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Craft a message



NE of the kingdom's oldest clubs is celebrating its 60th anniversary this year and, to mark the occasion, is inviting handcrafted textile postcards from all over the world.

Bahrain Garden Club (BGC) has reached out to patchwork and quilting artists from Bahrain and beyond to participate by sending one or more creations, 15cm x 10cm in size, and plans to display the collection in an exhibition next year.

The event is being staged under the theme 'Find solace in the beauty of the garden'.

A postcard has a photograph or illustration on one side with space for a message on the other and can be sent through post without an envelope. Fabric postcards are sewn to resemble the paper cards and can feature vibrant designs, from embroidery to patchwork, beads and more.

"It's the club's 60th anniversary and it would feel like people are congratulating us and gifting us cards," club executive board member and gardening enthusiast Irina Averinos told the GulfWeekly.

The Russian expatriate and artist, who has called Bahrain her home for 24 years, is the mind behind the initiative and practices the style as well.

"Textile postcards are trending globally and people like to make them for birthdays, Christmas and different festivals and gift them, or frame them. Not everyone prefers to do big patchworks so, this is an ideal size and takes less time," Ms Averinos, who has volunteered at the club for over a decade, added.

"Some even stitch fabric stamps and sew the lines you see on postcards where you write the message, making them look realistic. It's a nice way to recycle old material too as you can use leftover fabrics for this style like pieces of ribbon."

several artists worldwide and is expecting submissions from countries, including the UK, the US, Canada, Australia, Russia, Poland, and Germany.

"We have even approached the Japanese Embassy in Bahrain to help as Japanese style of fabrics and embroidery is different," the Jurdaab resident revealed.

Established in 1965, BGC works to raise awareness and interest in gardening. It also aims to improve existing gardening methods, and provide a platform for exchanging information and experiences, through





educational programmes and workshops for all ages, including the popular annual Bahrain International Garden Show.

"The 60th anniversary is definitely a milestone and opportunity to celebrate the club's accomplishments over the decades," club president

UNDREDS of bikers in Bahrain will rally for breast cancer awareness on November 8 as they mount their machines and ride across the kingdom, writes Melissa Nazareth.

This was a highlight as we were introduced to a delectable poached pear creation. This showstopper featured an almond crust




The Book Of Fish (2021) is inspired by the exile of Jeong Yak-jeon, brother of renowned Joseon era scholar Jeong Yak-yong. In 1801, the former was exiled to Heuksando Islands. The film is rated PG15 and will be screened on November 15 at 4pm in Cinema 1.

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AROUND THE WORLD IN MUSIC, TV, BOOKS AND MORE - BY RIMA ALHADDAD

NGLISH rock band The Cure is releasing their 14th album, Songs of a Lost World, tomorrow.

The project, that comes 16 years after their earlier studio album *4:13 Dream*, was initially intended for a 2019 release.

Frontman Robert Smith revealed that he blames himself for the delay.

"I keep going back over and redoing them, which is silly. At some point, I have to say that's it," he said in an interview, adding that, while he does not consider the album to be 'relentlessly doom and gloom', the recent loss of his parents and brother has had an effect on him in the process of creation.

Robert described the album's lead single *Alone*, released in September, as the 'track that unlocked the record'.

"As soon as we had that piece of music recorded, I knew it was the opening song, and I felt the whole album come into focus," he revealed.

"I had been struggling to find the right opening line for the right opening song for a while, working with the simple idea of 'being alone', always in the back of my mind this nagging feeling that I already knew what the opening line should be," he added.

The eight-track album was solely composed by the singer and guitarist, marking the second time he has done so since 1985's *The Head on the Door.* He also produced the project alongside Paul Corkett, who previously co-produced the album *Bloodflowers* (2000).

Ahead of its release, the body of work is already receiving critical acclaim, as it earned a 94/100 score on *Metacritic*.

The critically acclaimed band has been active since 1976, and was previously known as 'Malice and Easy Cure' before the members landed on their current band name. They have sold more than 30 million albums and were inducted into the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame in 2019.

Reaching their commercial peak with the studio albums *Disintegration* (1989) and *Wish* (1992), The Cure is often regarded as one of the most influential acts of the 1980s, as they've been credited as a source of inspiration by a number of ensembles, including Blink-

182, Spoon, Korn and Foals.
Alongside Robert, the
members' line-up currently

MERICAN drama film *Here* is set to release in theatres on November 28.

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
