dedicated wall format celebrates their individuality, allowing each creative voice to resonate independently."

Hassan, who serves as the Bahrain Arts Society's exhibition and activities committee head, drew his inspiration for his piece Frida Kahlo from the turbulent artistic and personal life of the illustrious Mexican

His large-scale mixed media on canvas piece pays homage to the artist through details like pictures and canvases as well as colourful abstractions, set against a sunset yellow background.

"I have drawn from her life story since childhood, including the traffic accident that left her bedridden for long periods, and her experience living through recurring tragedies, as she painted the path of life and the features of hope and optimism in her works despite her suffering," he added.

what happens when trauma shatters the self without completely disintegrating it.

The six intact faces, facing different directions, symbolise humanity's indifference to the tragedies of others, while the circular ring represents the perpetual state of fragmentation and reintegration that defines the evolving shifts of identities through life's journey - from birth to death.

Acclaimed artist Mohammed Almahdi whose works have been featured at the Edge of Arabia Gallery in London, Sotheby's, Qatar Maritime Symposium and more, took inspiration from a real-life fire in Iraq.

"A fire broke out on September 26, 2023 in a wedding hall in Al Hamdaniya district of Nineveh Governorate in Iraq, resulting in the death of around 122 people and injuring 82 others. I watched the video of this incident... Flames of fire raining down on the heads of the attendees... What caught my attention was the awareness and unawareness, the shock and astonishment and fear!" he explained.

"To commemorate this incident, I present the symbolic work, The Shock, that focuses on the shock amidst the joy."

For Emirati Najat, the idea




of human dignity and honour fascinated her, and although she left hints within her Untitled piece, she wanted each viewer to have their own personal interpretation based on their proximity, inner feeling, and what the work evokes in them.

In Paused Dream, Iraqi Salem paints an image of recurring nostalgia, symbolising it through a boat ride down memory canal.

"This moment is conveyed through a contemporary cinematic montage technique... One memory is summoned that summarises different years of my life, shrinking, swelling, or perhaps fading away... Although it happened only once, it kept on repeating... It is a Sumerian dream," he explained.





ATAVISTA: Childish Gambino

IP HOP fans were in for a surprise this week, with the release of a new album by US musician Donald Glover, under his musical alias Childish Gambino.

rapper dropped Atavista, featuring verses from Ariana Grande, 21 Savage, Summer Walker, and more, sprinkled across 11 tracks.

"This album is the finished version of 3.15.20, the album I put out four years ago," the artist explained, in a statement posted on his social media accounts.

Atavista features polished versions of existing tracks alongside the new song, Little Foot Big Foot, featuring rapper Young Nudy. The song boasts a spacey, funk-infused sound reminiscent of Prince, a clear influence on Childish Gambino's musical style. This influence is further explored throughout the album, with

some critics finding it derivative. However, others see it as a 'palette cleanser' in the crowded rap scene.

The album has sparked discussions, with some praising the refined sound and others questioning the need for a near-remake.

Atavista arrives alongside the announcement of Danny's impending retirement of the Childish Gambino moniker, under which he plans to release one more album Bando Stone & The New World this summer, as the soundtrack for his upcoming film of the same name.

This two-album send-off adds context to *Atavista* potentially framing it as a final revisiting of an earlier artistic chapter.

SEASON OF HEARTBREAK

HE wait is finally over for fans of lavish regency romance as the first part of *Bridgerton's* third season arrives on *Netflix* today, May 16.

The highly anticipated season marks a departure from the previous format, with the eight episodes split into two releases. The second volume of episodes will drop on June 13.

RESH off the electric Miami Grand Prix,
Formula 1 is headed this weekend to a legendary venue – Imola, Italy.

This historic track boasts a rich past, having debuted on the calendar in 1980 as the San Marino Grand Prix, holding a permanent spot until 2006, witnessing legendary battles and unforgettable moments.

After a hiatus exploring new territories, Imola made a triumphant return in 2020, initially as a substitute during the Covid-19 pandemic. Its popularity cemented its longterm future under the banner of the Emilia-Romagna Grand Prix. This name reflects the region's vibrant history, mouthwatering cuisine, and deep connection to motorsport, being home to giants like Ferrari, Haas F1 team partners Dallara and Scuderia Ferrari itself – all nestled within the famed 'Motor Valley."

Unfortunately, last year's race was cancelled due to devastating floods that ravaged Imola and its surroundings. The focus shifted to disaster relief, with F1 and its partners joining the effort to support the affected communities. Now, after a one-year absence, the paddock is eager to reacquaint itself with the demanding 4.9km track.

This race weekend signifies a return to tradition after consecutive F1 Sprint events in Shanghai and Miami.

This European season opener is packed with storylines, from a resurgent McLaren to a poignant return to a hallowed ground.

MCLAREN'S MOMENTUM

McLaren's Miami performance was a revelation. Downplaying their pre-race upgrades, they silenced doubters as Lando Norris secured a stunning victory. Norris, on older tyres, chased down the front runners, showcasing the car's true potential. Oscar Piastri, sporting a partial upgrade, held his own against Max Verstappen until race incidents intervened. With the full upgrade arriving in Imola, the question remains: Can McLaren consistently challenge Red Bull? Miami offered a glimpse, but Imola will be the true test.

THE FAST AND THE FERRARI

McLaren's win wasn't the only eye-catching performance. Ferrari, too, are hungry for victory at their home race. While

Charles Leclerc secured a podium finish in Miami, the performance gap with Red Bull remains narrow. Notably, Ferrari dominated in Australia, demonstrating their potential. Red Bull's vulnerability this season, with more early-season losses than all of last year, adds fuel to the fire. With a significant upgrade rumoured for Imola, the stage is set for a potential Ferrari fightback, especially considering the upcoming Monaco race.

THOUGHTS AND PRAYERS

his year's Imola Grand ■ Prix carries a special weight. Devastating floods last year forced the race's cancellation. The sport's €1 million donation to the relief fund showcases a commitment to the region's recovery. However, the return also coincides with the 30th anniversary of the tragic deaths of Ayrton Senna and Roland Ratzenberger. A special event on May 1 saw thousands of fans commemorate the legendary drivers. Tributes are

expected throughout the race weekend, with four-time world champion Sebastian Vettel set to take the wheel of Senna's 1993 McLaren MP4/8 for a display.

PRODIGY RISING

Beyond the main event, Formula 2's return to Imola brings its own spotlight.

Mercedes youngster Andrea Kimi Antonelli is turning heads. Despite being underage for F1, Williams has requested a special Super Licence dispensation to allow him to race this year. Antonelli's recent testing with Mercedes F1 machinery and his solid performance in Formula 2 fuel the excitement.

This rookie, looking for his first podium, will be under close scrutiny at Imola. His teammate, Oliver Bearman, a Ferrari reserve driver, seeks a strong result after a challenging start to his season.

MAGNUSSEN ON EDGE

The spotlight isn't solely on championship contenders. Kevin Magnussen finds himself under scrutiny after a Miami weekend filled with penalty points. While battling Lewis Hamilton for a vital point in the sprint, Magnussen received a penalty for exceeding track limits. His subsequent aggressive tactics defending his team position against Hamilton resulted in further penalties.

McLaren principal Andrea Stella's comments about potential race suspensions for deliberate, damaging manoeuvres add a layer of pressure. With 10 penalty points already acquired, just two more before March 2025 would trigger an automatic one-race ban. Magnussen will need to tread carefully in Imola.

The weekend promises to be brimming with excitement — on and off the track. From championship battles to poignant remembrances, the Tifosi roar will welcome F1 back to this historic venue, ready for drama, speed, and emotion.
