ARBIE dolls and action figures, Hot Wheels cars, marbles, stamps, comic books, Tazos disks.... we have all grown up collecting something or the other that, even today, evokes nostalgia – a deep sense of belonging to a time that no longer exists.

What began as an innocent hobby has today grown into an industry that is worth billions of dollars, global studies have revealed. One latest research highlighted that the global collectibles market size is projected to reach \$422.56bn by 2030.

Bahrain is home to a few antique collectors. One such enthusiast, Hasan Usman, fell in love with music as a teenager. Over the last two decades, he has amassed a treasure trove worth thousands of Bahraini dinars, featuring audio cassettes, CDs, DVDs, video tapes, LPs and more. Western artists like Metallica, AC/DC, Michael Jackson through to the Arab world's nightingale Umm Kulthum and Bollywood's Shahrukh Khan – it is a diverse selection.

When the creative entrepreneur observed an interest for memorabilia among his friends and colleagues, he decided to take his passion to the next level and is now the owner of more than 5,000 retro collectibles, which also include old-style stereos, televisions and radios, woodpanelled vintage speakers, film cameras, a turntable, guitars, and music posters featuring yesteryear bands.

The term 'retro' is used to describe items from the recent past.

"My father used to bring home VHS movie cassettes all the time, which kindled in me a love for the movies," the 35-year-old told *GulfWeeky*.

"While I started collecting the movies during that time, I eventually expanded to include other items. However, this was just a hobby. Around six years ago, during the Covid-19 pandemic, I started an online page for my collectibles and

met like-minded individuals who were interested in the items, which spurred me on to take my hobby to the next level," he added.

Hasan now has a studio, which he established a year ago. It's a quaint space with a big personality, with endless shelves of musical memorabilia, guitars as decorative wall-hangings and posters adorning the doors, including one of iconic rock

band KISS, whose original lead guitarist Ace Frehley died on October 16.

Most of the items showcased are purchases from people or online. On some days, Hasan finds items left outside his studio.

"It is a good feeling, like a surprise or a Christmas gift," remarked the model-turnedfulltime-collector.

Among all of his prized possessions, the ones closest

to Hasan's heart are the turntable that he bought from a Bahraini gentleman about four months ago and an oldstyle stereo that he purchased from an Indian shop owner.

"There was this Indian man from Kerala who had more than 500 stereos at his shop in Manama and sold me this piece when he left the kingdom," Hasan reminisced, adding that he had to wait for almost two months to finally get it.

He explained how sometimes, some owners do not want to part with their antique possessions but might need the money or might be leaving the country. However, he is happy to safeguard these pre-loved treasures until they find new homes.

A poetic perspective

YOUNG Bahrain-based wordsmith has released a collection of 30 poems this month, creatively documenting her 'unsaid emotions', writes Melissa Nazareth.

Former New Indian School Bahrain student Manaal Mansoor

got down to penning her debut book Perspective: Seeing the Unseen when her grandfather, who she shared a deep bond with, passed away six years ago, while also juggling grief and school work

It was officially unveiled at an event at Swiss-Belresidences in Juffair last month.

"It was a way for me to process my feelings. The book is a labour of love of the last six years," the 18-yearold told GulfWeekly.

In the 104-page tome, the Indian expatriate has touched upon diverse themes, including love, loss and acceptance.

An excerpt from one of her poems All that remains is red reads.

'Let the skin be coloured or pale, what spills through is red.

No name or nation alters what's bled.

We fight, we fall, and forge division unashamed,

Yet red remembers—we are

And in our blindness, we forget what could save us all, lost in the frame.

This is the timeless truth to be claimed:

Red is what we all bleed can we deny it still?'

"I wrote this one recently and believe it has an important message to convey: one reality.

"I hope to inspire others through my verses, to pause, reflect, and discover meaning in everyday life, proving that even in loss, beauty and

family to see me through my loss but there are many who might need encouragement in a moment of isolation, perhaps, and that's what the book is for," added the young philanthropist, who has dedicated more than 100 hours teaching English to underprivileged Arab students.

The aspiring doctor, who is set to pursue a degree in medicine at Georgia University, in the capital Tbilisi, this year, has previously contributed to an anthology entitled The Mega Manuscript, and has plans to write a novel in the near future.

Presently, she lives in Juffair with her father Mansoor Ali, a sales manager, mother Hafsath Mansoor, an administrative professional, and 13-year old brother Mahfouz, who attends the Asian School.

Her elder brother Mubaris just completed his Master's in data analysis from Birmingham University.

BAHRAINI artist has ushered in the Yuletide spirit early with her collection of Christmas-inspired cards but with a local touch, and is set to display them at a local bazaar on Saturday.

The artworks reflect the kingdom's rich culture, from traditional crafts like pottery and pearl diving to iconic structures like the Bu Maher Fort.

Jenan Hashim's latest creation features Santa Claus shopping for spices at the suq and puts a fun spin on Bahrain's vibrant market scene while spreading festive cheer.

"I'm usually inspired by local scenes and love the little pockets of interesting colours and shapes everywhere you look," the 43-year-old told GulfWeekly.

"When I started using watercolours 10 years ago, I painted six cards of scenes in Bahrain, which were a big hit at a local fair. It spurred me on to design my first set of Christmas-inspired cards, which were well received by my colleagues. Since then, every year, I make it a point to paint new ones.

"In my latest card, Santa is shopping for cinnamon, cardamom, cloves and star anise to make his spiced chai (tea)," she explained, nodding to the kingdom's 'karak culture'.

Karak tea is a mildly spiced, creamy concoction popular among Bahrainis and expats alike and is sold at tea shops across the island.

"One of my close friends suggested the idea when I first started the collection and it has been on my mind since. I have so much to say about this piece but for now, enjoy spotting what you can and I'll share close-ups with more details soon," Jenan's

The primarily self-taught artist from Manama has been painting since her school days and has taken up short courses with some of the best in the industry.

"I took a course with renowned American artist Seana Mercedes Mallen, who used to conduct classes at her home in Awali. My main medium up to that point was acrylics, which I loved.

"I was introduced to watercolours by Bahraini artist Naji Swar. Watercolour is my happy place but during the Covid-19 pandemic, I bought myself an iPad Pro and got into digital artwork too. It is still as much work as watercolours if not

more so, at the moment, I am in between the two (mediums)."

"I plan to continue the Christmas card series as I enjoy coming up with fun things for Santa to do as he tours the island.





AROUND THE WORLD IN MUSIC, TV, BOOKS AND MORE - BY RIMA ALHADDAD



MERICAN R&B singer Miguel is set to drop his fifth album Caos tomorrow, October 24.

Spanish for 'chaos', the long-awaited follow-up since his 2017 project *War & Leisure* explores existential themes of disorder, rebirth and emotional turbulence. The sound is 'darker, more aggressive and boundary-pushing'.

In an interview, Miguel explained that *Always Time* off the new release tackles the concept of loyalty, inspired by the end of his longtime marriage in 2022

"That song was written because I was uncovering a lot of my values in real time," Miguel said.

"The word 'loyal' is crazy, I saw my grandparents stay together for my entire life, they were loyal to the family, but were they happy? I don't know."



He also spoke about *Angel's Song* and *New Martyrs*, which bring alive yearning for a better world.

"It's really hard when we're looking at real news, when we can see every day that humanity is being ignored. To be so desensitised to things, it's hard to know whether or not expressing that humanity matters, but when I come into the studio, I have to remind myself that if it's felt, then it matters.

"Whether or not everyone needs to hear it, that's a whole other thing, but to express it, I think, is the whole purpose. That is the beauty of what I get to do, and the blessing that I have of being an artist and having an audience," he expressed.

Born on born October 23, 1985, Miguel Jontel Pimentel began his musical career at 13. His debut full-length record *All I Want Is You* (2010) was under-promoted upon its release, however, it eventually became a sleeper hit, as the song *Sure Thing* off the album garnered success in 2023 after becoming viral on *TikTok*. It reached number 11 on the Billboard Hot 100 over a decade after its release, becoming his most commercially successful single to date.

POSTHUMOUS collection of newly discovered writings by Harper Lee, has hit the shelves.

The writer's career took a defining turn with the publication of her debut novel, *To Kill a Mockingbird*, in 1960.

about travel, love, fiction and art and what it means to lead a creative life.


It is claimed to have been written after Harper dropped out of law school, a semester away from completing her degree, in order to chase her dreams of becoming a writer.

In a recent interview with Harper's nephew Edwin Lee and niece Molly Lee, they praised their aunt and expressed excitement towards the new stories seeing the light of day.

"I knew there were unpublished stories, I had no idea where the manuscripts of those stories were," Edwin said.

The works were discovered in one of the writer's New York City apartments after she passed.

"I think it's interesting to see how her writing evolved and how she worked on her craft, even I can tell how she improved," Molly said, adding that she is 'very pleased' they have been found.

Derry premieres its first episode on October 26 on HBO Max, with a schedule release running until December 14.

Director Andy Muschietti, who worked on the novel's most recent film adaptations *It* (2017) and *It: Chapter Two* (2019), returns as show developer alongside Barbara Muschietti, who produced the two films, and Jason Fuchs who also serves as a coshowrunner.

Based on the 1986 Stephen King novel *It*, the show is set to dive into the lore of the main antagonist Pennywise (Bill Skarsgård), an ancient malevolent entity who appears as a clown every 27 years to prey upon the children of Derry, Maine, using supernatural powers.

In an interview, Andy explained that the film is set in 1962, 27 years before the events of the first movie.

The executive producer also revealed that the eight episodes will match the film's atmosphere but with added elements, making the upcoming series even more intense.

"I wanted to maintain the same tone of the movie because I wanted the movies themselves to maintain the tone of the book, which is

terribly scary and graphically violent. There are heightened emotions, but there's also a lot of humour," he said.

"We had the opportunity to make it creepier because it's a bigger canvas with more characters and more of their fears to explore. The intention is to take things to the edge and give audiences more than what they've experienced in the movies before," he added.

FTER an intense weekend in Austin, Formula 1 heads south to Mexico City for another thrilling round, writes Naman Arora.

With just 40 points separating the top three in the championship and a host of young drivers set to take to the track, fans can expect three days of non-stop action at the Autódromo Hermanos Rodríguez as the Mexican Grand Prix gets underway tomorrow, October 24. Here are five storylines to watch this weekend.

TITLE CHALLENGE

All eyes are going to be on the Drivers' Championship this weekend, as the question of who will take this year's title looms heavy on the grid.

If you had asked anyone just a month ago who was most likely to bring home the title, the McLaren duo of Oscar Piastri and Lando Norris would have been the most-heard answers.

But now that defending World Champion Max Verstappen has cut Piastri's lead from over 100 points to just 40 in the past month, the title remains definitively undecided.

With the Red Bull driver reinvigorated, both Norris and Piastri will be on their toes to avoid another mishap like the one they had in Texas last weekend.

The good news for McLaren is that they need one strong weekend to alleviate the pressure building on the drivers, but Verstappen says he has to be 'perfect' every time to stay in the frame.

PUSHING FOR PODIUM

Seven-time world champion Lewis Hamilton is no stranger to records, but he now has one of the most unwanted ones on the grid, in his very first season with Ferrari.

The Brit has now broken the record for the longest podium drought in Ferrari history.

Having done 19 races without a podium - the longest any Ferrari driver has gone in Formula 1 history - he has surpassed Didier Pironi, who raced for the team for 18 races before finally getting his first podium for Ferrari in 1982.

Hoping to break the streak, Hamilton will be trying to live up to the lofy expectations with which he was brought to the team, as he tries to step out of the shadow of team mate Charles

Leclerc - who picked up his sixth podium of the season in Austin last weekend.

It has been a tough 2025 for Ferrari so far, with no race victory to their name after such a strong end to 2024 that saw them fighting for the Teams' Championship with McLaren.

TSUNODA 'TSINK' OR 'TSWIM'

It's only easy to be at Red Bull if you are Max Verstappen, and Yuki Tsunoda has gotten the 'black swan' treatment this season at the team.

And with his future with the team to be decided after this weekend's Grand Prix, the pressure is on for the Japanese driver to show his mettle in Mexico.

Having that sword hanging over his head could work both ways - either pushing him to put everything into his race or pressuring him too much to focus on his track performance.

Following an impressive rookie season, Racing Bulls driver Isack Hadjar has been tipped to replace Tsunoda, with the French driver

achieving a podium finish at Zandvoort.

However, Tsunoda has been showing great form in the last several races, but unfortunately for him, so has Verstappen, the belle of the Red Bulls.

ROOKIE RUSH

Eyes will also be gleaning the track for hints of future stars, as almost half the full-time F1 grid will miss Friday's opening practice at the Mexico City Grand Prix, with eight teams fielding rookies to meet the sport's mandatory young driver rule. Each full-time driver must give up their car for at least two FP1 sessions per season to allow newcomers, those with no more than two race starts, to gain experience.

Ferrari, Red Bull, Mercedes, McLaren, Williams, Haas, Alpine and Aston Martin will all make changes.

At Ferrari, Antonio Fuoco replaces Lewis Hamilton, fresh from his Le Mans victory with the Scuderia.

Red Bull's F2 racer Arvid Lindblad will sub in for Max Verstappen, while McLaren's Pato O'Ward gets a home runout in place of Lando Norris. Mercedes will hand George

Russell's car to Frederik Vesti, and Williams will give Luke Browning a turn in Carlos Sainz's machine.

Aston Martin will debut F2 race-winner Jak Crawford, while Haas continues with Ryo Hirakawa, and Alpine slots in Paul Aron for Pierre Gasly.

The influx of rookies represents one of the biggest FP1 reshuffles in recent memory, as teams race to meet their young driver obligations before the season's end.

ALTITUDE WITH AN ATTITUDE

One of the great things about a 24-race Formula 1 season is the sheer variety of venues it brings, each with its own quirks, challenges, and climates spread across 21 countries.

Some circuits, however, stand out, and Mexico City is one of the most distinctive.

Sitting more than 2,200 metres above sea level - around 1,400 metres higher than the next highest track - the Autódromo Hermanos Rodríguez presents a truly unique challenge. At such an altitude, the thinner air has a major effect on both aerodynamics and engine performance.

With less air flowing over the car, even a high-downforce configuration similar to Monaco can feel more like a low-downforce setup at Monza, leaving drivers wrestling with less grip and more sliding. Engines also struggle to draw in enough air, which can

in enough air, which can affect reliability, while cooling becomes more difficult.

Drivers often have to back off from traffic to let their cars cool down before attacking again, making race management more complex. All of this unfolds in front of one of the most passionate and energetic crowds on the calendar, with the packed Foro Sol stadium section providing an unforgettable backdrop as drivers roar through to complete each lap.


