NE of Bahrain's oldest choirs and young talents at a local university will come together as one voice for their debut collaboration, Chorus of Cultures, a spectacular musical concert set to be staged on May 23.

Formed more than 50 years ago, Manama Singers, together with the RCSI Medical University of Bahrain Choir, will take enthusiasts on an exciting journey through language, rhythm, and harmony, across continents and cultures, conjuring an 'unforgettable evening of musical unity'.

The two-hour concert presented by more than 70 singers will tell tales from around the world, presenting a rich tapestry of global choral and solo music - from the soulful call of African folk melodies to the dramatic flair of classical arias and the groove of contemporary popular hits.

"Manama Singers were looking for a conductor at the end of 2024, as our regular conductor Jo Dichiolla was taking some time out. We were lucky enough to find an exciting new conductor, South African Stefan Els, who is also the conductor and founder of **RCSI Medical University** of Bahrain Choir," Manama Singers chairperson Susan Scott told GulfWeekly.

"We started rehearsing a number of South African songs and then Stefan suggested a combined concert, which we thought was a wonderful idea. The concert, being multinational and cultural, grew to showcase different songs, but was also named so because both choirs have a remarkable number of nationalities," she added.

Manama Singers, which celebrated its golden jubilee three years ago, comprises more than 40 members across nationalities, including English, Welsh, Scottish, Irish, French, Italian, German, Swiss, Swedish, American, Indian, Pakistani, Malaysian, Kiwi (New Zealand), Jordanian, Lebanese and Zambian.

RCSI Medical University of Bahrain Choir, formed last year, currently has 32

members.

"Teaching African songs was a particularly fun challenge," choirs' conductor and RCSI Bahrain data analyst Stefan revealed.

"Getting everyone to learn the words, rhythms, and accompanying movements was a steep but rewarding learning curve," he added.

"Manama Singers were initially quite hesitant to let go of their choir folders and memorise the music, but they have overcome that with great dedication."

This is the first time Manama Singers will be presenting without sheet music – printed notations meant to guide the performer about pitch, rhythm and other elements.

"While we've been rehearsing since mid-January, we've only had two combined weekend rehearsals, each about four hours long. We had to get creative with our rehearsal spaces at RCSI. Practising

on staircases helped with acoustics, and the altos even worked on their projection techniques in a car park at one point," the 34-year-old from Al Sayh, who has been living in Bahrain for the last six years, said, highlighting some memorable moments behind the scenes.

US expatriate Amanda Pilmer, who moved to the kingdom in August last year, shared her experience and excitement for the show.

"It's been great meeting all

these new people, who are so welcoming. I'm a mum of two so, spending that one day a week rehearsing has given me an outlet," the 40-year-old from Adliya said, adding that she will be presenting some solo acts at the concert.

The event will commence at 7pm at Downtown Rotana in Manama.



N honour of the unsung heroes behind the iconic landscapes of The Ritz-Carlton, Bahrain (RCB), the five-star property's management team held an appreciation ceremony last Wednesday to celebrate its gardening team.

"Our gardening team's efforts go far beyond maintaining the landscape – they shape the very soul of our resort," The Ritz-Carlton, Bahrain general manager Bernard de Villèle explained.

"Their passion and dedication are the heart of the beauty our guests experience every day.

"I extend my deepest gratitude to these remarkable individuals, whose committed passion and meticulous care shape an unforgettable experience for every guest who visits."

Spanning 70 acres with 25

cres of carefully curated acres of carefully cur

acres of carefully curated green space, RCB is known for its manicured lawns, vibrant flora and sweeping views of the Arabian Gulf.

The resort's gardens are home to 137 kinds of plants, including 950 date palms, 37 tree species, 28 varieties of shrubs, and 15 types each of ground cover and seasonal flowers.

And behind every bloom lies the handiwork of the resort's skilled gardeners – a team whose quiet commitment has been bringing life to the lush surroundings.

According to RCB engineering director Abhilash Coonjan, the gardens are central to the resort's identity.

"The gardens at The Ritz-Carlton, Bahrain are a living reflection of our brand's identity – one that blends timeless elegance, local authenticity and pure immersive luxury," he told the *GulfWeekly*.

"Architecturally, our resort is designed in harmony with

its coastal surroundings, embracing the charm of Arabian hospitality while offering a modern resort-style escape.

"At the heart of our landscape are 950 date palms, each locally sourced from Bahraini farms, anchoring our deep-rooted connection to the kingdom's heritage."

More than a visual delight, the gardens create a sense of serenity that enhances the guest experience.

However, maintaining such greenery in Bahrain's challenging climate is no easy task.

"The extreme heat, high humidity in the summer, saline-rich soil, and limited rainfall present significant challenges," Abhilash explained.

"It's both an art and a science that requires innovation and constant care."

The team also plays a vital role in the resort's sustainability efforts, growing herbs like oregano, mint, and rosemary, and managing an efficient irrigation system powered by an on-site water purification plant, which generates approximately 2,500 cubic metres of water per day, with 1,000 cubic metres used daily for irrigation.

As a result of the team's efforts, the property proudly holds a Green Key certification for its environmental practices. "The gardens play a quiet yet powerful role in shaping the guest experience," Abhilash added.

"What truly stands out isn't just one moment, but the consistency, passion, and care that bring beauty to life for our guests every day."

The idea for the ceremony came from a desire to recognise this often unseen labour.

"The event was inspired to show appreciation and gratitude to the gardening team," he explained.

"Their efforts often go unseen by guests, but they are key to creating the beautiful and peaceful environment that makes our resort special."

Looking ahead, Abhilash said the resort remains committed to evolving its

green spaces to 'improve the environment, introducing new species and enhancing the beauty of the property.'

At the heart of it all is a group of gardeners – quietly working, transforming, and now, finally, seen.

myself with a screen.


Without the option, I had to sit with those feelings, or channel them into action. I won't pretend I've had an epiphany or that I'll be tossing my phone anytime soon.

BITTERSWEET SUMMER TALE


WEDISH author Fredrik Backman's new novel *My Friends* has hit the shelves. The tale is set in the summer, when a group of teenagers find refuge away from their difficult home, living in an abandoned pier, where they tell each other stories and joke around.

A painting by one of the three friends emerges 25 years later and lands into the hands of 18-year-old Louisa, who embarks on a cross-country journey to learn the story behind it, which also inspires her to unleash her own artistic self. "It's a little

story my brain and I have argued about for a few years, about art and artists, about being young and desperately wanting to create something, anything," Fredrik said in

a social media post.

"It's also about growing up close to violence, outside and inside, and having friends who'd fight the whole universe for you. It's about those who saw greatness in you before you ever could. It's about being 17, and how a painting in a museum can knock you over so completely, it changes the



whole trajectory of your life," he added.

The #1 New York Times bestselling author is known for many novels, most famously, A Man Called Ove, which was published in English in 2013, and later adapted into a namesake Swedish comedy drama film in 2015, as well as a 2022 American film titled A Man Called Otto starring Tom Hanks and his son Truman.



MERICAN R&B and soul singer Kali Uchis is set to drop her fifth album titled Sincerely, tomorrow.


According to Kali, the song was inspired by her profound experience of motherhood and the immeasurable love she has for her son, whom she gave birth to last year.

Set in mythical ancient Greece, the series revolves around Heron (voiced by Derek Phillips), the son of Zeus (voiced by Jason O'Mara), who tries to save Olympus and Earth from a demonic army after discovering his true heritage.

"Greek mythology is just one big family soap opera," Charley Parlapanides, who created the series with his brother Vlas Parlapanides, said in an interview.

"We grew up in a very big, tightknit Greek family. So I think that was always, even subliminally, part of the draw for us making this show. It's about families and it all just meshed," he added.

First premiered in 2020, the series garnered a positive feedback and critical

acclaim for having a fresh take on Greek mythology. It was praised for its imagery and voice acting and the two seasons received a 100 per cent score on *Rotten Tomatoes*.

"We come from the theatre and the live-action space, so we wanted the story to have emotional truth," Vlas explained.

"We wanted to take that authenticity that you normally find in live-action, feature dramas and bring that to the animated space.

"Some people who watch this show don't even realise it, but Powerhouse (the animation studio behind the series) and our compositors would manipulate the lighting and colour of the eyes to show expression.

"Every animated project is on a budget, and we all use cheats to help sell what we're trying to do. The eyes were a big part of that," he added. May 8-14, 2025 www.gulfweekly.com

OTORSPORT maverick Faten Amin, the first Bahraini woman in a host of top organising roles in the sport, has taken her journey offroad with her collection of unique Lego F1 sets.

The 39-year-old Bahrain International Circuit (BIC) digital content executive is blending her love for the sport with her relatively recent hobby of Lego setbuilding.

"I have 66 sets so far, but not all of them are built – about 14 to 15 sets are not built yet," she told GulfWeekly during the Formula 1 Gulf Air Bahrain Grand Prix held at the BIC in mid-April.

"I like to have a collection, rather than having one or two sets, and Lego kept bringing out more sets, so my hobby just keep on growing."

But Faten is more than just a collector. She's created a unique niche for herself by documenting her Lego builds through ASMR-style videos on *TikTok*, capturing the satisfying clicks of each piece coming together.

"When I build the sets, I do a video where it's musicfree to keep the focus on the ASMR (autonomous sensory meridian response) click, making sure that it is very clear," she added.

Last year, Faten made history as the first Bahraini woman to serve as Clerk Of the Course (COC) for the FIA Formula 3 Championship during the 2024 Bahrain **Grand Prix**

This year, in addition to her duties at the BIC, she had a dual role for the support races happening during the race weekend - deputy COC for the Porsche Carrera Cup Middle East and chief communications for F2.

However, she was able to make time to stock up on new Lego sets, one of which she even got signed by the Ferrari duo of seven-time world champion Lewis Hamilton and Charles Leclerc.

"Ever since I was young, I was always fascinated by Lego but I never had the time or budget for it," she reminisced.

"However, that changed in 2019, when my husband bought me a Lego Movie Maker set because I do stop motion videos. The set could actually help me do stop motion with Lego, and it teaches you everything.

"He saw the set and knew

since then, I just kept on buying the sets that I wanted, like the Friends set, the McLaren, and it just grew."

The first set that she worked on was a small speed champion car, which she completed in about 90 minutes.

Up next was the 2022 McLaren F1 car, which took her about 10 hours.

What started as a casual

interest quickly transformed into a serious collection, with Faten now boasting an impressive collection spanning diverse themes, from F1 racing sets to botanical collections featuring delicate roses and tulips.

"When I'm building these sets, I can meditate with no thoughts at all," she explained. "It just clears the mind. That's what I like. I

like to sit and clear my mind pregnant. out of everything from life. That's why I enjoy building it. It's like my yoga session with building Legos."

Her most challenging build to date was the Ferrari Daytona set, a 24-hour project she completed just a few days before giving birth - something that didn't even hold her F1 organising ambitions, as she served as the COC last year while

A veteran marshal since 2005, Faten has been a pivotal figure in Bahrain's racing community.

Last year, she made history by becoming the first female Clerk of the Course for Formula Three – a remarkable achievement she accomplished while eight months pregnant.

Her collection reflects her motorsports passion, with

numerous F1 and racingthemed Lego sets taking pride of place in her home.

She even treasures a small piece of carbon fiber from an F2 wing – a memento from her early marshalling days.

"I've always been passionate about motorsports," Amin explains.

"From watching NASCAR as a child to marshalling at local races, it's been a lifelong love."


