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BAHRAINI mountaineer Mohamed Isa has accomplished the second milestone in his quest to conquer the Seven Summits Challenge, an ambitious goal to scale the highest peak of each of the seven continents.

The 45-year-old climbed Mount Kilimanjaro, the highest in Africa at 5,895metres above sea level – a total distance of 64km both ways.

"It was an exhilarating experience with some challenges along the way, from mild frost bites to even a fall, but I'm happy to say that I overcame them and am proud of what my fellow mountaineers and I have achieved," Mohamed told *GulfWeekly*.

The expedition team of 10 adventurers – six from Oman, two from Kuwait, and one each from Bahrain and Qatar – all made it to the top.

The Seven Summit list, which can vary, includes Mount Everest, Kilimanjaro, Denali, Aconcagua, Vinson Massif, Elbrus and Kosciuszko.

Earlier this year, the adrenaline junkie became the first Bahraini to conquer Mount Kosciuszko, the highest mountain in mainland Australia at 2,228m, a challenge comprising a 26.1-km trek, which he described as 'walking from University of Bahrain's Sakhir campus to The Avenues-Bahrain mall, but uphill'.

"It took me 22 hours to reach my hotel in Moshi, Tanzania. We chose the popular Machame route because it offers spectacular sceneries and allows for ample acclimatisation opportunities and high climbing success rate. "Unfortunately my body did not get accustomed to sleeping in the tents at freezing temperatures and the night before the summit I did not sleep a minute. Furthermore, despite having a variety of food options, I lost my appetite when I reached the Shira Camp at 3,850m.

Discomfort, uneasiness and a strong sensation of nausea set in on the third day when we reached Lava Tower at 4,600m. My team members and our expedition leader Nahid gave me slices of lemons and salt to chew on and were very supportive," he revealed.

After marching from one camp to another and moving up and down to allow their bodies to adjust to the oxygen levels, it was time for the final lap – the 'summit push'. Locally, it's called Uhuru Peak – Swahili for 'freedom'.

"While the plan was simple, the execution was challenging. We left Barafu Camp at 10pm with the aim of catching the sunrise. On the zigzag way to Stella Point, I felt so weak and the sleep deprivation caught up with me. I was thirsty and tried to drink from my camel bag only to discover the pipe was frozen, but my fellow climbers especially Hamad Al Riyami from Oman and my guide Lameck Minja motivated me to push forward.

"We reached Stella Point

at 6.30am and I was relieved to see it, knowing I was getting closer to the summit. Witnessing the majestic glaciers was surreal. It has been my wish to see them before they vanish due to global warming.

"At exactly a minute past eight, I touched the summit of Kilimanjaro - the Roof of Africa. Mission Accomplished!" he said. The finance professional from Saar fell in love with mountains two years ago when he successfully scaled a height of 5,364m to the Everest South Base Camp in Nepal. It was on that trip that he met Suleiman Al Naabi, the first Omani national to complete the Seven Summits Challenge, who he considers a role model.

"Next on the agenda, Mount Elbrus, the highest peak in Europe. If I'm lucky, I will climb Elbrus during my birthday in September, if not, next year. I aim to finish the Seven Summits by 2030," the toastmaster and author of several books said.

Mohamed has written on a range of topics, including investor relations, entrepreneurship and startups, management, and public speaking, and plans to publish a book entitled *Everest Inspiration* in October, documenting his

experience and journey. "One of the guides, Florence, gave me a new name: Mr Kipara. Kipara means 'bald' in Swahili. Not only that, the crew made a song about me. I will cherish these memories forever," he added. For more details on Mohamed's adventures,

Mesmerising melodies

N the heels of dropping her latest original single after a one-year hiatus, Bahraini-Palestinian artist Banah Anabtawi has announced the release of an EP this month, featuring her *Elektroniyat* compositions that blend Arabic classics with international and modern touches.

Entitled *Elektroniyat – Volume I*, the album will showcase three of the musical talent's fusion creations, including classic like Umm Kulthum and Shadia. The project is a collaboration with Joel Gershom, a Bahrain-based producer who has previously been signed by international artists like Paul van Dyk.

"Commercial Arabic music is so diverse nowadays and the trend is moving toward a fusion of sounds. This is what I'm going to try to do with my music as well," the 39-year-old told *GulfWeekly*.

"My previous original music was very Oriental sounding until maybe the last couple of months, with *Majaneen* and *Ayna Anti* having more Western sounds in them. I'm working on bringing some Arabic instrumentation into an electronic sound, which is not always easy because of the various Arabic scales that we have but, if done correctly, it's beautiful and extremely inviting for the Arabic and Western ear," she added.

Last month, the singer and songwriter released the single Galbi ma Yinam, which means 'my heart can't sleep' or 'my heart can't rest'. Characterised by her signature fusion style of Oriental sounds with modern touches, it is a love song inspired by the 'fear of losing someone you love' and has attracted 253,331 views on YouTube. In it, the creative is seen wearing designer gowns with flowy silhouettes from Saks Fifth Avenue – a fitting aesthetic to the mood of the song.

"This track is something I'm super proud of as it features my own musical composition and lyrics – I usually get melody writers and lyricists to help me out, but I decided a couple of months back to take my artistic journey to the next level.

"I collaborated with (director) Ramy Nabha for the track and have many times before as well. He is extremely creative and has a lot of out-of-thebox ideas. The inspiration for the track, shot in Faraiya, Lebanon came from losing a family member. Even though the song is about (romantic)

love, I drew my emotions from my experience," she revealed. Banah was born in Canada before moving to the Eastern Province of Saudi Arabia when she was four. After returning to Canada to study business at university, she finally settled in Bahrain 19 years ago. She had a passion for performing at a young age, but life took her on a different career path. In 2019, Banah quit her corporate job to pursue music full-time. Moving forward, the songstress from Saar is

determined to release new creations every six to eight weeks, and is already working on another melodic house single that will release in September, as well as a couple more

before year end. A *Jazziyat* (Arabic classics with jazz touches) tour, including a performance in Bahrain, is also on the cards.

"While I'm making more music, I'm trying to get away from just releasing for numbers and success and more because I enjoy what I'm doing," she added.

Bahraini youth, who grew up watching the anime, have been participating in tournaments and collecting rare cards as a way to revisit their childhood.

Digimon Adventure, known as Digimon: Digital Monsters in English speaking territories, first aired in Japan, and later spread across the world, including the Middle East. As of today, the franchise includes nine television series and 19 films, all of which focus on a group of teens who are unexpectedly sent to the mysterious Digital World and paired up with their own powerful, morphing monster 'Digimon'. Together they set out on an adventure to fight evil and save the world.

Isa Ali, 25, started off with exploring the nostalgia, which happened to turn into 'bonding' with like-minded people over their love for the anime. "I can talk to them about the cartoon for hours and they would get it, which I really appreciate," the marketing executive told *GulfWeekly*.

The Digimon Card Game is a competitive trading card game where each player has a companion Digimon in the 'battle area' to attack the opponent. As the game progresses and depending on your strategy, your

Digimon evolves, gets stronger, and gains new powers. The franchise has its roots in the series of digital pets that were created in 1997 as 'masculine counterparts' to the famed Tamagotchi that was perceived as 'feminine'. Malkiya resident Hussain

Aref, 26, who was gravitated

towards the art style of the 'shiny cards' said: "Each card is unique with a different colour, approach and perspective, which pushed me into trying the game, which eventually turned into a source of comfort and an escape from the stresses of life."

While the monsters were first designed to look 'cute and iconic', later developments had them created with a 'harder-edged style', which was influenced by American comics. Even the cards bearing the striking creatures have a distinct, arty aesthetic that's hard to miss.

Digimon Card Game, sometimes shortened to DigiCa, was released by Japanese multinational toy manufacturer and distributor Bandai in 2020. While the show has a fan following of its own, many young Bahrainis like Christy Bishay, documentation intern from Isa Town who is currently working for a food-tech platform, jumped on the bandwagon after learning about the game.

"I was intrigued to try the game after being introduced to it by my friend. Honestly, I didn't watch Digimon growing up, but since playing, I watched a few of the movies, so I guess it's like reverse nostalgia for me," added the second of only two female payers in Bahrain.

Besides the joy of gameplay, card collectors tend to also enjoy

putting together their deck and opening booster packs, which contain 12 random cards, with the possibility of pulling 'Rare' ones, which are sought after for their high value. They are distinguished for including an alternative artwork of the standard edition or a shiny texture.

Thai expatriate Miranda Boonthan, who was born and raised in Bahrain and runs a bubble tea shop, recalls a moment when she pulled a rare 'ghost card that is worth BD90' from a booster pack.

"It was a big tournament day at the store where we gather, so we'd pay an entry fee and get packs, and that's how I got it. I didn't win the tournament that day but getting this card was the real win," the 30-year-old beamed.

The Adliya resident recalls her first tournament win when she first joined as the only girl in the community at the time. "It was a big accomplishment for me, because it was also around one month within my involvement in Digimon," she added.

Digimon tournaments are regularly held at a local store in Tubli, where fans and players gather for casual game sessions or to compete.

Majd Saif, 25, who is a player of the game and an employee at the store, credits a Saudi based business for introducing the game to Bahrain, which resulted in a community that is continuing to grow.

"We have new people coming into the store every now and then wanting to learn Digimon. They are always welcomed by other players and given free cards, which encourages them to build their own collection and continue playing," the Isa Town resident said.





In 2006, Lou was accused of running one of the longest Ponzi schemes, in which investors are tricked into

paying for and profiting off non-existent business activities.

A year later, he pled guilty to conspiracy, money laundering, and making false statements during bankruptcy proceedings that took place the same year.



Ruckus before the hiatus

HE F1 season is reaching its halfway point this weekend with fireworks. Six different winners in the first twelve races showcase an incredibly competitive year. As the championship heads to Hungary for the first of a double-header before the summer break, several key storylines are kicking into high gear.

SILVER ARROWS ON TARGET

The question surrounding Mercedes isn't their recent win in Austria, but rather the dominance they displayed at Silverstone. George Russell's victory at the Red Bull Ring came after a collision between Max Verstappen and Lando Norris. However, at Silverstone, Mercedes secured a commanding one-two finish in qualifying, leading for most of the race before Lewis Hamilton clinched his first win since 2021. This back-to-back success suggests Mercedes might be genuine contenders again.

Both Russell and team boss Toto Wolff believe their car can consistently challenge Red Bull and McLaren. Hungary, where Mercedes is expected to introduce further upgrades,

presents a golden opportunity. Additionally, with Lewis Hamilton aiming to match his record of nine wins at a single circuit (currently eight in Budapest), another strong weekend for the Silver Arrows seems likely.

MCLAREN'S QUEST FOR CONSISTENCY

While Mercedes' resurgence steals the headlines, McLaren faces questions after Silverstone. Early pit stops cost Oscar Piastri a podium finish, and a questionable tire strategy for Lando Norris saw him settle for third. This is a recurring theme for McLaren – they've been close to victory in Imola, Canada, Spain, and Austria, but haven't been able to convert.

While a small margin often separates them from the winner, McLaren needs to address strategic errors that cost them crucial points. Building confidence in race execution is paramount if they're to challenge for the top step.

FERRARI'S NEED FOR REDEMPTION

The season's unpredictability makes Ferrari's current struggles even more surprising. After a promising win for Charles Leclerc in Monaco, their competitiveness has dropped significantly. Leclerc has only managed 12 points in the last four races, leaving Ferrari 71 points behind Red Bull and just seven ahead of

Upgrades brought to Spain failed to deliver, and Ferrari needs to learn from the data and adapt their approach. With Hungary and Belgium offering contrasting circuit challenges, the next two weeks are crucial for Ferrari's recovery.

PRESSURE ON PEREZ

The intense competition this season isn't just impacting teams – Red Bull's Sergio Perez is facing immense pressure. After a

strong start with three second-place finishes and a third, Perez's results have taken a hit with increased competition from McLaren, Mercedes, and Ferrari.

In the last six races (including the Austrian Sprint), Perez has only scored 15 points compared to Max Verstappen's impressive 119. Team Principal Christian Horner demands more points from Perez, with the upcoming races being his last chance before the summer break to deliver. Strong finishes in Hungary and Belgium, where Perez has historically done well, could ease the pressure.

DRIVER MARKET BUZZ

Perez's struggles could become a factor in the driver market during the summer break. Despite a recent contract extension, his performance could trigger movement. Several teams – Mercedes, Red Bull, Haas, Alpine, Sauber, and Williams – have vacant seats for 2025, and the next two weeks could see crucial meetings leading to contract finalisations.

The 'silly season' might have started early this year, but the period before the summer break is often when movement intensifies. Teams and drivers want clarity on their futures before the halt. Carlos Sainz remains a key player in transfer rumours, with Toto Wolff hinting at Mercedes' possible interest. Drivers like Daniel Ricciardo, Esteban Ocon, Valtteri Bottas, Zhou Guanyu, and Logan Sargeant are all waiting for news on their future destinations.

With the championship wide open, driver performance under pressure, and the driver market simmering, the next two races in Hungary and Belgium promise to be a thrilling prelude to the summer break in this year's world championship. 2

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
