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WO Bahraini artists are getting their work spotlighted as part of a transformation of an ambassadorial home during an initiative that was inaugurated last night.

Renowned Bahraini creatives Adnan Al Ahmad and Aysha Hafez are part of the 'Artists in the Residence' collaborative project launched by the German Embassy and Rashid Al Khalifa (RAK) Art Foundation.

"At the RAK Art
Foundation, we believe that
artistic collaboration and
cultural exchange are vital
in building bridges between
communities," RAK founder
and National Arts Council
chairman Shaikh Rashid bin
Khalifa Al Khalifa explained.

"This initiative with the German Embassy exemplifies how shared creativity can deepen mutual understanding and provide our artists with meaningful opportunities to engage with global audiences.

"We are proud to support platforms that celebrate the power of art to connect and inspire."

The core component of the cultural initiative is the transformation of German Ambassador Clemens Hach's residence with unique Bahraini pieces by Adnan and Aysha.

"I am deeply impressed by the result of this artistic transformation of my residence," Ambassador Clemens added.

"Their wonderful artworks harmonise amongst themselves and with the space, and I am eternally grateful to Shaikh Rashid and his team and the artists for their support in making this artistic experiment work."

Adnan, a graduate of the École des Beaux-Arts in Besançon, France, approaches his art through a deeply personal yet analytically structured lens.

His work combines geometric form with layered composition, shaped by memory, imagination, and emotion.

Through a scientific and symbolic methodology, Adnan reinterprets old and recent memories into new

visual narratives, creating immersive pieces rich with introspection and abstraction.

"My works represent me personally and present stories and tales that pertain



to me as a human being, with feelings, emotions, and memories like any other human being on earth," he told *GulfWeekly*.

"I try to express them and present them so that others can share them with me, perhaps the stories and tales will be similar, and art will be a point of convergence and communication, united by a common factor: colour, calligraphy and fabric.

"With this project, I want to show Germans and foreigners, in general, that Bahraini artists are capable of reaching international fame and keeping up with any other artist anywhere with their art, style, culture, and knowledge.

"Bahrain has a rich history and an ancient civilisation that relied on the visual arts in many of its manifestations, such as Dilmun seals, textile and pottery industries, and ancient traditional architecture.

"The history of modern art here began in the 1950s and Bahraini artists have developed their art significantly, advancing in their presentation of their subject matter, style, and technique.

"They have become competitive in international forums as artists of their own stature and influence.

"It is a great honour for me personally to represent my country, Bahrain, anywhere in the world as an ambassador for my country, and to represent all Bahraini artists who are no less than me in level, performance, style and concept."

Aysha uses limestone as a mould for her forms, reflecting both delicacy and structure.

Her work embraces themes of peace, beauty, and nature, symbolised by birds, doves, and olive branches, offering a poetic reflection on serenity

and generosity.

One of her collections highlighted in this exhibition is 'Whiteness', featuring a series of white sculptures using wood, stones, marble powder and other mixed media.

"In this series, I used limestone because it is easy to work on and make a mould for artworks down the road, and then I used marble powder for the final result.

"Some of my artworks have limited prints, but most of them are one of a kind."

The Artists in the Residence project represents a new chapter in Bahrain-Germany cultural collaboration, strengthening artistic dialogue and mutual appreciation through shared creativity.



Hosted within Bahrain Polytechnic's campus, Qannati Lab is the first hands-on watchmaking education and production facility in the Gulf.

The residency by Pierre, who is renowned for his work as a certified trainer at the Fondation Haute Horlogerie and instructor at WOSTEP (Watchmakers of Switzerland Training and Educational Programme), offered Bahraini students the opportunity to learn under Swiss-level mastery in movement assembly.

"We are honoured to host a figure of Pierre's standing," Qannati Objet d'Art founder Mahmood Qannati, who established the brand seven years ago, said ahead of the programme.

"His residency symbolises a new era for horological education in the region. This partnership brings global craftsmanship to local talent and reinforces our ambition to position the GCC as a future hub for high-end watchmaking," he added.

Founded in Geneva, Fondation Haute Horlogerie is the global reference in fine watchmaking. Its mission is to safeguard and promote

Qannati Objet d'Art creates bespoke wearable art inspired by Mesopotamian heritage and modern craftsmanship. Its educational arm, Qannati Lab, pioneers horology training in the GCC, with a

long-term vision to establish the region as a centre for high-end watchmaking.

Bahrain Polytechnic has played a critical role in enabling Qannati Lab's success, providing space, academic infrastructure, and cross-disciplinary collaboration with engineering, business, and design departments.



N a time when most children are glued to their screens, it is refreshing to revisit yesteryear games that kept young minds busy for hours.

The play not only had entertainment value but also offered scope to think creatively, thus providing endless opportunities to stretch the imagination. GulfWeekly explores some of the games, talking to Bahrain-based artists whose striking creations are immortalising these golden memories.

TEELA ('MARBLES')

GROWING up, these small spheres were a prized possession for many, and safeguarding them was serious business. While many variations of the game exist, a popular style entailed striking a set of marbles in a circle drawn on the ground with a bigger marble. Those with the most displaced marbles won – bagged the loot!

"I remember playing teela and was very good at it," Saudi graphic designer and resident artist at The Art Station Karim Al Janobi, who has been living in Bahrain for the last 15 years, told GulfWeekly

The 46-year-old Adliya resident's sculptures depicting 'lost' childhood games are currently being exhibited at the venue in Muharraq.

The interactive Nostalgia Project employs digital design and 3D printing, where each exhibit has an NFC tag, which, when scanned, displays contextual information and plays authentic audio recordings of children playing at that moment.





DAWAMA ('SPINNING TOP')

THE humble spinning tops provided scope to improve motor skills, hand strength and concentration. Children would wrap a string around the nib-like bottom and then spin it with a force, keeping the top in momentum.

"Dawama is my favourite as it holds so much energy even in stillness. I sculpted it mid-spin, with the fabric of a traditional outfit caught in motion to give it life and momentum," Karim said.

Bahraini artist Mahdi

Albannai also has fond memories of the game, which he has brought alive in his bronze sculpture series, which was on display at InterContinental Bahrain during Ramadan.

"I had professional friends who were good at the game, we even had our own rules in which the loser would have his spinner broken by the winner, and he would break it with his own spinner," the 62-yearold noted, adding that the sculptures represent his

FALLATIYA ('SLINGSHOT')

THE mechanism of this game was simple, with a rubber band tied to a twig, stretched far back to launch a stone that was aimed at one's target.

"My friends would aim at birds, but I personally did not like to do that because it was too violent and would ask them, 'how about we shoot at geckos instead'," Mahdi revealed.

Both artists believe that

their sculptures, hope to revive play as a form of entertainment among young minds.

"I was inspired to bring alive my own memories as well as introduce it to the younger generations that did not grow up with these games that we played," Mahdi said. For his part, Karim realised how many traditional childhood games have quietly disappeared.

"I wanted to not just

document them, but bring them back to life in a form that could be touched, heard, and experienced."

HOOP rolling or trundling encompasses rolling a large hoop along the ground using an object wielded by the player. "I have fond memories of playing Dharoi (Dharoj in a different dialect) using an old bicycle wheel. We used to make toys out of whatever we could find, fabric scraps, buttons, sticks. There was so much creativity and joy in that simplicity," Karim reminisced.

To give his pieces a realistic look, the self-taught artist spent time with a local tailor where he learned how fabrics behave and he recreated the patterns digitally. Karim widened his research by speaking to his parents and other community elders to shortlist the games for his sculptures.

"Nowadays the kids are mostly glued to their phones, and would be making friends with people from all over the world, while all we had was our neighbours to play with and we relied more on items around us that we were able to turn into games," Mahdi said.


"Italy is a feast for the senses, and Tucci in Italy is an invitation to the table." Stanley said in an interview.

Known for a number of iconic roles including Nigel Kipling in *The Devil Wears* Prada (2006) and, most recently, as Cardinal Bellini in Conclave (2024), the 64-year-old American actor of Italian descent has been vocal about his profound love for food, as he released four cookbooks, most recently What I Ate in One Year (2024), which also serves as a biography.

Stanley also previously hosted a food documentary series titled Stanley Tucci: Searching for Italy, which ran from 2021 to 2022 and won two consecutive Primetime Emmy Awards for Outstanding Hosted Nonfiction Series.

"Much of this book was processing and trying to understand the choices she made, which hurt me, even though she loved me," Ling Ling said.

"It was also an examination of my love for her, the fact of its continuation in the face of betrayal, and a look at the systems that compelled us to compete with each other," she added.






