Voice of courage



NGLISH expatriate and gifted singer Annie Kennaugh has embarked on a noble mission – to use her musical talent to support those suffering from cancer.

The 25-year-old former British School of Bahrain (BSB) student recently took centre stage at the Dilmun Club in Saar, raising more than BD1,000 for the Bahrain Cancer Society through a heartfelt performance.

For Annie, this initiative is deeply personal.

Just 18 months ago, the Janabiya resident faced a lifealtering diagnosis – a brain tumour that required surgery. Her first charity concert on November 27 wasn't just a show; it marked the anniversary of her operation.

"Instead of it being a sad day, I wanted to turn it into something that could help other people," Annie, who presently lives with her fiancé Ross Laing and younger brother Alfie Kennaugh, told GulfWeekly.

"We raised just more than BD1,000, including BD120 raised by my older brother Jack who shaved his head at the charity gig."

Annie arrived in the kingdom in 2018 with her parents: dad Rob Kennaugh, who works in Saudi Arabia, mum Dawn, a teacher at an international school in Bahrain, and brother Alfie, 22, who studied at St Christopher's School. He just completed his Master's in cinematography from Bournemouth University, England and returned this year. Her older brother Jack, who was working in the UK at the time, also joined them this year.

After two years in Bahrain, Annie moved to the UK to pursue her higher education.

"I had come back for my summer holiday in September 2023 when I learned about the tumour. I have hormonal issues and was recommended to get an MRI done to ensure there was nothing wrong with my

pituitary gland. The tumour was spotted incidentally," Annie explained.

Although the surgery was successful, recovery has been challenging.

"I'm still undergoing physical therapy for some balance and co-ordination issues. Reading has become quite difficult and my memory has become a lot worse than it used to be. I was in a wheelchair last January but am happy to be on my two feet now."

Grateful for her progress, Annie hopes to transform her personal journey into a force for good, pledging to make charity gigs in support of cancer patients an annual tradition.

While last month's event marked her first official charity performance, Annie's love for music runs deep – she has been singing for as long as she can remember.

"I come from a very musical family – my mum plays the cello and my dad, the guitar. So we always grew up with music and did a lot of karaoke," she said.

"When I almost turned 14, I played at the summer fair for my school in China where we lived at the time. My friend's dad happened to be there, he owned a restaurant, and he asked me to play in his restaurant. From there, I've had weekly gigs pretty

much until now," added the talent, who has already sung a few times at the Dilmun Club.

Annie's repertoire spans covers of international artists across genres – from pop to rock – but she admits most fans know her best for her soulful renditions of Adele.

She often shares the stage with popular guitarist and Filipino expatriate Jared Simangan, creating soulful performances that captivate audiences.

Looking ahead to the New Year, Annie plans to devote more time to her music while also working towards completing her education. "I'm studying special educational needs at the University of East London and definitely want to finish that," she said.

EVENTEEN highachievers across diverse sectors have clinched coveted titles of excellence at the Woman of the Year Awards 2025, inspiring scores of women to pursue their dreams.

The spectacular grand finale was staged by *Woman This Month*, in association with *GDN Media* and Porsche at the Diplomat Radisson Blu Hotel, on Saturday, as highlighted in the *GDN* on Sunday.

The gala commenced with a scintillating musical performance. Many ambassadors and other dignitaries attended the event, which was graced by guest of honour and pioneering British engineer and innovator Dr Heba Bevan OBE and chief guest and National Arts Council chairman Shaikh Rashid bin Khalifa Al Khalifa.

Shaikh Rashid, a world renowend interdisciplinary visual artist and member of the Bahraini royal family, highlighted the role of women in the community, emphasising how the standard of the kingdom's art scene developed after the entry of women artists.

The evening continued with a short film about the Woman of the Year Awards. A video featuring Red House Marketing publisher and founding director George Middleton and managing director Anne Middleton was also aired,

lending the event a personal touch.

"We launched the Woman of the Year Awards last year, which was a grand success, but we have surpassed ourselves this year," George

told GulfWeekly.

"We introduced the Woman of Arabia Achievement Award and it is a privilege to have a woman of this repute grace our platform," he added.

"The support that we have received from our sponsors has been overwhelming and instrumental in making this event possible. And it gives me great joy to announce that next year, the awards will be going regional," George revealed.

Renowned Saudi businesswoman Lubna Al Olayan, the first woman to chair a publicly listed bank in Saudi Arabia and the wider Gulf region, was presented the Woman of Arabia Achievement Award. She was appointed chairwoman of the Saudi British Bank in 2019 following its merger with Alawwal Bank.

Adding to the list of firsts this year was the new trophy design fashioned to resemble a golden lady.

up to the gala, by a technical jury, which shortlisted more than 50 finalists, who were then evaluated by the main jury.

The main jury comprised six successful Bahrainis: digital innovator Ubaydli Ubaydli, creative entrepreneurs Sonya Janahi and Huda Janahi, communications leader Noora AlNusuf, fashion and education pioneer Tamara Hostal and marketing

trailblazer and mental health advocate Nivedita Dhadphale.

More than 23,000 voters cast their ballots online across categories, including the arts, literature, fashion, hospitality, health, beauty and wellness, sports and more.

The Orange Economy Rising Star Award was also launched this year, in collaboration with the United Nations Industrial Development Organisation Investment and Technology Promotion Office (UNIDO-ITPO), following the announcement of 2025 as the Orange Economy Year in May. The national initiative aims to bridge the gap between creativity and entrepreneurship.

The award was presented to Bahraini talent Eman Sharif, who founded Campfire, a travel platform focused on connecting Arab

One such Bahraini was humanitarian Rayana Sayyar, who clinched the Woman in Social Services award for her commendable work with orphans.

"This is such a wonderful gesture and I am so honoured to have won said the founder of nongovernment organisation Our Responsibility, which helps orphans and children in need through sponsorships, healthcare services, education and more.

"The biggest highlight though is making an impact on someone's life. And the more we are able to do that, the more rewarding it is. I

RETRO REVIVAL

ONG-TIME singer and songwriter
Pebe Sebert, aka pop singer Kesha's mother, drops her first and only album tomorrow, December 12.

The self-titled project unearths the 'hidden talent's' original recordings from the 1980s, which have been newly remastered for modern listening.

The 69-year-old creative's career began in the 1970s as the pen behind the songs of country artists including Dolly Parton. She eventually set out to record her own music. However, a series of unfortunate events, including her marriage falling apart, put a hold to her venture; she stopped showing up to recording sessions and completely disappeared.

Pebe kept the 11 tracks throughout the years, expecting to do nothing with them, until a few friends who heard the songs encouraged her to revisit the project, believing that they stumbled upon '80's pop gold'.

Her daughter supported her too and is releasing the work through her label Kesha Records.

"Kesha started her own record company, and she said, 'Hey, the first record I'm going to put out that's not my record is going to be your record'," she recalled. Pebe describes the album release to be a happy ending,

as it is not only coming out at a time when she is healthy and stable but also after her daughter's personal and professional struggles; her long legal battle with former record label Kemosabe Records, which allegedly had her trapped in a contract that was stripping her creative freedom.

"There's been a lot of very high highs and very low lows for me as a person, and for my daughter and our family and her career," Pebe noted.

"The whole point is to

touch people with your stories and maybe make somebody's life just a little bit better for a minute. I know Kesha's definitely done that with her music, and I'm so proud of her. I've had so many people tell me how she's changed or saved their life, and I'm just happy to have what I did so long ago come out and maybe change someone's life a little bit for a minute."

Pebe is credited as the cowriter for a number of her daughter's songs and has also written hits for a number of modern-day artists, including Ariana Grande, Miley Cyrus and Pitbull.

friendship and adventure," the 37-year-old told *GulfWeekly*.


"There's also some focus on change and adaptability. The lead character Keshav moves from the city to a small town.

blog, which was her first foray into writing. Later, she started self-publishing, eventually working with independent publishers.

> The creative talent stated that she was inspired to pursue children's literature when she was reading picture books to her son when he was about a month old.

"I used to read to him every day. That's when the

first thought of writing a book came to me. I wrote several picture books and sent out manuscripts to publishers. I experimented with plenty of career options after I quit my job, and nothing gave me as much joy as writing stories for children," she noted.

WASTELAND QUEST

HE second season of American postapocalyptic drama television series *Fallout* is set to premiere on December 17 on *Amazon Prime Video*, with a scheduled release running weekly until February 4.

Based on the namesake roleplaying video game franchise, the series is set two centuries after the Great War of 2077, in which society has collapsed following an apocalyptic nuclear exchange between the United States and China.

It stars Ella Purnell as Lucy MacLean, who leaves her home in Vault 33 to venture into the dangerous wasteland of a devastated Los Angeles to look for her father, who has been kidnapped by wasteland raiders.

Along the way, she meets a
Brotherhood of Steel squire
Maximus (Aaron Moten) and a
legendary ghoul bounty hunter
Cooper Howard (Walton Goggins),
each having his own past and agenda
to settle.

In the second season, Lucy accompanies Cooper to New Vegas to discover the truth about her father and Vault-Tec while Maximus prepares for war.

Bethesda Game Studios executive producer Todd Howard, who also directed the third and fourth games of the franchise, revealed that he was sold on executive producer Jonathan Nolan's series pitch because it wasn't an exact adaptation. Instead, it is a whole new story set nine years after the events of *Fallout 4*.



As for the new season, Todd promises fans of the game that an incredible set was built for the upcoming episodes.

"The scale of New Vegas as a proper set is incredible, it's a location that gamers know," he said, referring to the game *Fallout: New Vegas*.

Who will win at Ally Pally?

Preview of the World Darts Championships brought to you by The Bahrain Darts Masters

T'S that time of year again. Whilst Bahrain gets set for National Day celebrations and the festive period, the best darts players in the world are about to battle it out for the threeweek epic of the World Darts Championships in London.

The event's place in sporting history is unmatched for the unique atmosphere, fancy dress and merriment which have become a hallmark of Alexandra Palace, or 'Ally Pally' as the venue is known. At the same time, there is a serious sporting side to this, as well as some not inconsiderable prize money. It's the one that every player dreams of winning.

Performances at Ally Pally can also have an impact on who we may see in Bahrain for the Darts Masters in January. We are fortunate to be the first event to take place after the World Championships. Not only does that mean we can bring the Ally Pally buzz to Bahrain, but there is the chance for one or two players to put in a stellar performance and earn their place for our event on January 15 and 16 at our new home at Exhibition World.

When looking at the title contenders, most would look no further than the two Lukes.

Luke Littler and Luke Humphries have dominated the world of darts in the last couple of seasons.

Since winning his first major title (The 2024 Bahrain Darts Masters, no less), Littler has become a household name winning last year's World Championships, with wins this year in the World Matchplay and Grand Slam of Darts. But he has also shown to be beatable, having lost in the final of the Premier League this year, as well as the World Series



final. Despite that, he is the world Number One and clear favourite as the defending champion.

As for Luke Humphries, his consistency has remained strong this year despite losing in the semi-final this year in Bahrain. Having won the World Championships in 2024, his most notable triumph this year came in The Premier League final in summer, as well as three appearances in other major finals this year. He is second in the world rankings and has every chance of repeating his 2024 success.

Amongst the other top contenders are three fan favourites from previous editions of Bahrain Darts Masters.

Gerwyn Price 'the Iceman' won three Darts Masters titles this year and was runner up in Bahrain in January. His two semi-final appearances in the Grand Slam of Darts and Players Championship this year showed a strong return to form and given his history at Ally Pally (he won four years ago), he should certainly be in the mixer.

Michael Van Gerwen can certainly never be written off as a three-time winner and last year's beaten finalist. He also won the World Series final this year, so comes into the tournament with some momentum. He is also in a section of the draw which

avoids many of the big guns, so should have a good chance of reaching the latter stages.

Stephen Bunting, current Bahrain Darts Masters champion, is seeded fourth and has a reasonable path to the latter stages. He was a semi-finalist last year but has had mixed fortunes since. He performed well in the World Series this year, in addition to his win in Bahrain, but struggled in some of the majors and the Premier League. Fans will be hoping he has a long run in the tournament, not least because his walk on song is always one that gets the crowd going (Titanium by David Guetta featuring Sia).

Outside of these favourites, Nathan Aspinall, ever popular with the fans, has had a mixed season by his high standards, has a tough draw and could face Luke Humphries as early as the fourth round. And, don't rule out Michael Smith, who won the first ever Bahrain Darts Masters in 2023. Whilst his world rankings have dropped a fair bit since then, his recent quarter final at the Grand Slam of Darts gave a glimpse of his old form.

It's also been great to see a return to form recently for Jonny Clayton. He was last seen in Bahrain at our first event in 2023 doing 270kph on the Bahrain International Circuit drag strip in our dragster experience. Whilst a dip in form followed (unrelated to the dragster, we hope), his 2025 has shown promise with an appearance in the final of the PDC World Masters and a handful of semi-final appearances in other ranking tournaments. Certainly not one to write off.

Whichever way the tournament plays out, in the next few weeks, it will no doubt be a world-class showcase of sport and entertainment.

We may well see some surprises along the way too, and perhaps even a player who can outperform and get themselves an invitation to the Bahrain Darts Masters.

Don't forget that just two weeks after the World Championships end, you will be able to witness the stars of the game right here in Bahrain.


