OT all children spend their holidays glued to the screen or getting bored. Several young philanthropists based in Bahrain are engaging in social work this summer, shining a bright spotlight on the importance of introducing communityoriented activities at an early age.

According to reports online, humanitarian work offers multiple benefits to adolescents, like improved critical thinking, more empathy, higher self-worth and fewer depressive symptoms, among others.

New Millennium School grade 12 student Alison Reeves concurred, asserting that her experience with social work has been 'rewarding'.

The Indian Community Relief Fund's (ICRF) Thirst Quenchers summer campaign volunteer believes that participating in the initiative has been an educational journey for her.

The programme is aligned with the Labour Ministry's summer mid-day outdoor work ban, where ICRF volunteers visit locations across the kingdom every Saturday of July and August to distribute refreshments.

"I started a year ago and can say that it has helped me hone my social skills," the 17-yearold Indian expatriate told GulfWeekly.

"I learned how to introduce myself to different people and deal with various situations. For instance, many workers do not speak English, so we have to find a way to communicate with them. We also understand how to be polite with them," added the Juffair resident, who aspires to pursue a degree in event management while continuing with community activities.

"ICRF has shown me there are communities like this wherever I go. So, even when I study abroad, I am hopeful I can find a place where I can volunteer," she added.

Alison is inspired by her parents Althea and Basil Reeves, who are also committed to social causes and have always encouraged her to pursue the same.

Zaman also motivated his children, Rayyan, 13, and Jenan, 11, to volunteer at a summer camp for differently abled children, conducted by Shahzaib's Club House – a community organisation dedicated to supporting individuals with diverse abilities.


"The turning point was taking them to watch the Bollywood movie Sitaare Zameen Par ('stars on Earth'), which focuses on the same cause," Aamer revealed.

"I then spoke to them

about how we need to help these 'stars', who are just as talented as us. While they found it tough initially, we motivated them not to give up and the organisers were supportive too."

Club House founder Amena Shahrukh said that sometimes, the young volunteers were assigned tasks to do with the children and at other times, they came up with their own ideas.

'Our young volunteers also assisted our teachers in the classroom," she added.



Spurred on by the enriching experience, the siblings, who attend Naseem International School, have expressed a desire to continue volunteering every summer.

Youngsters Ali Ashraf, 12, and Fatima Zaynab Al Isa, 11, also volunteer at Shahzaib's Club House's summer camp, which will continue until the end of this month. The homeschooled children from Saar are equally excited about the experience and hope to

continue it every year.

"I led an activity on recycling paper," Ali said. "It was difficult when the differently abled children cried or when I didn't understand what they were saying and I'm still learning to get better at that. But I learned how to be patient through this experience and had a really good time with all the children," the Australian-Pakistani talent added.





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MASTERCHEF: Nivedita

BARAIN-BASED author and wordsmith Nivedita Roy has released her latest book of poems, exploring diverse themes inspired by injustice, war, women's issues and more, writes Melissa Nazareth.

Bringing alive the Indian expatriate's 'scribbles', *Recipe for a Poet's Broth,* is a collection of 65 poems across seven sections, spanning introspections, fond memories and more.

Sip on a sonnet

"I made a short trip to the Swiss Alps in April this year and as I sat admiring the joys of nature, myriad thoughts came to mind. Pouring them on paper was a cathartic experience," the 54-year-old told *GulfWeekly*, explaining the creative process behind her 'labour of love'.

"Once the compilation was sorted, I shared the manuscript with my editor Ritu Bhatnagar, who is based in Bengaluru; this is our sixth project together.

"I requested Avantika Vijay Singh to write the Afterword. She is a poet and editor and has authored three books.

"Canada-based writer Kavita Ezekiel Mendonca, daughter of the famous poet Nissim Ezekiel, wrote a note for me in book as well, and I am overwhelmed with gratitude to all," the Al Raja School teacher added.

Speaking of the book's name, the Adliya resident explained that it was sparked by a NaPoWriMo 2025 prompt – a month-long undertaking by poets around the world to pen down 30 creations in 30 days, based on a daily prompt.

Many of the poems featured in the book were written during NaPoWriMo last year and some others are older.


Nivedita, who has called Bahrain home for more than two decades, draws inspiration for a lot of her work from the kingdom.

"I am so proud to be part of this beautiful island. One of the poems in the section *Poetic Forms* was written during the creative writing session of the Bahrain Writers' Circle; Sunset was inspired by the mesmerising sunset at Karbabad beach; A cache of lessons, a multitude of teachers encapsulates my experiences as a teacher in Bahrain and A bustling nest to an empty nest has references to my life here after my children left," she said.

Dreams of Gaza has been translated into Arabic for an international anthology entitled *Heaven's Paradise*. An excerpt from the poem reads:

'Dreams of a warm hearth with kin breathing A posse to play marbles or just a cheerful race...
The childish blabber was drowned in chaos'

The book is published by Authorspress India and available on *Amazon*.

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FRUITY WRAPS!

O stay cool this summer, chefs across Bahrain have been infusing perennial favourites like shawarma and sandwiches with seasonal flavours, like mango and watermelon, writes Naman Arora.

Several local shawarma restaurants have come up with summer sauces for Bahrain's beloved street food – shawarma.

One eatery, Zooba, is offering up a sandwich with a summery twist – fresh watermelon.

The Watermelon Baladi sandwich pairs the fresh fruit with feta cheese and a minty pesto, all served in an Egyptian pita, taking inspiration from similar wraps that have gone viral in Egypt and Iraq.

This summer, restaurants are also infusing fresh, vibrant flavours into the classic wrap, creating a lighter yet equally satisfying version for the hotter months.

Traditional slowcooked meats are being paired with bright, tangy accompaniments such as mango pickles, pomegranate molasses, and citrus-infused tahini.

Some chefs are swapping out the usual garlic sauce for yoghurt-based dressings blended with mint or roasted pepper, adding a refreshing edge without overpowering the meat's rich flavours.

Antar Shawarma has brought back its popular shawarma with mango and lemon sauces.

Those who want an additional fruity kick have

more mango and lemoninspired options on the menu to enjoy as well.

These seasonal variations appeal not only to adventurous diners but also to those seeking something lighter yet comforting during Bahrain's humid summer.

The result is a fusion of tradition and innovation, offering patrons fresh reasons to return to their favourite shawarma spots during the summer months.




What's the scoop?

As the temperatures soar, our quest for unique chilled eats continues. This week, GulfWeekly lists some interesting ice creams from around the world, highlighting distinct flavours and cultural ways of devouring these irresistible cool treats.



CASSATA

we are talking about the crescent-shaped Indian ice cream inspired by the Sicilian cake. Most popular since the 50s up to the early 90s, Cassata ice cream was the sweet ending to virtually every Indian wedding feast; especially the loaf variety that was sliced and served. The chilled dessert features ice creams like vanilla and strawberry layered with a milk-soaked sponge cake base, garnished with nuts and candied fruit



SALMIAKKIJÄÄTELÖ

'tutti frutti'.

SALMIAKKIJÄÄTELÖ or 'salmiak icecream' is a popular Finnish frozen dessert sold in supermarkets and on the streets, especially during the summer. It's greyish in colour and gets its distinctive salty flavour from salmiak or salty liquorice - a widely consumed confection in Nordic countries. The main ingredient in it is ammonium chloride. Salmiakkijäätelö can be enjoyed as scoops, soft serves and ice cream bars, occasionally drizzled with salmiak sauce to intensify the unique taste.



BASTANI SONNATI

COMBINING the delicate flavours of saffron, rose water, vanilla and pistachios, this golden scoop of goodness is a staple during celebrations in Iranian households and said to symbolise unity and joy in gatherings. Historical reports on Bastani Sonnati (traditional ice cream) trace its origins to the Achaemenid Empire dating around 500 BC. It is popularly consumed as an ice cream float with carrot juice, topped with cinnamon or other spices.





WHILE ice cream rolls have gained global popularity only over the last decade, the concept has been around for longer. Translating to stir-fried ice cream, I-Tim-Pad is a popular street food from Thailand, made by spreading the cream or milk base onto a metal surface of sub-zero temperature and scraping it into a roll. Some versions might add nuts and other toppings. Culturally, theatrics accompany the making of I-Tim-Pad, with 'expert chopping and rolling' as part of the process.

QUESO ICE CREAM PAN DE SAL

THE Philippines is known for its unique ice cream flavours like ube, corn, avocado and queso, which blends cheddar cheese with sweet cream, sometimes, with bits of cheese in it! Slightly crumbly in texture, the chilled treat has the perfect balance of salty and sweet The scoop is traditionally devoured as an ice cream sandwich paired with a cloud-like pan de sal – a slightly sweet Filipino bread roll that is soft on the inside with a crispy crust.

BOOZA

THIS frozen dairy Levantine dessert brings interesting flavours together like mastic (resin), which has an earthy, piney taste and sahlab or orchid flour, which is light and floral, reminiscent of the bloom. Over time, it has grown in popularity in the Middle East. It has a stretchy, chewy texture, which connoisseurs might say feels like the Turkish dondurma. However, the flavour profile remains unique, lending it a distinctive personality.




SPAGHETTIEIS

THIS whimsical German chilled treat gets its name from the stringy vanilla ice cream topped with strawberry sauce and grated white chocolate, all resembling a dish of spaghetti with tomato sauce and parmesan cheese! Ice cream shop owner Dario Fontanella is credited with the creation, inspired by his experience tasting Mont Blanc, which, like Spaghettieis, is also stringy and made using a spätzle (noodle) press. It has gained popularity outside Germany owing to its unique presentation and 'playful' nature.



MUSICAL INTROSPECTION

MERICAN artist Chancelor Johnathan Bennett aka Chance the Rapper drops his longawaited album *Star Line* tomorrow.

The project tackles personal change and life lessons and marks the artist's return since his debut release *The Big Day* (2019), themed on his wedding that year.

It drew harsh criticism from fans on social media, who considered it a downgrade from its preceding mixtapes.

The artist has since divorced his wife and Internet personality Kirsten Corley.

In an interview, Chance said the new album is inspired by his trips to Jamaica and Ghana and attending various art fairs around the world

"Going to Ghana, reconnecting with a lot of my family, going through relationships changing, getting divorced – there are a lot of things that happened between my last project and this day," he said.

"I think the sounds, production-wise, if they're not super experimental, they're based on some of the Black music that was influential to me throughout my childhood or through my travels."



According to the artist, he was also inspired by Black Star Line, a shipping and passenger company that was started in 1919 by Jamaican activist Marcus Garvey for people of African descent.

"I was really inspired by his work and some of the ideas and opinions that he had, on us all being one people. So when I came to Ghana for the first time in January, I was already inspired by Marcus Garvey and



Garveyism. I learned a little bit of family history regarding Garveyism and how it connected to their faith," Chance added.

'Garveyism' refers to the body of thought and organisational activities associated with

the namesake activist.

The album also marks a reunion between Chance and illustrator Brandon Breaux, who has created artworks for all of his other projects (except *The Big Day*).

OMANTIC comedy film *Materialists* is out now in theatres.


Starring Dakota Johnson, Chris Evans and Pedro Pascal, the film follows failed-actress-turnedsuccessful-matchmaker Lucy Mason, who finds herself in a love triangle between her ex-boyfriend, John, an aspiring actor played by Chris Evans, and a charming millionaire, Harry, portrayed by Pedro Pascal.

Directed by South Korean-Canadian born filmmaker Celine Song, *Materialists* is her second film to be released following *Past Lives* (2023), which earned an Oscar nomination in 2024 for best picture and best original screenplay.

Celine, who is also the screenwriter, said she wanted to explore relationships across the class divide and what she describes as the 'transactional nature of dating in New York' based on her observations, as she was once a matchmaker for six months.

"I think that I learned more about people in those six months than I did in any other part of my life," Celine said.

"I wanted to talk about the way that we're being asked to objectify and



commodify each other and ourselves, even when it comes to matters of the heart, matters of love, and I think that I was really shocked while I was working as a matchmaker by how we were talking about what we were looking for in dating.

"Dating is, of course, a game we play in search of love and love itself is an ancient mystery, a great miracle.

"It's something entirely worth the trouble and the risk and none of these numbers are going to be able to help us get there," she added.

All the Tomorrows After hits the shelves on


August 19

However, Winter's spiteful mother steals her money and blows through it all in one day, forcing the young girl to return to her estranged father who reappears after being absent for more than a decade. The two agree that Winter would spend time with him in exchange for payment.

In an interview, the author said she took inspiration from her own grief journey and heritage, explaining that she lost her father to terminal illness, and that anticipatory grief did not prepare her as she knew and rejected his fate.

"I've spent most of my adulthood trying to find the right words. What I've learned is that there are none, really, to articulate



a loved one's slow and inevitable deterioration," Joanne explained.

"All the Tomorrows After is shaped by our journey, which began in the absence of hope and continues in the absence of a farewell. It is inspired by my father, his battle to maintain his identity, and our family's experiences as caregivers. It is a reflection of myself as a young adult navigating grief, guilt, and isolation," she added.

Mystical charm of Salalah

Bahrain-based adventurer and overlander has added another feather to his wanderlust hat this summer by completing a 'soul-stirring' expedition to Oman.

V Krishna Das, an Indian expatriate and business development manager, clocked in 4,500km in five days, exploring the beauty of Salalah.

Overlanding or four-wheel-drive touring is a way of 'self-reliant overland travel to remote destinations' where the journey alone is the principal goal.

"Salalah during the Khareef season is breathtaking with its misty mountains, vibrant greenery and rhythmic pitterpatter of rain," the 38-year-old told GulfWeekly.

"It felt like stepping into another world. Oman stands apart from other Gulf countries with its raw, untouched beauty. While cities like Dubai and Doha dazzle with modernity, Salalah offers a serene, almost mystical charm," he added.

"Traversing the shifting terrains of Saudi Arabia and the UAE before entering Oman felt like peeling back the layers of the Gulf's diverse geography, but it was Salalah that truly stole the show."

Some of the places he covered during this trip were Ittin mountain, a scenic area with winding roads, foggy vistas, and cosy cafés nestled in the hills; Sheeheet sinkhole, a hidden gem and

geological wonder in Dhofar region, boasting dramatic rock formations, and Marneef Cave and Blowholes where seawater shoots up when the tide is high.

"The landscape is so diverse in Oman and over 2,000km of driving revealed stunning contrasts – from golden desert dunes to fog-draped cliffs," he recalled.

"Driving through Rub'al Khali desert was an unforgettable experience. The vastness of this sandy expanse, with its endless horizon and shimmering dunes, was both humbling and awe-inspiring.

"On my visit to Ittin, I stayed in my car, surrounded by deep mist. There was zero visibility and nonstop rain,

which was surreal - like being wrapped in nature's quiet embrace," he added, talking about the highlights of the trip.

Despite the excitement, Krishna found navigating the mountains through heavy fog and rain quite challenging.

"I relied heavily on offline maps and pre-planned fuel stops, especially in remote stretches. Staying flexible with my itinerary helped me adapt to weather delays and changing road conditions," he explained.


