CCLAIMED Arab and international artists are set to serenade audiences at a musical extravaganza next month.

The 33rd Bahrain International Music Festival, organised by Bahrain Authority for Culture and Antiquities (Baca), will be held from October 1 to 24. It will feature acts from around the globe and local talents, with 11 performances taking place in venues across the kingdom.

Egyptian soprano Fatima Said will kickstart the musical celebration with her divine vocals.

The creative talent has mesmerised audiences at the world's top venues, including London's Royal Albert Hall, and shared the stage with Elton John, Ed Sheeran and other global artists at Paris's Global Citizen Live in 2021.

"The Bahrain International Music Festival returns in its 33rd edition, continuing its legacy since 1992," a Baca spokesperson said, in a statement.

"It transforms various cultural spaces around Bahrain into windows that open onto art, culture, and melodies from around the world, reaffirming the beauty of diversity and musical expression created by this exceptional artistic gathering.

"Echoes of Bahraini, Gulf, Arab and international contributions will resound throughout the kingdom, inviting audiences to explore different musical styles and worlds, blending modernity and heritage."

Italian artists Luca Velotti and Silvia Manco will perform jazzy melodies on October 2, with Luca on the saxophone and clarinet, and Silvia on the piano. The concert is being organised in collaboration with the Italian Embassy and will be followed by more jazzy tunes on October 3 by Matti Klein Soul Trio.

Maestro Mubarak Najem's Bahrain Philharmonic Orchestra will cast a spell on music lovers with Songs of the Gulf on October 4. Launched in 2022 by Mubarak, General Director of the Bahrain Police Band

On October 5, enjoy a traditional folklore night with Qalali Folk Band. Since its establishment more than a century ago, the band has been preserving and promoting rhythmic songs and dances associated with Bahrain's rich culture industry and marine history.

On October 6, Bahraini pianist Noor Al Qassim, alongside the Orchestra Filarmonica del Mediterraneo, will perform Waves from the Mediterranean to the Arabian Gulf. It will be directed by maestro Giuseppe Monopoli.

Noor has performed in musical events

connected to the pearl-diving internationally and received several honours. In 2022, she was chosen to represent Bahrain at the International Council for Traditional Music.

> Dar Bin Harban Band will enthrall Muharraq with their tunes on October 7. Set up by Mohammed bin Harban, the band will take the audience on a journey through a myriad of local traditional music forms, including Al

Ardhah, Al La'abouni, Al Khammari and Al Fjiri.

A vibrant performance of Nongak, a traditional Korean art, will take place on October 8 in collaboration with the Korean Embassy.

Silk Road Melodies will be performed by Abdulla Abdurehim on October 11. The national first-class performer from the Xinjiang Art Theatre Opera Troupe is renowned for his dance,

vocal and instrumental

performances. Renowned Bahraini creative Mohamed Abdulrahim, whose artistic journey dates back to the 1980s, will share the stage with Bahrain Music Band for Ya Najmat Suhail (Arabic for Oh Suhail Star), conducted by maestro Zeyad Zaiman, on October 12.

The festival concludes on October 24 with The Little Singers of Paris. Founded in 1907, the renowned choir focuses on religious repertoire while including contemporary music and popular genres. The concert will be held in collaboration with the French Embassy and the King Hamad Global Centre for Peaceful Coexistence.

ET ready for a Friday brunch like no other! Hilton Bahrain's Back to School-themed feast is a masterclass in culinary delights, entertainment, and ambience. When I arrived at the topnotch restaurant on the sixth floor, I was immediately drawn to the colourful back-to-school decorations, including life-sized stationery, and a lively atmosphere which made me nostalgic about my school days, and got me excited for what was to come

Cheerful staff dressed in school uniforms escorted me to my table, where a pink drink with cherry brine, grenadine, lime juice and lemonade was the perfecting hydration in summer, without the sickly sweetness. I took



a quick sip and got off to explore the dozens of delectable dishes waiting to be devoured.

I started off with the fish and chips, which was, in my opinion, the star of the brunch. The lightly breaded fish, paired with crispy chips, tartar sauce and vinegar, was the perfect dish to kickstart

the epic dining experience.

Next up was the carving station, which included perfectly browned roasted chicken and brisket slow-cooked for four to six hours. Peppercorn sauce, mushroom and barbecue were offered alongside the meats. I took two slices of the brisket, it was moist and juicy, just like the beef should be. I relished the subtle flavours and took a couple of minutes to walk around. I then found myself

at the stir fry station, which offered yummy fillings such as shrimp, chicken and beef, as well as vegetables including peppers, onions, green beans, cabbage, carrots, spring onion, broccoli and an unbelievable variety of noodles.

Next in line (may I add, my third plate) was a variety of fresh seafood. This station deserves an honourable mention. Being a seafood lover, I happily picked some Bahraini shrimps and green mussels, and topped them with fresh lemon and salt. It was so comforting and familiar, but lifted with brilliant twists and tweaks. The combination of sour lemon and the crisp sea flavours reminded me of my childhood, where I grew up on the sunny beaches of Spain and Portugal.

The selection of salads and sushi on display were wonderful, and I helped myself to some California maki and shredded crab, which were topped off with soy sauce. Salmon nigiri, spicy salmon and spicy tuna roll were just perfect.

The sumptous brunch, which offers guests 50 to 80 different options and rotational menus, also included a pasta station, Indian cuisine, and other specialties such as honey glazed chicken thighs, sweet and sour fish, salmon, seabass, beef teriyaki and baked chicken parmesan.

Sticking to its theme of 'Back to School' a children's corner has also been set up with mini hot dogs, burgers, onion rings and pizzas.

Luckily, I left room for

dessert, which wasn't difficult as my sweet tooth would never allow me to leave without a treat. And I wasn't disappointed with the delectable spread.

Chocolate fondue with fresh fruits and marshmallows, traditional desserts such as dates pudding and other Arabic delicacies, brownies as well as pistachio profiterole rounded out the evening on a sweet note.

The entertainment at the brunch was excellent and the game 'limbo', in which all contestants must attempt to go under the bar with their backs facing towards the floor, made for an eventful part of the celebration. The winner received a voucher for the next brunch.



ORMER Bahrain resident Alisha Vickers is living out her songwriter dreams with the signing of a deal that could put her music in new movies, as she continues to write and release new singles throughout the summer.

The 27-year-old British singer-songwriter from Rotherham also recently wrote and released *I Am*, to tie in with her aunt Julie Lewis' book *Uncharted Waters*.

"I have been writing continuously over summer," she told *GulfWeekly*.

"Overall I've written
15 songs, so expect a lot
of released music these next
coming months, and writing
is my true passion, even more
so than performing!"

To live out her true passion, the musician also inked a 'sync' deal with a UK-based label, which would get her music in TV and advertisements, as well as major streaming services like Netflix and Amazon Prime.

So far, she has worked on an advertisement for a major car marquee, writing a 'really cool piece of music with a grand choral part', and hopes to make it her full-time job. For her aunt, the singersongwriter drew on African and Latin influences to write a song centred on embracing change, building resilience and finding flow.

"I read the book to really understand the context especially for the lyrical content and I feel it flowed quite easily as soon as I heard found our love for electro pop," she explained.

"A lot of writing is just trial and error, but now I have a very clear vision of what I want."

Recently, she has also been seeing a surge in popularity of some of her older songs, like the three-year-old *It's Always Been You*, which shot

up to 12,000 plays this year.

"Other songs people love include *Dream*Chaser as well as Scared to be Alone which is a very personal song for me as I wrote it at a very vulnerable point in my life," she added.

Despite being relentless in her releases of singles, the musician is not working towards an extended-play (EP) or


album, because she wants to focus on promoting herself as a songwriter, rather than an artist.

"I just want to keep writing and releasing and we see where we go from there," she added.

"I will also be working with two other girls to form our own girl group where our goal is to travel to China.

"But Bahrain is certainly somewhere I would like to settle down as it holds a very special place in my heart."

AROUND THE WORLD IN MUSIC, TV, BOOKS AND MORE - BY RIMA ALHADDAD

MERICAN television miniseries Agatha All Along is premiering its first two episodes on Disney+ on September 18, followed by a weekly release of the other seven episodes until November 6.

Picking up from the events of *WandaVision* released in 2021, mischievous witch Agatha Harkness (Kathryn Hahn) escapes the town of Westview with the help of a 'goth' teen (Joe Locke) with whom she ends up forming a new coven of witches to face the trials of the legendary Witches' Road.

Despite it deriving from the 2021 series, showrunner Jac Schaeffer revealed that the idea for the antagonistled dark comedy did not come during the making of *Wanda Vision*.

"I tend to not really dream the things that I want more than anything. The idea of doing a spinoff or doing a show on her (Agatha) didn't happen during *WandaVision*. But she did do things during *WandaVision* that made it clear to me that there was so much more story to tell," Jac added.

Kathryn, who portrays Agatha, also recalled the showrunner hinting her interest to create the spinoff around the time of wrapping



WandaVision (November 2020.)

"I remember Jac saying 'God, I'd love to write for you again'. We both kept saying, 'we have unfinished business' to each other at the end of *WandaVision*. I didn't know if it necessarily meant something in this world or somewhere else, but our minds melded," Kathryn said

in an interview.

"Then over the summer, I got a call from Louis D'Esposito (Marvel Studios co-president) saying 'How'd you like your own *Marvel* show?' A call you never get. My heart was pounding."

Additional cast include Debra Jo Rupp as Sharon Davis, Aubrey Plaza as Rio Vidal, Emma Caulfield Ford, Joe Locke, Maria Dizzia, Paul Adelstein, Miles Gutierrez-Riley, and more.

Before the official title reveal, which refers to the song of the same name that the character sings in the seventh episode of *WandaVision*, the fantasy series has had several different titles announced throughout the promotion

campaign.

The series was first announced in 2021 as Agatha: House of Harkness, but was renamed in 2022 to Agatha: Coven of Chaos. The year after, the title Agatha: Darkhold Diaries was revealed.

In May of this year, Marvel Studios released a new logo on social media with the title Agatha: The Lying Witch with Great Wardrobe, but later took down the post.

The next day, Disney finally announced the real title at an upfront presentation, and released a video showing that the constant title change was orchestrated by the main character herself as a way to mess with the fans.

The album title reflects the singer finding herself resonating with a cannibalistic spider discovered in Australia, named Maratus jactatus, nicknamed sparklemuffin.

"It does this razzle-dazzle dance, and will be cannibalised by its mate if she doesn't approve of the dance," Suki said in an interview.

"It's a metaphor for the dance of life we're all in. The title felt hilarious, ridiculous and wonderful to me," she

Suki claims that the album, which is being released two years after her debut project *I Can't Let Go*, was inspired by changes that occurred in her life, as its main theme revolves around the concept

"I kind of felt like this record was a metamorphosis (change of physical form) something new, a new season of life, I was thinking about metamorphosis, I was like 'Could it be a butterfly?' But no, I don't feel like a butterfly. I feel more like this scraggly spider that hasn't always got it together."

Indie pop artist Alice Suki Waterhouse is also a model and an actress. She began her modelling career at the age of 16 and her first feature film was British crime thriller *Pusher* (2012) in which she played a minor role.

She released her debut single *Brutal* in November 2016, followed by the single *Good Looking* the next year, which became a hit in 2022.

According to *Spotify*, the 32 year-old singer currently has around 10 million monthly listeners on the music streaming platform.



DUO ON A MISSION

RICHARD Thomas Osman's new book We Solve Murders comes out on September 17.


The new series follows detective duo Steve and Amy Wheeler.

wo-THIRDS of the season down, and the European leg done with, Formula 1 kicks off the final act of this season with a double-header in Azerbaijan and Singapore.

Here are a few emerging storylines to keep at the back of your mind as F1 heads to Baku.

MCLAREN PECKING ORDER

THE Formula 1 season has been a rollercoaster ride, with the competitive order constantly shifting. From Red Bull's early dominance to McLaren's recent resurgence, and even Ferrari's intermittent strong performances, predicting the outcome of each race has become increasingly challenging.

This unpredictability has led to much discussion about team orders at McLaren, especially given their current position in the championship.

Lando Norris, starting from pole in Monza, had a golden opportunity to close the gap to championship leader Max Verstappen from Red Bull. However, being overtaken by his teammate Oscar Piastri on the first lap and finishing behind him, Norris missed a crucial chance to gain ground.

Norris admirably said 'I'm not here just to beg for someone to let me past' when asked whether team mate Oscar Piastri should now be helping his title challenge.

However, Piastri has suggested he's open to playing such a role, sitting 106 points behind Verstappen compared to Norris's gap of 62.

McLaren Team principal Andrea Stella also suggested the situation would be looked at, as both championships are now realistic for the team to target.

FERRARI FOLLOWING THROUGH


FERRARI, like McLaren, are also becoming increasingly competitive in the constructors' championship. While McLaren narrowed the gap to Red Bull by eight points in Monza, Ferrari's victory, coupled with Sainz's fourth-place finish, means they remain 39 points behind the constructors' lead.

Ferrari experienced a difficult period after a disappointing upgrade at the Spanish Grand Prix, but they have since recovered with back-to-back podiums and a recent update.

Azerbaijan is a venue where Ferrari have traditionally excelled, particularly Charles Leclerc, who has secured

pole position here for the past three years, including both the Sprint and Grand Prix last season.

The new floor introduced in the previous race will be tested in Baku, providing a clearer indication of Ferrari's ability to compete for multiple victories in the remaining races.

The track's characteristics, with its long straights and tight corners, could suit Ferrari's car and driving style, further enhancing their chances of success.

Beyond the track, Ferrari's strategic approach and pit stops will also play a crucial role in determining their performance. The team has shown improvement in these areas recently, and if they can maintain this momentum, they could be a serious contender for the championship.

RED BULL REBOUND?

THE drivers' and constructors' championship leaders, who haven't won a

race since Verstappen held off Norris at the Spanish Grand Prix in June, are going to be looking to regain their lost form. The Baku City Circuit, even in their early-season form, could have been challenging due to its street-track characteristics.

Another tough weekend here could further hinder the team's hopes in Singapore.

Verstappen's dominant start, winning six of eight races and both Sprints, initially seemed to give him an insurmountable lead. However, the defending champion now admits that

both championships are currently unrealistic due to the RB20's struggles.

He has urged Red Bull to make drastic changes to try and regain the car's earlier performance, although he acknowledges that reverting to the previous specification is unlikely to be the solution given the gains made by rivals.

Zandvoort was an exercise in limiting damage for Verstappen, who finished second to Norris, and Red Bull had limited time to react before Monza.

The two-week gap before Baku offers a better chance to analyse data and find solutions.

RACEABILITY

THE lack of 'raceability' in the current generation of Formula 1 cars has been a recurring issue.

Overtaking has proven difficult, and drivers have complained about the lack of free air.

The Baku City Circuit, with its long straights and tight corners, could provide a challenging environment for overtaking.

Heading to the F1 Azerbaijan GP, it will be interesting to see if there's an impact, especially since the last time F1 raced in Baku, the race was simply not that exciting.

BEARMAN'S BACK

OLLIE Bearman, who made his Formula 1 debut earlier this season filling in for Carlos Sainz, will have another opportunity to showcase his skills this weekend. Racing for Haas in place of the suspended Kevin Magnussen, Bearman will draw on his experience from the Saudi Arabian Grand Prix.

Magnussen's one-race ban, resulting from accumulating 12 penalty points in a year, has opened the door for Bearman to step up from

Formula 2 to Formula 1.

While Bearman will be driving a less competitive car and racing on another challenging street circuit, he has little to lose. The experience he gains this weekend will be invaluable as he prepares for a full-time Formula 1 campaign next season.


