Bahraini artist has been showcasing her work and the kingdom's heritage of clay on a global platform at the London Design Week, inviting audiences to engage with her artistic process.

Multidisciplinary artist Nermin Habib's The Becoming series is being displayed at Isola x Design London Shoreditch, which ends today at the Shoreditch Town Hall.

"The Becoming series is a deeply personal exploration of transformation, where both the clay and I evolve together through the creative process," she explained.

"Each piece reflects my intimate relationship with the material, capturing the marks I leave behind, like a camera freezing a moment in time – traces of the making that tell the story of our shared

"As the clay transitions from raw material to an expressive form, I, too, grew as an artist.

"This series celebrates process and identity, where every imprint holds the memory of connection, patience, and becoming - a dialogue between the clay and me, shaping us both into something meaningful."

The exhibition invites audiences to engage with transformation – not as an end point but as an ongoing state.

Each vessel and fragment on display bears the traces of its making, from fingerprints to impressions, offering a record of dialogue between clay and

The series captures not just the clay's evolution from raw matter to expressive form, but also her own artistic growth.

Isola, in partnership with Design London Shoreditch, brought together designers, studios, brands and institutions to showcase contemporary craft, sustainability, collectable and innovative design.

This year, the festival is hosted inside the Shoreditch Town Hall as part of the Shoreditch Design Triangle's House of ICON programme.

Over the three-day event, visitors have explored an array of furniture, lighting, textiles, accessories and ceramics, all curated to reflect innovation and craftsmanship

at the highest level. Nermin, currently an

artist-in-residence at The Art Station in Muharraq, Bahrain, has built a multidisciplinary practice that encompasses creative strategy,

filmmaking, photography and ceramics.

Her work is rooted in the concept of the 'in-between,' exploring the intersections where cultures, identities and ideas converge.

Before dedicating herself fully to ceramics, she worked in advertising and brand strategy, contributing to global

projects, including Nasa campaigns, during her tenure at Google.

Her creative output extended to filmmaking, with her short film Cairo Soul



winning awards and hearts. A clip from the film was also featured in Pharrell Williams' music video Freedom.

Ceramics has become a medium through which Nermin explores the subtleties of human experience.

Her practice is informed by a career that blends creative industries and the arts, offering a rare perspective on how discipline, experience and intuition intersect.

Following her MFA from the Academy of Art University in

San Francisco, Nermin has explored the spaces where visual storytelling and material expression overlap.

She has previously exhibited internationally, including at Isola during Milan Design Week 2025, where her sculpture Flow was met with significant acclaim.

London Design Week has become a mainstay of the city over the last 20 years and, in 2019 attracted a record number of more than 600,000 visitors.

**AHRAIN'S music** scene just got a fresh burst of Afrobeat energy, thanks to Charles Clay, better known by his stage name Clayze.

The passionate music enthusiast has stepped into the spotlight with the release of his debut single and music video, Chance.

The rhythmic celebration of love pulses with vibrant Afrobeat grooves and heartfelt lyrics, capturing the spark of new romance and the magic of emotional connection.

"From an early age, music has been my constant companion, shaping my dreams and fuelling my passion," the American, who works as a quality control manager in a private firm, told GulfWeekly.

"Recording and sharing my own single and music is a milestone I have dreamed about for years, and I am overjoyed to see it come to fruition."

Charles, who moved to Bahrain in 2020, said his affair with music and unwavering belief in the power of love inspired him to write the song.

"The single, rooted in the vibrant rhythms of Afrobeat, was recorded in Manama, while the music video was brought to life in Nairobi, Kenya, in July," he explained.

Shot in one day, the video reflects the 'dedication and excitement behind the project'.

"It was filmed using a Sony Large Frame Cinematic Camera to ensure highquality visuals," he noted, adding that he chose Kenya

"The entire process of the song – from start to finish - took several months," he

"However, seeing it all come together has been incredibly rewarding, and the release of the song is my way of sharing the magic of love, especially new love.

### RUSSIAN FILMS TO BE SHOWCASED

■IVE Russian films are being showcased over the weekend, as part of a unique festival in the kingdom.

The Russian Film Festival kicks off today, and runs until Saturday, September 20, at Reel Cinemas in the Marassi Galleria mall.

"As part of the Russian Seasons, the Russian Ministry of Culture and ROSKINO, in collaboration with the Bahrain Authority for Culture and Antiquities, are organising the Russian Film Festival from September 18 to 20, where audiences can enjoy free screenings of a selection of outstanding Russian films," organisers said, in a statement.

Finist. The First Warrior is being screened today at 8.30pm. In the film, Finist ventures to distant Eastern territories on a perilous quest.

Tomorrow at noon, Cats in the Museum will follow Vincent, a ginger cat, and Maurice, a mouse, who team up with other cats to protect pieces of

artworks in the Hermitage Museum. The movie will be in Arabic, with English subtitles.

In the afternoon tomorrow, at 3pm, The Spirit of Baikal will tell the story of a father who takes his son to his grandfather for ice fishing, hoping to distract the young boy from the loss of his mother, but ends up caught in a

On Saturday at noon, Red Ribbons will tell the 1944 story of Nadia, who, along with German children, paints ribbons for a wish tree and dreams of the end of the war.

In the afternoon on Saturday at 3pm, Hockey Dads will depict the story of Andrey, a children's hockey coach, who gives his all to his pupils as they compete in a tournament for the future of their local ice rink.

Other than Cats in the Museum, all the films will be in Russian, with Arabic subtitles.

## A brush with nature



of Chinese fine brushwork painting opened on Sunday at the Bin Matar House in Muharraq.

Organised by the Shaikh Ebrahim bin Mohammed Al Khalifa Centre for Culture and Research, in collaboration with the Chinese Embassy, the show, titled Fine Brushwork Flower and Bird Paintings, will run until the end of the month.

The exhibition presents 28 works by Beijing-based artist Su Xiaofeng, who has dedicated more than two decades to refining the traditional gongbi style of painting.

The collection highlights floral subjects with strong cultural symbolism, such as China's national flower – the peony – which Su describes as symbolic of prosperity, good fortune, and auspiciousness.

"Our Chinese paintings blend traditional Chinese painting, calligraphy, poetry, and philosophy," he told GulfWeekly in an interview.

"Through the pairing of flowers and birds with distinct symbolic meanings, we express the beautiful meanings of traditional Chinese culture.

"For example, the peony represents prosperity, good fortune, and auspiciousness, while the bee represents diligence."

Born in 1968 in Guangdong Province, Su was influenced early on by the Lingnan School of Painting, before studying under Professor Zhou Yansheng at the

Guangzhou Academy of Fine

After moving to Beijing, he broadened his artistic outlook through both scholarship and collaboration with fellow artists.

Over the years, he has established a reputation for a style that he calls 'clear and elegant', drawing on tradition while also striving for new realms of expression.


For Su, the choice of subjects goes far beyond their surface beauty.

The exhibition also aims to foster cultural dialogue and Su hopes that visitors in Bahrain will see more than decorative imagery.

"Through this exhibition, Bahraini artists and people can get close to Chinese paintings and have the opportunity to understand



traditional Chinese culture, thereby integrating and communicating with their local culture and art, learning from each other and promoting each other," he explained.

"This exhibition is a good communication platform to further increase the integration of Eastern and Western cultures and enable the two countries to reach a new understanding of each

other's culture." When asked about similarities and contrasts between his gongbi style and Islamic art, Su pointed to both differences in technique and shared values in design.

"Chinese gongbi painting is based on line and must be integrated with Chinese calligraphy," he added.

"Western art, on the other hand, utilises a variety

of creative forms and

Western aesthetic systems differ significantly.

"Despite these differences, there are also commonalities, such as the principles of composition and colour."

The artist is no stranger to Bahraini audiences. Just last month, he presented his work at the Art Centre in Manama, where the response was, in his words, 'very positive'.

He added that it gave people in Bahrain the chance to engage closely with Chinese fine brushwork painting, culture and history.

Among the works on display at the Shaikh Ebrahim Centre, Su admits to having a personal favourite.

"I like all my works, but my favourite is the peony

theme," he added.

"As China's national flower, the peony represents wealth and good fortune.

"It has been a flower loved by both royal nobles and ordinary people throughout China's long history.

"The audience can understand the meaning of the flowers in the paintings in traditional Chinese culture and thus understand the connotation of my works."

Beyond the birds and blossoms, visitors to the exhibition will also get a glimpse into the artist's lifelong pursuit of balance between nature, philosophy, and artistic spirit.


As Su puts it, "The deeper you delve, the more wonders you discover."



## GEN V IS BACK WITH A VFNGFANCF

**ATIRICAL** superhero drama Gen V, the acclaimed spin-off of the Emmy-winning The Boys, is back with a second season that blends biting social commentary, shocking twists and an emotional farewell to one of its

Season 2 started yesterday, September 17, with a threeepisode launch and will continue with weekly releases until October 22.

Set at Godolkin University, the series focuses on aspiring young superheroes, who compete for the university's top ranking and a chance to join The Seven, Vought International's elite superhero

The first season of the show took place prior to the events in the fourth season of *The* 

This season is set after the events shown in the most recent episodes of the original series, after the university has undergone a dramatic transformation in the wake of The Seven's leader

Homelander's rise to power. Once billed as a training ground for aspiring Supes, the campus has now become a militarised space where students are moulded into

soldiers. The new dean, Cipher, played by Hamish Linklater, is a staunch believer in the supremacy of individuals with superpowers.

His character imposes a chilling vision of eugenics and superiority that reflects the authoritarian politics reshaping the world outside the university.

Hamish, known for his acclaimed role in Midnight Mass, describes Cipher as 'a true believer in creating a super race to rule them all.'

"The Superheroes have become the elite race, and Homelander has been put in charge of America," he explained.

"I'm playing a Dean that he would think would be appropriate for his America.

So that should tell you what a good hire I am. This Dean is a true believer in Superhero eugenics. In creating a super, super race to rule them all.

"All of that is in the first episode of the season.

"Things have changed since the first season where humans were normal people, non-Supes, running the country.

"Now, that's been flipped on its head and the slogan on the front of the school is 'Make America Super Again""

Marie (Jaz Sinclair), Emma (Lizze Broadway), and Jordan (London Thor and Derek Luh) return as they attempt to survive in an environment rife with betrayal and fear.

The group continues to grapple with being scapegoated for the bloody finale of Season 1, and now they must also navigate Cipher's oppressive regime.

Adding to the intrigue, a secret programme known as Project Odessa hints at a deeper conspiracy linked to the university's origins. The new season will feature crossovers from The Boys, with Starlight, Black Noir, The Deep and Stan Edgar all making appearances.

Behind the scenes as well, the second season is defined by loss.

In March last year, Chance Perdomo, who played fan favourite Andre Anderson, died in a motorcycle accident.

The creative team chose not to recast the role and instead reworked the storyline to ensure that Chance and his character had a presence throughout the new season. Showrunner Michele Fazekas said it was vital to 'honour Andre and Chance' in a way that felt authentic.

She explained that the writers had to grieve both the actor and the character, and took pride in the tribute that was crafted.



The new episodes also serve as a narrative bridge between Season 4 of *The Boys* and the eventual climax of the flagship series.

It is now streaming on Amazon Prime Video.

### **MUSICAL ANGST**

ANADIAN singersongwriter Sarah McLachlan is set to release her 10th studio album, Better Broken, this Friday, September 19.

The record will be her first album in nine years and her first collection of original material since *Shine On* in 2014, following the holiday release Wonderland in 2016.

"A lot of the lyrics on this record came from thinking about the world right now and asking, 'How do we move through this landscape? How do we keep our heads above water when it feels like so much is falling apart?'," she added.

"I don't know if I have any answers, but channelling all that angst and uncertainty into the music has been so cathartic.

"I hope that this record provides people with some relief and release, but in the end I just want them to take whatever they need from it,

and make the songs part of their own story."

The album features contributions from Wendy Melvoin, Matt Chamberlain, Benny Bock and Greg Leisz, as well as Katie Gavin of MUNA on the track Reminds Me. Its release was led by the singles Better Broken, which was issued alongside the album announcement in June, and Gravity, released in August.

HE European leg of the 2025 Formula 1 season is behind, and as the championship heads into its final third, all eyes turn to the Baku City Circuit this weekend for the Azerbaijan Grand Prix, writes Naman Arora.

With eight rounds remaining, the final act kicks off with a race weekend where anything can happen.

#### MCLAREN MOMENTUM

The defending

Constructors' Champions head to Baku in dominant form. They currently lead the Constructors' standings by a huge margin – about 337 points over Ferrari, and even more over Mercedes and Red Bull.

They could wrap up the Constructors' title this weekend if they outscore Ferrari by nine points, regardless of what their rivals do. Oscar Piastri and Lando Norris have been relentless in racking up results. Between them, they have secured a dozen wins and seven onetwo finishes.

This weekend could see history made.

If McLaren outscore Ferrari by nine points and are not outscored by Mercedes by 12 points or more, or Red Bull by 33 points or more, they will seal the Constructors' title with seven races still to spare, setting a new record for the earliest clinch.

For a team that last defended a championship in the early 1990s, this could be an iconic weekend.

#### TITLE DUEL

While much of the spotlight is on McLaren's collective bid, the individual battle remains fierce.

Piastri leads Norris, with both locked in as the only real contenders for the driver's crown. Unlike the inter-team battles of years past that often soured relationships, theirs has been conducted with sharp competition but mutual respect.

Red Bull's Max Verstappen



BEARMAN: Future in question

is barely a threat, as McLaren's consistency has put the reigning champion on the defensive.

With points gaps widening, his role may be less about winning the championship and more about spoiling McLaren's run.



Two of the sport's youngest drivers arrive in Baku under pressure.

Oliver Bearman is balancing on the edge of a ban, sitting on 10 penalty points, and just two more would trigger an automatic race suspension.

Kimi Antonelli, meanwhile, has endured a tough European stretch.

Criticism from Toto Wolff after Monza raised questions, but the rookie has often performed better on unfamiliar tracks.

Having scored a podium in Circuit Gilles Villeneuve, Canada, earlier this season and run well in Baku in F2, this weekend could be a chance to reset.

#### **BULLS NOT DOZING**

Monza reminded everyone that Red Bull are not finished.

Verstappen's emphatic win there, complete with fastest laps, marked his third victory of the season and offered evidence of renewed pace.

Baku is a very different challenge, demanding precision in the tight castle section and bravery on its long straights. If Red Bull's Monza performance was down to setup changes and their new floor, Azerbaijan will show whether the resurgence is real.

Victory in Azerbaijan would mark Verstappen's fourth of the campaign and reassert their relevance in a season where they have often looked outclassed.

Sergio Pérez, meanwhile, faces pressure to rediscover form, as speculation swirls around his long-term place in the team.

#### THE BAKU FACTOR

The city circuit in Azerbaijan has become a bit of a fan favourite for its unpredictable drama. Its combination of the tight, technical castle section and a long flat-out run to the finish line creates both overtaking opportunities and unforgiving hazards.

The 2017 edition remains infamous for its collisions and safety cars, while 2021 produced high drama with Verstappen's late tyre blowout and Lewis Hamilton's restart error.

Last year, a gripping duel between Piastri and Charles Leclerc kept fans on edge until the final lap.

The castle section is barely wide enough for a single car, demanding inch-perfect precision, while the flat-out blast along Neftchilar Avenue offers the longest full-throttle stretch in Formula 1. Drivers must balance aggression with survival, knowing that even a minor misjudgement can end their race.

The walls are unforgiving, the strategy windows are narrow, and safety cars are almost expected.


