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Tales of an island

POPULAR book which shares the stories of 100 Bahrain lovers, both citizens and expatriates from across the island, will once again be available for eager fans next Wednesday.

Spellbinding storyteller Tanzeel Jabbar-Khadir, 45, is set to release a reprint of her popular book 100 Bahrain Stories, which was first released in 2018.

this book's initial publication and nearly a decade since its inception. In that time Bahrain has witnessed shifts, yet its essence endures," the Australian expatriate with Indian-Pakistani heritage, who has lived in Bahrain for 16 years, told GulfWeekly.

"This re-release upholds the tradition of celebrating humanity.

"The stories are so special, I want them to be loved and



appreciated all over again. "Over the years, people have contacted me asking if I still have copies of the book.

Now I can finally say there

are more copies available!"

Featuring stunning portraits, alongside quoted vignettes of each featured individual's life, Tanzeel's self-funded project is, from start to finish, a product of Bahrain, "Six years have passed since highlighting local stories, and being printed locally.

> The first print of 1,000 copies quickly sold out, after online followers of the Facebook project spread the word and made it a success.

"Facebook was still in vogue in 2015 and when I initially began posting each story online, my project gained a steady following," Tanzeel reminisced.

"Once it went to print, I think it was my followers that spread the word of the book's release and made it a small success. It was also exciting that part of the profits from the sale of the book were donated to local charities like Rotaract Bahrain and The Saturday Biryani Party With Workers. It was good to give back to the local community in some small way."

AUTHOR:

In her introduction to the book, Tanzeel, a lawyer by profession who lives in Janabiya with her husband and two children, emphasises that the 'construct of identity is a central theme in most, if not all of the stories'.

In the reprint, she has also included a small tribute to those who have passed away since the book was first released.

Among these is the late journalist and entrepreneur Abdullah Jonathan Wallace, who died last year, aged 79, in Bahrain where he made his home for the previous

18 years. In his foreword to the original book, Abdullah had spoken of how it reflected 'not only the broad spectrum of the multinational community of expatriates living in Bahrain today, but the diversity of Bahrainis themselves, whose ancestry has been shaped over five millennia of recorded history'.

With stories from nationals hailing from Australia, Bahrain, Bangladesh, Belarus, Belgium, Egypt, France, Germany, India, Ireland, Italy, Jordan, Kenya, Lebanon, Pakistan, Philippines, Singapore, Spain, Sri Lanka, UK and the US, the book is a true mosaic of the kingdom's cultural canvas.

Tanzeel, who did most of the interviewing, writing and photography for the book, getting help with a handful of stories and photographs from some of her talented friends,

has already started collecting stories for a sequel. "I am working on another Bahrain Stories - I'm not

sure it will be a 100 this time," she added. "I am in the process of interviewing once again and

it's exciting to get back to it. I am looking for more stories, so if readers want to recommend someone, please feel free to message me on Instagram. "I am excited to be guided

by the people my audience wants to hear about. I'm also trying to post primarily on Instagram and am also considering Substack. Facebook seems a little archaic now!"

The reprint of 100 Bahrain Stories will be available for BD13 at Jashanmal with more bookstores to be announced soon.

S Bahrain's burgeoning cosplay community grows, its rising stars are eager for more local and regional opportunities and support to showcase their art form, writes Rima AlHaddad.

For these magnificent masqueraders, cosplay - a portmanteau of costume and play – is more than just dressing up as a fictional character from a TV show, movie, comic book or cartoon. It's all about embodying their energy as they come to life.

"When I started, I wasn't a social person, but I was able to find communities that loved the same shows as me during pop culture conventions, which is also where I discovered cosplaying," Isah Jani (Instagram: @ brokenswordcosplay) told GulfWeekly.

"Cosplayers welcomed me



with open arms. Cosplay boosted not just my selfesteem, but also gave me the courage to be able to interact with other people.

"When I cosplay, I enjoy talking to others and hearing their opinions as well as how they perceived my costume of the character that they didn't believe they would be able to find.

"That's what really interested me, I found the

community I was looking for while cosplaying certain characters and seeing different sub-cultures around our small country."

The 28-year-old has seen the community grow since he got into the hobby seven years ago, crediting the rising number of pop culture conventions in Bahrain and across the Middle East for the growth in popularity.

He also sees many more

avenues opening up for newcomers and experienced players to level up their skills and cited the example of a recent workshop titled Cosplay Essentials organised at a local café by Hasan 'Osmology' Mohamed (*IG*: @awesome_ology).

"I hosted and organised the workshop to keep the community fresh and alive, and I think my efforts ignited something within the local community," Hasan explained.

The workshop served as an introduction for newcomers to cosplay basics like makeup, crafting and wigmaking.

Hasan, 25, who recently won the best performance award at this year's Middle East Film and Comic Con and will be a guest judge at Compass Abu Dhabi on Saturday, hopes to offer workshops with certificates, to provide cosplayers with a 'solid' and 'academic route' for levelling up their skills.

From costume sewing and crafting to wig styling and makeup, as well as acting and performing, cosplayers put a lot of thought, time and effort into every aspect of their usually solo, and sometimes collaborative act.

Competitions and summits with cash prizes offer rising cosplayers a chance to pursue the art form professionally, or at least reduce the cost of the hobby, which can get pricey quickly.

Professional gamer Marwa Ashoor (*IG*: @ marwaashoor), who is currently on hiatus from cosplaying, reflected on how expensive purchasing costumes and other materials can get. She highlighted that



cheaper alternative resources are often available and even suggested shopping locally to save money.

"Communicating your cosplay designs to a local tailor will give you a better idea since they are more experienced and they can help you bring it to life, and usually for a cheaper price than online purchases," she explained.

"In the cosplay community, personally designed cosplays

are more of a challenge and they are appreciated," Marwa added.

In a community that sometimes gets a bad reputation for sexualising characters from pop culture, the 27-year-old has also become an advocate for modest cosplay, saying that it should be appreciated and deserves its own category.

And while some may deem cosplay to be 'all play and no work,' Bahraini-Kuwaiti

cosplayer Danah 'Vitsuna' Alshatti (*IG: vitsuna_*), who also studies marketing at Kuwait Technical College, is quick to disagree, saying that these experiences give her 'real life' skills like improving her confidence in front of audiences, both at conventions and in the classroom.

"It can be scary at first, but once you're on stage, there's no better feeling," the 20-year-old explained.

She recently won second place in Kuwait's Comfest in the performance category and first place at Bahrain Comic Con 2022 in crafting.

Vitsuna has set her eye on the international stage, hoping to reach a global audience and maybe one day represent her country at the World Cosplay Summit.



New beginnings

AHRAIN-BASED creative and social entrepreneur Ramanpreet Praveen, better known as Preety Praveen, shares her empowering story, through adversity to the stars, as she embarks on a new journey as GulfWeekly's columnist, writes Melissa Nazareth.

An ambitious and driven individual, Preety had big dreams of becoming a dentist. However, life took a different turn when she met with a horrifying accident that forced her to drop out of college.

"My low phase started after my accident where my right femur bone broke into two pieces," the 49-year-old told *GulfWeekly*. "I had to leave college in the final year. I couldn't walk without support for more than a year. Blaming myself, I hid under the layers of loneliness and guilt.

"It took me years to understand that I wasn't being myself and wasn't helping either myself or my dear ones. That's when I made up my mind and decided to pursue a career in psychology."

Preety chose to complete her education as a way to empower herself and bring 'life back into her soul'. She obtained a Master's in Alternative Medicine



"It's more than a decade that I've been practising

counselling, but as a freelancer. I've dedicated my knowledge to helping people who juggle and struggle to clear the network of their thoughts and make wise decisions to have a smooth normal life. A healthy, open conversation can help."

When the Covid-19

pandemic hit, Preety reached out to people, the majority of whom were strangers, and helped them get over their emotional struggles.

"There was one lady I met and it took me more than five months to put a smile on her face, but I succeeded. She is living a happy, normal life with her family now," she revealed.

Preety observed how the pandemic put a strain on people's emotional wellbeing. And, while the digital world has gradually taken over our daily routine, relationships, and thought processes, she believes the 'punch' was the long pandemic phase.

"That's when I thought of creating a platform, where all of us can share our thoughts and opinions on a common subject, learn from each other's experiences, and figure out solutions to small issues that we fail to address," she added.

NOOPY returns for a third time on Apple TV+ with the latest Peanuts comic strip adaptation, Camp Snoopy, streaming on June 14.

Produced by Peanuts and WildBrain, the cosy light-hearted cartoon series will follow beloved canine character Snoopy's adventures with his Beagle Scouts troop to earn their badges, crossing paths with his owner Charlie Brown and friends as they enjoy the outdoor experience.


The show was directed by Rob Boutilier, who also worked on Apple TV+'s The Snoopy Show and Snoopy in Space. He is also a credited executive producer alongside two-time Daytime Emmy nominee Craig Schulz, son of the Peanuts creator Charles M Schulz.


In a recent interview, Rob highlighted the essentialism of translating the creator and illustrator's art style from comic strips to the animated series.

"I was expressing my admiration of Schulz's pen and brush lines in those strips with our art director, Joseph Holt, when we asked ourselves the question: 'What would a classic special have looked like if Schulz had drawn the backgrounds?"" Carrying his father's legacy, Craig has worked on several adaptations of the comic strip. He co-wrote the first Peanuts special produced without his father's involvement titled Happiness Is a Warm Blanket, Charlie Brown, released in 2011.

The producer and screenwriter is currently the president and CEO of Charles M Schulz Creative Associates, managing the Peanuts brand licence.

The Peanuts characters first landed on Apple TV+ in 2019 with *Snoopy in Space*, which ran for two seasons and ended in November 2021. The streaming service's second Peanuts adaptation The Snoopy Show has earned four awards since its February 2021 premiere, including best animated programme or series at the 2023 Canadian Screen Awards. The show currently consists of three seasons, with the most recent being released a year ago.





While the comic strip and its adaptations focus on the universe's animal characters, Apple TV+ has released several Peanuts specials that highlight the

human characters, the latest one being Snoopy Presents: Welcome Home, Franklin, which focused on Franklin Armstrong and Charlie



LECTROPOP and folk artist Aurora is set to release her fourth studio album titled What Happened to the Heart? tomorrow (June 7).

The 27-year-old singer expressed in an interview that she was inspired by the heart as a symbol and metaphor.

"I was looking at the history of the heart and what the heart has been a symbol for. Even before we knew about the anatomy of a human as scientifically as we do now, we talked about the heart and the core," she said. On the process of making the album, the Cure for

Born Aurora Aksnes, the Norwegian artist embarked on her career in 2012 when she self-released her debut single titled *Puppet* under her birth name.

She rose to fame when her 2015 single Runaway caught the attention of pop sensations Katy Perry and Troye Sivan.

Her third album titled The Gods We Can Touch gained critical acclaim and was Spotify's third most streamed album upon its release week in 2022.

Magical Montreal HE roar of engines narrowed significantly,

and scent of burning rubber return to Montreal this week as Formula One descends upon the **Circuit Gilles Villeneuve** for the 2024 Canadian **Grand Prix.**

This iconic race, nestled on the picturesque Île Notre-Dame, promises a captivating weekend of ontrack battles, fuelled by a resurgent championship fight, intriguing driver dynamics, and a circuit notorious for its unforgiving nature.

After three different winners in the last three races and a narrowing gap between the leaders in the driver standings, this weekend promises plenty of thrills throughout the racing grid.

THREE-WAY THRILL RIDE

The narrative of a predictable championship battle has been shattered. Ferrari sweetheart Charles Leclerc's emphatic victory in Monaco, coupled with raging Red Bull Max Verstappen's misfortune, has injected a dose of excitement into the drivers' championship.

The gap between the two exposed a has potential CHAMPION: **Norris**

down to 31 points, a margin that can be cut in a single race weekend with a bit of strategic brilliance and touch of luck.

This resurgence by Ferrari is further bolstered by their consistent performance throughout the season.

They haven't finished a race outside the points zone yet, demonstrating a level of reliability and pace that Red Bull needs to be wary of.

Meanwhile, McLaren has emerged as a genuine threat. Lando Norris's stunning victory in Miami, albeit aided by a well-timed safety car, showcased the raw pace of the McLaren package.

Their ability to challenge Red Bull and Ferrari on a consistent basis throws another variable into the mix, transforming the championship fight into a captivating three-way battle.

CHINK IN THE ARMOUR?

Red Bull, the undisputed leader in both constructors' and drivers' standings, finds itself in a curious position.

While Verstappen holds a seemingly comfortable 31point lead, recent

Villeneuve, while featuring long straights, also boasts challenging chicanes and bumps, raising concerns about Red Bull's ability to maintain its dominance.

Will they be able to adapt and find a setup that allows Verstappen to exploit the car's raw power, or will their struggles continue, opening the door for his rivals?

INTERNAL COMBUSTION

The drama off the track threatens to spill over onto the asphalt in Montreal.

The collision between Alpine teammates Esteban Ocon and Pierre Gasly in Monaco was a microcosm of simmering tensions within the team.

Ocon's audacious lunge down the inside at Portier, defying team orders and

ultimately taking himself out of the race, left a bitter taste in the mouth of Alpine management.

While the team insists Ocon's departure at the season's end was preplanned, the incident undoubtedly added fuel to the fire. Along similar lines, there are rumours about potential friction between Lewis Hamilton and George Russell at Mercedes.

Hamilton's comments hinting at different treatments within the team suggest that while Mercedes maintains a facade of equality, internal dynamics could play a crucial role in the latter stages of the championship.

THE ASTON MAGIC?

Aston Martin, the surprise package of 2023, finds itself in a precarious position. The midfield battle has intensified as traditional powerhouses like Ferrari and McLaren have returned to form.

While Aston Martin has shown steady development, it hasn't been enough to keep pace with the front-runners.

Fernando Alonso's concerns about slipping back into the midfield pack are well-

However, Canada offers a glimmer of hope. Last year, Alonso secured a podium finish here, showcasing the car's ability to perform well on certain circuits.

HIGH-OCTANE DRAMA

The Canadian Grand Prix transcends mere on-track action; it's a spectacle.

The Circuit Gilles Villeneuve itself plays a starring role.

Long straights offer ample overtaking opportunities, while tight chicanes and unforgiving walls demand precision and punish mistakes severely.

Last year's race, with Alex Albon's masterful defence

against a DRS-equipped car, is a testament to the circuit's ability to produce thrilling wheel-to-wheel battles.

Throw in the unpredictable Canadian weather, with the ever-present threat of rain, and Montreal has all the ingredients for a truly captivating weekend of F1 action.



EIGNING F1 champion team Red Bull has found itself in a strategic bind, as it develops and improves on three different racing cars at the same time.

On one hand, with Ferrari and McLaren mounting a serious challenge, pressure is on to improve the current

On top of that, they're already laying the groundwork for 2025's contender.

But looming large is the massive rule overhaul coming in 2026, requiring a completely new car design. This multitasking frenzy coincides with the news of chief technology officer Adrian Newey's departure in early 2025.

Newey, a mastermind behind Red Bull's recent

success, will leave a significant gap to fill. Technical director Pierre Wache acknowledged these challenges and added that another hurdle was taking engine production in-house for the first time.

"The main challenge is how to balance the resource between all these projects," he added.

"We are looking forward, because the more you think about it, the more you can anticipate some issues."

For 2026, they are already planning for the introduction of 'active aero' and a completely new power unit with increased electrical output and sustainable fuels. Red Bull's ability to navigate this three-pronged attack while ensuring engine independence will be critical to their continued success in F1.




